## Most Stores Will Be Closed July 4

Most Cross Plains business houses will be closed Thursday, July 4, in observance of Independence Day. A few will operate on Sunday schedules, and others will remain open as usual.

No Independence Day celebration is scheduled here. Some local residents will attend the horse races and jubilee at Brady and others will go to the annual Cowboys' Reunion at Stamford. Brownwood Lake will be a favorite spot for many with several family groups planning gatherings there. The Riding Club and rodeo fans will go to May for the celebration there.

Persons traveling Texas highways are cautioned that rigid enforcement has been ordered of speed limits and traffic regulations. All highway patrol cars in Callahan County are now radar-equipped, and patrolmen will be working longer than normal hours.

All public buildings, including post offices, banks and courthouses will be closed the entire day throughout the county.

"Let us not forget to fly our

country's flag Thursday," reminded the Rev. Roger Butler, Chamber of Commerce president. "Even though many merchants will be gone for the day, I hope they will make arrangements to have flags flying at their places of business during daylight hours; this looks good to people passing through and speaks well for the entire town." Mayor Doyle Burchfield cautioned against shooting of fireworks in the city limits during the July 4 holiday. "This is unlawful and obedience to the city ordinance is expected," he warned.

## Cash Needed For Cemetery Roads

Pavement to Cross Plains Cemetery and hard-surfacing of two city streets within the grounds are now being sought in a public subscription of funds.

A total of \$2,622, all from free-will donations, will be required.

The project is one which has been talked for years, however, not until Tuesday when T. T.

Nichols, president of the Cemetery Association, gave that organization's full support to the undertaking, has an effort been made to actually get construction underway.

Newman Paving Company of De Leon, presently doing work here for the city, submitted the \$2,622 figure for an 18-foot road from the end of pavement on West 8th Street to the cemetery, a distance of 1,139 feet, and then for the building of 1,184 feet of pavement at a width of 15 feet within the cemetery grounds. This figure was based upon County Commissioner Duke Mitchell's crew hauling gravel to the construction site, and assurance was given that this cooperation would be immediately forthcoming. Too, the City of Cross

Plains pledged personnel and equipment to help in the job.

Feeling that it is a "Now or Possibly Never" situation on the project, Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce went on record as supporting the Cemetery Association 100 per cent in the undertaking, and subscribed the first \$100 to "get the ball rolling." Other quick gifts subscribed before the drive really got started included: Higginbotham's \$100, Citizens State Bank \$100, City of Cross Plains \$100, Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company \$50, McNeel's Insurance \$50 and Newman Paving Company \$50.

All of the money will have to be raised before the project can be started for no organization wishes to accept responsibility for any deficit which may arise. It is, therefore, necessary that an individual contributions be mailed or brought in at once, while the paving company's equipment is still in town.

Gifts may be left at the Citizens State Bank, at Higginbotham's, the Cross Plains Review or handed to Mrs. Loreta Lutzenburger, secretary-treasurer of Cross Plains Cemetery Association. All will be acknowledged and if an insufficient amount of money is raised to complete the project the money will be returned to contributors.

"We don't have a lot of time for this money-raising effort," Nichols reminded yesterday. "I hope our people, including many who live away but have loved ones buried here, will respond quickly and wholeheartedly."

## Days Spent Sifting Dirt Prove To Be Fun For Area Archeologists

Brandsford Eubank and D. J. Smelly, Jr. attended the Texas Archeological summer school held on the banks of the lower Guadalupe River recently. The site for the exploration was the supposed Spanish Presidio Loreta which served as protection to the mission nearby.

The site was first surveyed by a civil engineer in the party and each exploratory pit was carefully located for possible future reference and study. The site was laid off in five foot squares, and those dug were taken down by six inch levels, often with a small trowel. The dirt from the pits was sifted through a screen and the significant objects carefully preserv-

ed, each level separately. These will be taken to the laboratory and studied and sorted for cataloging. Articles of western manufacture were largely pottery fragments, bits of spatter lead, a few trade ornaments, pieces of copper, flattened musket balls and odd pieces of iron plus one possible gun flint. Search was made for the walls of the presidio, but neither post holes of the stockade, nor definite footing for other walls was found, however at one place there were the stone foundations of lookout towers and the pounded adobe floor of a small granary.

**Texture of Dirt**  
The earth at the site was

largely sand, coarse in spots. The stones were a crumbly sandstone of local origin, and not too plentiful. The mortar was lime, nor was there much evidence of wattle and daub walls as is found in other places. Some of the padres built of upright posts chinked with mud and straw, or hay. The whole site had been dug through many times by moles and gophers. These later were only slightly smaller than ground squirrels and were often seen pushing armfuls of sand out of their burrows into the pits which cut through their level. The general aspect of the site indicated sparseness bordering on poverty. Not even a fraction of a real

usual depth. No indicative or pottery was found with these burials. Some evidence was found of occupation at least 100 years later than the 1730 Spanish period. In many ways the digging raised more questions than it solved problems. Much more work needs to be done.

### 125 In Party

The party, made up of some 125 persons, camped in a two acre liveoak mott and ate either their own cooking or with the common mess. Lectures were given by Dr. E. Mott Davis, head of the Texas University Dept. of Archaeology and Mrs. Roy Scheutze of the Witte Museum of San Antonio. Super-

vision of the various crews was by other personnel of the above institutions and trained Texas amateurs. Dr. Curtis Tunnel state archaeologist, looked in giving his blessing. Dublin Editor, avid amateur archaeologist, Tommy Hicks did yeoman service, particularly in the Indian burial. The school was hampered by rain, after a two and one-half afternoon rain, Dr. Davis Sagely observed that there was much bed wetting in the camp that afternoon. Brandsford got out to the highway just ahead of storm Candy, Sunday. Many were not so fortunate. It is safe to surmise that they've a rather damp camp there this Monday morning.

Tate, who is working toward a doctorate at North Texas State University, plans to move to Baird soon.

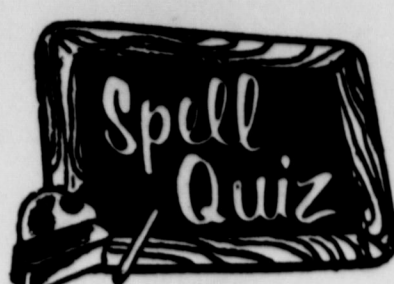
Raised in Crystal City, he earned his B.S. degree at Sul Ross in Alpine and his M.Ed. at Abilene Christian College.
