\$1,885 More Needed On Cemetery Paving

Twelve new gifts, all without personal solicitation, were made this week to a fund being raised in the hope of paving the road from the downtown district to Cross Plains Cemetery, and then hard-surfacing two streets within the grounds.

Contractors have agreed to do work for \$2,622 and members of the cemetery's board of trustees are placing the issue before the people.

"We want very much to see this project finished, for mud in wet weather is very bad near and inside the cemetery," said T. T. Nichols, president of the association. "We do not feel," he continued, "that personal solicitation for funds should be necessary; if our people want the improvement they will bring in their contributions."

Gifts may be left with Mrs. Paul Lutzenburger at the Citizens State Bank at Higginbotham's or the Review.

The 12 gifts this week totaled \$187. This added to \$550 pledged when the drive was

kicked off last Tuesday brought the cash on hand to \$737, or \$1,885 short of the necessary total.

Nichols urged that out-of-town people, who have loved ones buried here, help in financing the project. "We need their support," he stressed.

Road Tax Levy Endorsed By Commissioners Court

Callahan County Commissioners Court has unanimously endorsed the proposed 30-cent farm-to-market road tax to be voted on Saturday.

Letters supporting the levy, signed by four commissioners and the county judge, were mailed to all registered voters in the county Monday.

While the tax is labeled a "farm-to-market and lateral road tax," it is pointed out that none of it will be used for maintenance of officially designated FM Roads. That obligation is assumed by the state. It would be used, though, for purchase of right-of-way for new FM roads, officials say.

To be eligible to ballot, a person must be both a resident, registered voter and own property within the county which has been rendered for taxation. Everyone balloting, though, will be required to sign an affidavit listing at least one taxable item rendered for the current year. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

The letters mailed by the Commissioners Court emphasize that if the 30-cent levy is voted down, a raise in valuation will necessarily follow. In that event part of the tax increase will go to the state, whereas the proposition to be voted on Saturday makes it all available to the county.

If the 30-cent levy is approved, it is pointed out that taxes in three precincts, 1, 3 and 4, will still be less than they were in 1962. In precinct 2 the tax would be exactly the same as in 1962.

The 80 cent tax structure, on which counties are presently operating, was set by the state in 1907, and has not been changed. Increased prices of labor, supplies and services has

made it practically impossible for county administration to be financed on the old schedule, particularly with declining valuations from oil and petroleum products.

Commissioners were required to make a \$31,000 loan Monday morning to meet expenses of the current taxable year.

Voting will take place at seven polling places in the county. C. W. Sutphen will be presiding judge at Baird, Allen Johnson at Clyde, Mrs. Bill Kilgore at Cross Plains, J. Frank Carpenter at Denton Valley, Hilton Tarrant at Eula, Ray Wilbanks at Putnam and Albert Betcher at Oplin.

Three Buffalo cheerleaders, who will lead yells at football games next fall, are attending a cheer leading school at Texas Technological College in Lubbock through Friday.

They are Rosalea Grider, head cheerleader, Dianna Jones and Debbie Tyler.

Believed most seriously hurt was Mrs. Pete (Nora Lee) Golson, who sustained back injuries. She was placed in traction at Eastland Memorial Hospital, where she was taken Saturday night. Mrs. Golson's mother, Mrs. Emma Pope, sustained lacerations about the leg, however, her injuries were not believed critical. Treated at the hospital but released was Mrs. Bobby Golson, also of Cross Plains.

An estimated 150 people from Cross Plains were in attendance at the rodeo but only a few were seated in the section which collapsed. Cross Plains Riding Club had participated in the street parade and grand entry. Many local persons had taken lawn chairs and were sitting in pickup trucks and other vantage places.

When the section of bleachers collapsed, spilling about 200 people, Mayor Doyle Burchfield and Paul Lutzenburger were active in rescue efforts. First two injured persons removed from the wreckage were placed in a station-wagon owned by Mayes Flower Shop in Cross Plains and rushed to a Brownwood hospital. Ambulances from all nearby towns arrived on the scene shortly and began removing the injured. Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox and Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch of Cross Plains also aided in rescue work.

Auto Smash-Ups Keep Highway Patrols Busy

Three traffic accidents in the Cross Plains area during the July 4 holiday week end have been reported by Texas Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch of this city.

Injuries to persons were regarded as light, but property damage was considered heavy.

First of the trio of mishaps involved a hit and run charge. Welch filed charges of "failure to stop and render aid" in Eastland County and "driving while intoxicated" in Callahan County against Jack E. Thompson, 55, of Brownwood after his 1962 Ford was in collision with a 1968 Oldsmobile driven by Donald R. Johnston, 40, of Eunice, N. M., at 3:50 p.m. July 4. The crash occurred seven-tenths of a mile west of Rising Star on State Highway 36. No one was hurt.

Welch apprehended Thompson about 30 miles west of the wreck scene, and was aided in the chase by Rising Star Mayor W. G. Reed.

Saturday at 3:15 a.m., a one-car accident three miles north of Cross Plains on Highway 206 resulted in two injuries. Robert Spencer Foster, 21, of Fort Worth sustained a head injury and Veta Jo Bolton, 15, of Coleman suffered lacerations when Foster's 1965 Chevrolet, which was demolished, left the road and struck a high embankment. Both were taken to Coleman for medical attention.

The same morning, at 10:45, a 1965 Chevrolet station wagon and a 1965 Dodge collided two blocks west of the traffic light in Rising Star. The station wagon was driven by Fred A. Malone, 28, of Albuquerque, N. M., and the Dodge was driven by Leona Smith Holden of that city. Neither was injured.

Army Engineers Want Big Lake On Bayou At Burkett

A preliminary go-ahead has been given in Washington for a \$31,500,000 expenditure at Brownwood Lake and the watershed of Upper Pecan Bayou. Included in the expenditure is a large lake to be built near Burkett.

The Bureau of Budget has authorized the Secretary of the Army to seek funds for the project in the fiscal 1970 budget which goes to Congress next January.

A \$24.8 million amount in federal funds would reinforce Lake Brownwood Dam and build Pecan Bayou Reservoir upstream for flood control. The project has been in the planning stages since 1945.

In a letter to the Board of Supervisors of the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District, Congressman Omar Burleson said that "I have prevailed upon the Bureau of the Budget to release the Pecan Bayou Flood Control and Water Supply Project."

"Inasmuch as the omnibus bill is now being marked up here in the Congress, very little time was left to include the project into the bill this year. I am pleased to advise that the Budget Bureau has complied."

"In line with this, I have submitted a statement to the House Committee on Public Works and have discussed this personally with the subcommittee chairman, Congressman Bob Jones. As a result of all this, the Pecan Bayou Flood Control and Water Supply Project has been included in the omnibus bill."

"While the Congress has yet to act on this bill, I feel sure the project will be retained. We shall hope for passage in the not too distant future."

Callahan County Has 1,806 Persons On Social Security

The 13 per cent increase in Social Security monthly benefits that was effective for February 1968 brought the total for the fifteen county Abilene district to a record high of \$2,790,094 paid to the 40,524 beneficiaries for that month, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager.

Callahan county accounted for 1,806 persons and \$129,551 of that total, 1,026 were retirees

paid \$82,586; their wives and dependent husbands \$11,549; 130 disabled persons and their dependents, \$10,203; 143 children of retired or deceased parents, \$8,574; and 219 widows, dependent parents, and young widows with entitled children in their care, \$16,629.

24 Million Aided
The slightly more than 24 million beneficiaries in the nation topped the \$2 billion mark

in monthly benefits for the first time.

"Although about two-thirds of those receiving social security checks are past age 62," Tuley stated, "most of the changes made by the 1967 amendments were of greater value to the younger people."

He cited the reduction in credits needed for disability benefits for those disabled before age 31 (as low as one and

one-half years of social security coverage if disabled before age 24), and the change that benefits children of deceased, disabled or retired mothers by no longer requiring one and one-half years of coverage during the three years just before death, disability or retirement.

District Agents Here
Representatives of the Abilene district office visit Callahan County regularly, sched-

ule posted in all post offices in the area, and Tuley suggests that anyone who believes the 1967 amendments have made him eligible for benefits should see the social security representative on his next visit.

Coleman County received \$177,629 for 2,543 recipients, and Eastland County had 4,902 sharing \$362,703. In Brown County \$374,618 was apportioned to 5,246 recipients.

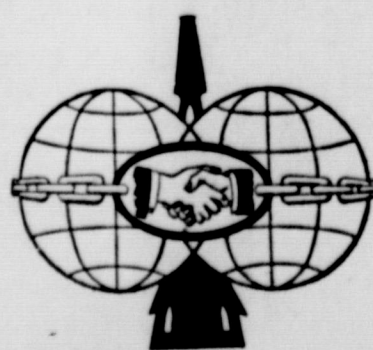

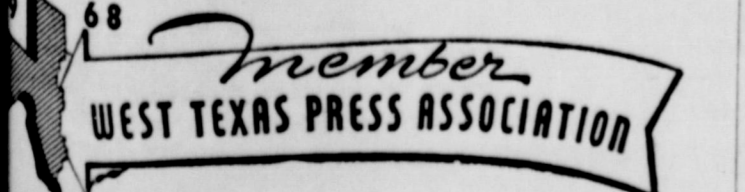

County Loses Third Of Cotton Acreage

Callahan County lost 37.3 per cent of acreage in cotton harvested to that planted last year according to a report by Rolling Plains Cotton Growers. Last year 3,790 acres were planted to the crop, but only 2,380 acres were harvested.

Only 540 bales (500 pound gross weight) were produced in 1967, and average yield was only 190 pounds per acre, compared with 156 in 1966.

Cole County fared somewhat better with only a 10.6 per cent loss in harvest-planted ratio, and 3,730 bales were ginned from the 16,000 acres harvested.

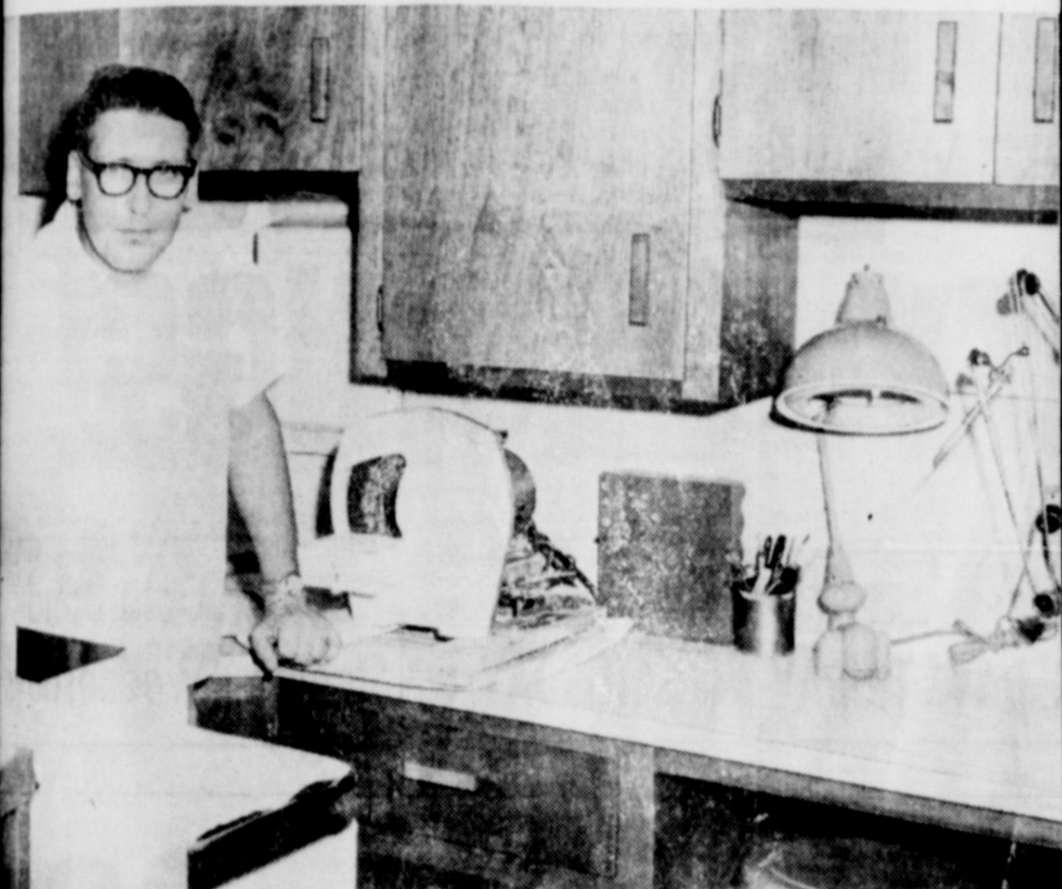
