Voters Approve Tax Hike Nearly 2 To 1

Callahan County voters gave their commissioners court a vote of confidence Saturday in overwhelmingly approving a tax raise, which all commissioners and the county judge had openly supported. The majority was nearly two to one.

The 30-cent boost had been asked by members of the court as a necessary increase in county revenues.

A total of 637 persons balloted in the election with 415 voting for the raise and 222 against it. Heaviest majority for the proposal was in Cross Plains, where 76 percent of the votes favored the increase.

Box totals were: Baird 141 for, 63 against; Cross Plains, 90 for, 28 against; Clyde, 80 for, 70 against; Putnam, 38 for, 33 against; Eula, 28 for, 14 against;

Oplin, 26 for, 7 against; Denton, 6 for, 5 against; absentee, 6 for, 2 against.

County Commissioners had sent letters to voters last week explaining the need for the tax hike, saying that the increased operation and maintenance costs of roads and bridges, development of local school systems, oil depletion and reduction of county tax revenues from 1951 were reasons for the increase.

The Commissioners Court Monday issued this statement: "We wish to express appreciation for the fine majority given the road tax in Saturday's election, and to thank the news media for assistance in informing the public of the situation. We wish to further thank the many citizens who helped to bring about the needed results."

Burnt Branch Teacher Moves To \$32,000 Job

A 19-year-old youngster who taught school at Burnt Branch in 1934 for \$72 a month has been made Texas commissioner of higher education at a salary of \$32,000 annually. He is Dr. Bevington A. Reed, a native of Cisco.

Reed, 52, will succeed Dr. J. K. Williams, who resigned to become vice-president of the University of Tennessee.

Williams and Reed were young Marine combat officers together in the South Pacific during World War II, and Williams handpicked Reed last year as No. 2 man and recommended him as his successor.

Before coming to the coordinating board last August, Reed was academic dean for four years at Mankato State College, Minn., and later chancellor of the Minnesota State College Board.

L. L. Montgomery, who was chairman of the board of trustees at Burnt Branch that hired Reed, recalls he was a particularly bright young man and that he served as principal of the school. The other teacher was Miss Avis Cooper.

Reed roomed at the home of Mr. and Mrs. S. O. Montgomery and walked to school each morning with John D.

Montgomery, who was one of his students.

County Superintendent L. C. Cash checked his records Tuesday morning and found that Reed received \$72 per month (based only on months actually taught) during his first year at Burnt Branch but was given a \$2 per month increase for the second year, which ended in the spring of 1936.

Lebanese Student Crash Lands Here

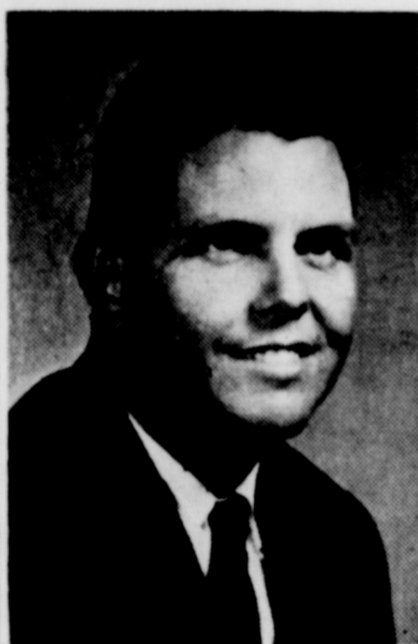

Polio Vaccinations Scheduled Sunday

Plans were being completed yesterday for polio vaccinations and booster shots to be given at Cross Plains High School cafeteria Sunday afternoon, July 21, from 1:30 until 6.

The local Chamber of Com-

merce is sponsoring the project which is being administered by Dr. Carl J. Sohns, city health officer, and the State Department of Public Health. Vaccines are being provided by the state and local expenses are to

be met by contributions and the sponsoring organization. Volunteers will handle registration and assist in administering vaccines.

The following recommendations are made by local and state health officials:

1. Vaccination by two oral doses of polio vaccine for all persons from age 6 weeks to 40 years who have not been previously vaccinated, or did not get the complete series of three doses when given in community-wide program about 5 years ago. The second dose will be offered in 8 weeks to complete their vaccination.

2. Pre-school boosters to children age 5 to 6 who were vaccinated in infancy.

4. Booster doses are not recommended for persons age 20-40 who have previously had the complete vaccination series. Since persons over 40 years of age are considered to have built up immunity they are not urged to take the vaccine, but may do so if they wish.

Persons not sure about whether they have had complete vaccination may take complete vaccination now.

Measles vaccine will be offered in about four weeks, and is to be given to all children nine months of age who have not had the measles vaccine or regular (red) measles. Present plans are for measles vaccine to be given at the office of City Health Officer, Dr. Carl J. Sohns on Aug. 20 and 21.

FM Road Contract Due In September

Cottonwood Activities, Past And Future, Told

The Rev. and Mrs. Fugit of Abilene, area missionary, were at the Baptist Church Sunday morning. He brought an interesting and inspiring sermon. He told of going to the tiny island of Saint Kitts while in the Far East. The natives there are eager to hear of Christ. A great leader there is begging for Christian teachers. The island is only eight miles wide and possibly 40 or 50 miles long. It is heavily populated.
