## Clyde Squad Whips Local LL Stars 14-4

Tight defense and superb pitching spoiled Cross Plains All-Stars hopes of obtaining a second consecutive Area III championship Friday at Clyde as the county's westside All-Stars posted a 14-4 victory.

Clyde All-Star Glendall Barr imposed his will over the game local athletes in early innings, and his teammates backed him up with almost flawless fielding.

### Clyde Builds Lead

Not only was Barr's pitching superlative, but he began the Clyde scoring onslaught with a solo home run in the first inning. His two-out, circuit clout came on a three and two pitch which cleared the center field fence. Next batter, Johnny York, also scored after an error and a fielder's choice.

In the next two innings the hosts built a 12-0 lead before Cross Plains nipped Barr for a run in the fourth frame. Roger Crawford got a lead-off walk, and stole second. He moved to third on Brad Bowden's single and scored on a single by Ricky Kirkham. Clyde retaliated with a pair of markers in the last of the canto.

### Cross Plains Rallies

Both sides went down in order in the fifth, and Cross Plains

rallied for three runs in the top half of the sixth inning. Bowden began the fireworks with a one-out, solo home run to center field. Next batter Lynn Tatom was on via an error. After a strikeout, Jimmy Bates singled, and Calvin Corley got aboard on an error to load the bases. Rex Mayes singled Tatom home, and Bates scored on a fielder's choice ball hit by Eddy Wyatt. On Jerry Lewis's fielder's choice Corley was caught trying to score to end the game.

Cross Plains claimed six hits off Barr who went the distance, but eight locals went down on strikes. Three Cross Plains hurlers tried to check Clyde. Corley, starter and loser, was charged with eight runs on three hits, but whiffed three in two and one-third innings. Crawford came on in the third for one-third inning, and he was charged with four runs on three hits. Bowden finished the game, two and one-third innings, allowing two runs on two hits and striking out four.

Cross Plains was managed by Lester Wyatt, and Audrey Purvis was the coach.

Clyde will advance to the District 28 tournament at Breckenridge, and will play Coleman at 8 p.m. Thursday.

Ever hear of an expectant grandfather sending instructions for the attending obstetrician to give his first grandchild an extra firm whack across the seat?

John Purvis did just that, but circumstances seemed to warrant his unusual request.

He had been sitting up with his father, a patient in a Brownwood hospital for several days, and came home late Sunday to get a night's sleep. His wife, Janet, a registered nurse, replaced him at her father-in-law's bedside in Brownwood.

Along about midnight John's daughter, Mrs. Pat Batten (Barbara), who was staying with her parents while awaiting arrival of the stork, awakened her dad and said she would have to go to the hospital in a few hours. John telephoned his wife in Brownwood to start toward home to accompany Barbara to an Abilene hospital, and that he'd head for Brownwood to replace her there.

They met near Cross Cut and exchanged a few words, the last of which were John's: "Janet, tell the doctor to whack that young'un extra hard for costing me a night's sleep."

The child was born Monday at 1:30 a.m., a little girl of six pounds and 11 and three-fourths ounces, and has been named Brooke Elizabeth. She and the mother are doing splendidly. The father is in military service, stationed in Gulfport, Miss.

## Ex - Burkett Girl With Ph D Directing Summer Institute

Dr. Zenobia Verner, a former Burkett girl, is presently directing a summer institute in bilingualism for teachers of Mexican-American children at Midland.

The institute is an activity of Texas Technological University at Lubbock, where Dr. Verner, the daughter of Mrs. Clyde Brown, is a member of the faculty.

Twenty teachers from schools in Region XVIII are participating in the four-week program sponsored by the West Texas

Education Center headquartered at Midland.

Emphasis will be on teaching English as a second language. Dr. Verner said, in "an effort to arm teachers with knowledge of how to reach the Mexican-American child and to provide materials that will make the task possible."

Dr. Verner is a graduate of Burkett High School and holds a bachelor's degree from Colorado State College, a master's from Sul Ross and her doctor's from Texas Tech.

## Menace Of Screwworm Imperils Herds Of Area

County Agent Jerry Lackey has sounded an alert for local farmers and ranchers to be on the lookout for screwworms.

First case for the county this year was discovered last week by Buster Hatchett, on his ranch east of Baird. Lackey said that the Texas Animal Health Department flew in 10,000 sterile flies and released them in a 10 mile area surrounding the Hatchett ranch as a protective measure.

Extremely wet weather is believed to have hindered screwworm control and 10,000 cases have been reported in Texas during 1968 as compared with less than 100 this time last year. The Department of Animal Health has informed the County

Agent's office that the screwworm eradication program is in more serious trouble now than it has been since the year of its initiation in 1963.

Lackey encourages all ranchers to treat all wounds on livestock with a recommended screwworm smear. The Department of Animal Health recommends that ranchers use Corral or Korlon on routine spraying programs, and Lackey stated that a sample of all worm cases should be sent to the Mission Laboratory for identification.

Vials for this purpose can be secured at the County Agents' office or at the ASCS office.

## Two Chiropractors Open Local Clinic

Drs. Galvin Gambill and Melvin Henexon, both of Seymour, will open a chiropractic clinic in Cross Plains Saturday.

It will be housed in the quarters used by Dr. Gambill before he left here in 1958. The address is 157 South Main Street.

Both doctors plan to office here. They have been associated together for a number of years. Dr. Henexon operated a clinic at Knox City and also aided Dr. Gambill in the operation and administration of a larger clinic in Seymour.

**Hunting Season List For Area Revealed**

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has released hunting seasons and bag limits on various types of wildlife for counties which come under the responsibility of that commission.

Mourning dove season in the north zone of the state including Callahan, Coleman, Brown, and Eastland counties, will be held for 60 consecutive days beginning Sept. 1 through Oct. 30. Shooting hours will be from 12 noon CTS or 1 p.m. CDT to sunset each day. A bag limit of 12 per day and 24 in possession has been set.

The above counties, governed by the Possum Kingdom district, are among 28 others which will be regulated by the following seasons and limits.

The deer season is Nov. 9 through Jan. 1 with a bag limit of three deer with no more than 2 buck deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by permit only.

There is no closed season on javelina and squirrels and no bag limit on javelina. However, there is a bag limit of 10 per day and 20 in possession except in Brown and Mills counties where there is no bag limit or possession limit.

Turkeys may be taken Nov. 9 through Jan. 1 except in Palo Pinto County where there is no open season. Bag limit is two turkeys on gobblers or bearded hens.

The quail season is Nov. 9 through Jan. 31 with a 12 per day bag limit and a 36 possession limit.

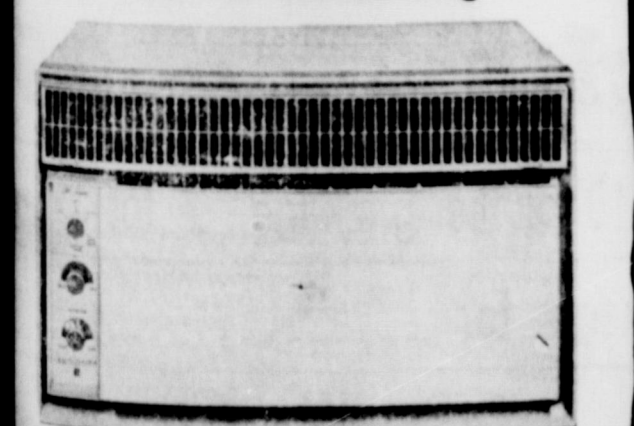

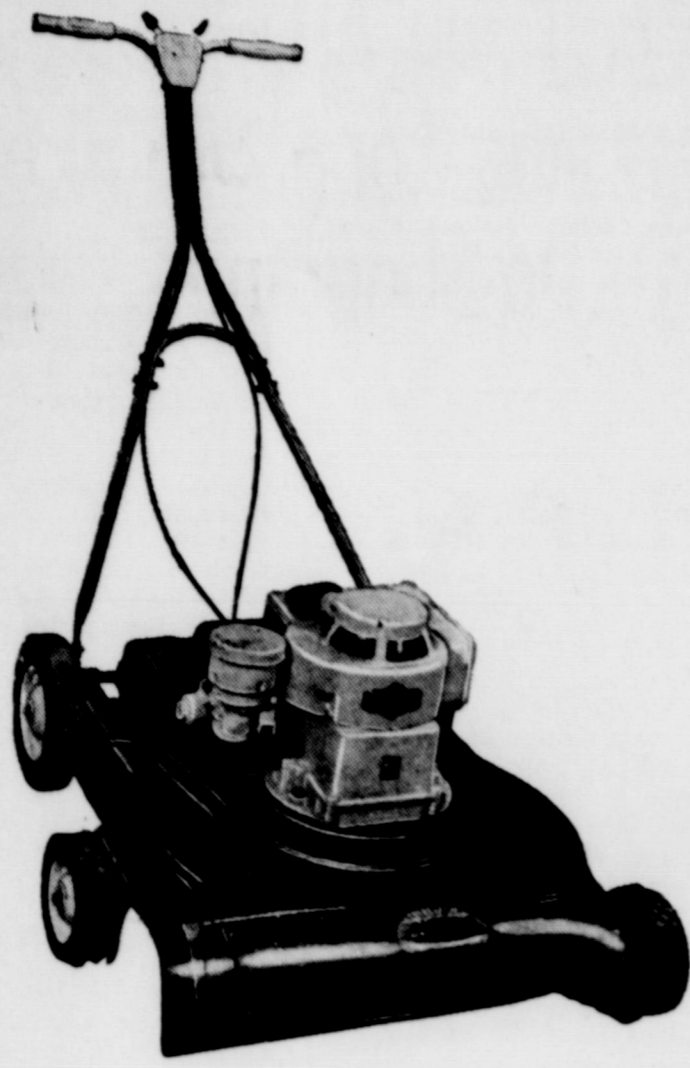
