> Mourning dove season in the north zone of the state including Callahan, Coleman, Brown, Eastland counties, will be held for 60 consecutive days beinning Sept. 1 through Oct. 30. hooting hours will be from 12 noon CTS or 1 p.m. CDT to sunset each day. A bag limit of 12 per day and 24 in possession has been set.

The above counties, governed by the Possum Kingdom district, are among 28 others which will be regulated by the following seasons and limits.

The deer season is Nov. 9 through Jan. 1 with a bag limit of three deer with no more than 2 buck deer. Anterless deer may be taken by permit only.

There is no closed season on javelina and squirrels and no bag limit on javelina. However, there is a bag limit of 10 per day and 20 in possession except in Brown and Mills counties where there is no bag limit or posses-

Turkeys may be taken Nov. 9through Jan. 1 except in Palo Pinto County where there is no open season. Bag limit is two

The quail season is Nov. 9 through Jan. 31 with a 12 per day bag limit and a 36 possession limit.






