Club Steer Tour Scheduled Saturday

County's annual 4-H club steer tour is scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 24. Agent Jerry Lackey will begin at 8:30 a. m. in Baird at 8:30 a. m. He will visit the homes of Callahan County breeders and breeders.

Afternoon program calls for four stops to see 33 more club animals. The tour is to be completed at 4:30.

VANDALS WARNED BY CITY COUNCIL

Mayor Doyle Burchfield reports that the City Council has authorized him to warn that persons — regardless of age — found to be guilty of vandalism within the city limits will be prosecuted to full extent of the law.

The mayor advises that newly-installed street signs have been torn down and that mail boxes have been pushed over. In more than one case there was evidence to support belief that an automobile was used to make the vandalism easier.

Cross Cut Lady With Rifle Routs Prowlers

Two elderly sisters, who live five miles southeast of Cross Cut, successfully withstood prowlers who broke into their home and threatened their lives early Monday morning.

Mrs. Jennie Stone, who has lived on the place off and on

for about 30 years, said she heard someone on the front porch shortly before 3 a. m. and that she quietly called to her sister, Miss Dora (Dode) Martin, who was sleeping near by and told her to hide.

The prowler tried the front

door and found it locked. He then began circling the house, shining a flashlight in all windows. As he came to the bedroom windows the light searched for occupants, but both sisters were hidden from view. Mrs. Stone's car, though, was in

the garage and other evidence pointed to the women being inside the house.

The prowler returned to his car which was parked in front of the house, both headlights pointed into the yard, and talked with an occupant of the vehicle. He got inside and the car started to leave, but after a short distance turned and came back. This time both occupants went to the back door and Mrs. Stone, who in the meantime had loaded a rifle, moved to a place in hiding close to where they were cutting a screen.

One man came on to the porch and was just entering the kitchen as Mrs. Stone thrust the rifle barrel around the corner. The invader screamed, jumped backward and said: "Lady, I'll shoot you — head off." He made no effort to do so, though, and beat a fast retreat to the parked car.

It left in such a hurry that tire marks burned vegetation and left clear prints across a barrow ditch.

Mrs. Stone hurried to the telephone and contacted Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch in Cross Plains, who she said told her to get in touch with the sheriff of Brown County. Instead she called her son, J. W. (Dub) Stone, who lives in Brownwood, and he got Deputy Jerry Cowan and they sped to the scene.

George Wright and O. B. Byrd, both of whom had been called by Mrs. J. W. (Ondelia) Stone arrived soon thereafter and extensive tracking was done. As a result officers now have rather definite opinions of the type of car used, the size of the prowlers' feet and tires on the vehicle.

Mrs. Stone, who admits to having been frightened but who officers say acted with extreme calmness, believes, too, that she can identify the voice that threatened to kill her. Her son explained Monday afternoon that his mother is no stranger to the use of a rifle and handles one well. As a precaution, though, she has been supplied with a hand gun and still another protective step was being arranged, the details of which are not being told.

The early morning occurrence was reminiscent to Cross Cut area residents of a happening there June 13, 1934, when two elderly ladies — Mrs. Lige DeBusk and Mrs. Abbie Hounshell — were beaten and robbed by a man who later served a term in Texas penitentiary for the crime. He was charged with having stolen \$40.

Ford Sees School Enrollment Of 500

An enrollment of 500 is predicted at Cross Plains schools, where a new term begins Monday morning.

Superintendent Wayne Ford said yesterday that indications are that about the same number of students will be on hand as finished the term in May. "We had 500 as school closed and will likely reach that number within a week or so of the upcoming session," he said.

A shotgun start is scheduled to begin elimination play Saturday morning at 8 o'clock. Losers of the 18-hole matched contests will play in consolation bracket during the 27-hole medal play Sunday. It will also be a shotgun start at 8 a. m.

Prizes totaling \$1,500 will be up for grabs. Winners of each

flight will receive a set of fine quality irons, and runners-up will be awarded a set of top quality woods. Consolation bracket winners in each flight will get a quality golf bag, and runners-up may select \$15 worth of golf balls.

All local persons wishing to play in the event are asked to enter early, and a special invitation is extended to Lakewood linksters to participate. "If persons wishing to play cannot shoot a qualifying round, entry may be made by telephoning the scores to the Center," Needham said.

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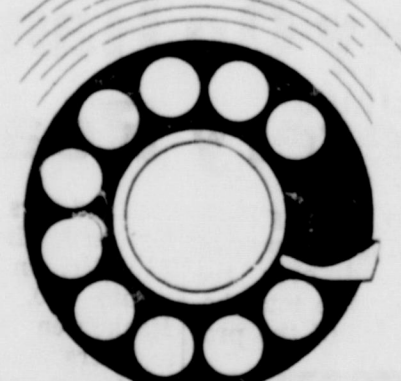


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Jesse Youngblood Is Buried At Cisco

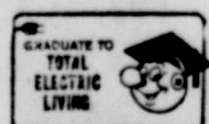

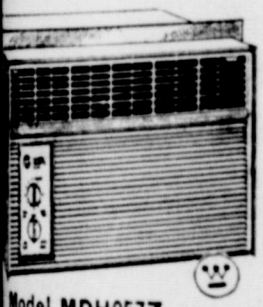
