465 Students Heed First School Bell Here Monday

A new term got off to a snappy start at Cross Plains schools Monday morning with classes, buses and all campus activities meeting schedules with clock-like precision.

First day enrollment in the local system was two less than a year ago. Superintendent Wayne Ford said the headcount was 465, as compared with 467 in 1967. A number of other students are expected to enroll later this week.

Of the 465 on hand Monday morning, 294 are in elementary grades — a decrease of 13 over last year — and 171 are high schoolers, an increase of 11 over the same date in 1967.

Largest class in school is the eighth grade, which has 61. Other enrollment figures by grades are: first, 24; second, 39; third, 35; fourth, 28; fifth, 29; sixth, 38; seventh, 40; fresh-

men, 47; sophomores, 42; juniors, 41; seniors 41. The school lunchroom served 326 noon meals Monday, 31 less than on the opening day of school last year.

Next Monday is Labor Day,

and will be observed as a holiday by Cross Plains schools. After that the next holiday will be Thanksgiving, which comes Nov. 28.

"We are particularly pleased with the way students and teach-

ers began the program of work Monday morning," said Ford, "things went off so smooth that it seemed we'd been underway several weeks; there was a minimum of confusion and lost motion."



A RECORD SUNFLOWER? It appears very likely that Mr. C. G. Burkett, 79, of Burkett may have grown a record sunflower this year. First Amendment Explained

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which will be explained weekly in the order in which they appear on the official ballot to be voted Nov. 5. These analyses are intended to be unbiased.)

The first proposed amendment which you will vote FOR or AGAINST, reads as follows:

"Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees

Retirement System."

Proponents point out that in the modern concept of employment, pensions are an indispensable complement of wages and as they are earned and contractual by nature, not free gifts, it is important that public employees have confidence in the perpetuity of the retirement system. By establishing the Employees Retirement System of Texas as a constitutional agency as proposed by this amendment, public employees will have greater assurance that the administering agency will be permanent.

While adequate safeguards for funds are available for investments are included in the proposed amendment, under its terms, it is still possible for the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System to place funds where greater returns on investment can be realized.

First "practice game" will be against Roscoe's Plowboys at McMurry College in Abilene Thursday, Aug. 29. Cowan said that starting time will be about 5 p.m. Cisco High School Lobos will be in Buffalo Stadium Friday, Sept. 6, at 7 o'clock.

Twenty returning lettermen are pacing the pre-season workouts which have been cut to one-a-day this week because of school opening. The first week Buff gridders met practice sessions twice daily. The practices this week have been moved back to 6 p.m. to avoid the heat. Conditioning and polish drills will continue each week-day, with exception of the two scrimmage dates, until first regular season game with Eastland on Sept. 13.

The 38-member 1968 Bisons are composed of 10 seniors, 9 juniors, 11 sophomores and 8 freshmen.

Fans are welcome to watch regular practice sessions, too, according to Cowan.

Ex-Local Man Heads Ed Center In Abilene

Newell H. Odell, native of Callahan County and former school superintendent in Cross Plains, has been named as executive director of the Region 15 Education Center in Abilene.

The new director, who resigned the superintendency of the Hurst-Euless-Bedford school district to accept the position, is a graduate of Moran High School, Howard Payne College in Brownwood and Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. He served as superintendent of schools here during the school years of 1950-51 and 1951-52.

The educational facility which Odell will head serves 18 West Texas counties, and began operations last fall. The appointment was announced last week.

Scranton Boy Missing; Neighbors Mystified

An extensive search for Mike Stuart, 17-year-old Scranton community youth, had produced no results late Tuesday.

The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Stuart, has been missing since noon Sunday, when he left home with two coon dogs to spend an afternoon in the woods between Scranton and Interstate Highway 20 to the north.

R. D. Boland, manager of Pioneer Farmers Cooperative, who knows the youth, having employed him at his farm near the Stuart place, said, "I can't imagine what happened to him; I am deeply worried."

Boland joined in search for the youth Monday afternoon and evening. He reported Tuesday morning that the hunt was continuing with men on horseback, two airplanes and the National Guard all joining in.

The boy left home with no water or food. He carried a small hatchet, a flashlight and pocket knife but no gun. Neither he nor his dogs have been seen since.

He is thought to have been carrying money from a pay check, probably cashed Saturday. It amounted to around \$50.

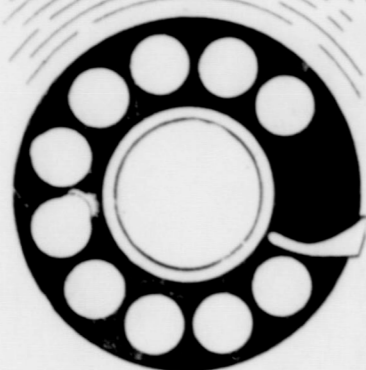

Members of the rural division of the Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department helped battle a large grass fire between Rowden and Admiral late Tuesday afternoon of last week.

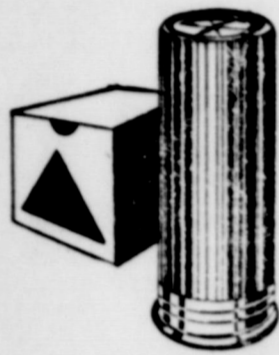

4 Changes In 1969 Program For Wheat

The federal government's 1969 wheat program is said to be similar to those in recent years except for about four major changes. J. C. Earp, manager of the ASCS office in the courthouse at Baird, describes the new program as follows:

"The wheat allotment notice you just received is the amount planted for 1969 and be in compliance with program provisions. In addition to planting within this acreage you will be required to divert an acreage equal to 15% times the farm allotment. The diverted acreage has been taken from the allotted acreage before the notice was mailed and does not have to be subtracted from the wheat allotment. Under the 1969 program you may divert additional acreage and receive a diversion payment on the larger diversion not to exceed the farm allotment. Small farms with an allotment of not more than 21.7 acres may divert the entire allotment. Larger farms may divert up to one-half of their allotment plus the required diversion, plant the other half and receive certificate payments. Again in 1969 you can substitute wheat for feed grain on a farm if you sign up and participate in both programs. If your farm has an oat or barley base, you can upon request, substitute wheat for oats or barley. When you choose to do this 15% of the oat or barley base must also be diverted. No diversion or price support payments will be made under this provision. You will also be required to participate in the feed grain program if the farm has a feed grain base or plant no feed grain if the farm has no base."

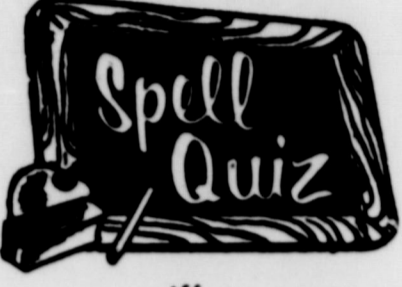
