Mrs. Flowers is shown standing on a chair to cut the pods on the tallest stalk, nine feet, of the nine stalks which have supplied the neighborhood with the vegetable. "We're going to save pods for seed from the tallest plant," Mrs. Flowers says, "it's too tall for us to gather anyway." The gardeners typed the okra "white", and several plants range up to just over seven feet tall.

Strange Cattle Disease Spreads Into Echo Area

Another case of leptospirosis has been reported in livestock owned by R. T. Watson. The recent outbreak is more than 10 miles from the pasture east of Cross Cut, where five infected animals were found earlier. Two calves died and three others are sick.

The latest case, also in a calf, was found in another of Watson's pastures over the weekend. It is four miles east of Echo. Mother of the sick calf was formerly in the pasture near Cross Cut, but had been moved several months ago, shortly before the calf was born.

Watson reports that the latest calf to contract the disease shows the usual symptoms of stiffness but in addition its hooves have grown like on a

founded animal. This causes him to speculate that cases of "grass founder" in horses, which have not been uncommon the past year, may have actually been leptospirosis.

Watson is vaccinating animals in all his pastures now. He reports that veterinarians say that this must be done every six months until his places are cleaned up and then it should be done once each year thereafter.

Veterinarians tell Watson that many cases of leptospirosis do not prove fatal, but that surviving animals become carriers of the disease for a period of about 12 months.

Baird-Buff Grid Feud Flares

Friday will be the day of the year when relations between Cross Plains and Baird will not be in the usual friendly, amicable customary manner.

That is the date Cross Plains Buffaloes and Baird Bears tangle for the 38th time on the gridiron. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium.

Team Comparisons

The two Callahan County Class A teams have met only one mutual foe, Class AA Eastland, and both have suffered humiliating defeats. Cross Plains fell 57-12, and Baird bowed 58-0.

Offensive and defensive showings favor the Buffaloes slightly. The Thundering Herd has scored 69 points in posting a 2-2 season mark, while the Bears have notched 34 points in recording a 1-3 mark. Defensively both units have been liberal. Cross Plains has allowed 102 points in the four outings, an average of 25.5 per tilt, and Baird has given up 161, a mean of 40.2, in a like number of contests.

Similar statistics were owned by each team last year, however, when only a superlative fourth quarter rally by Buffaloes nixed an upset minded Bear crew 24-18.

Baird poses a strong threat with three top-quality running backs Franklin Alexander, who weighs 185, is a powerful runner and speed is available in Donny Rowe, 180. Larry Shelnutt, 170, is also a capable ball carrier. Quarterback Billy Collins, 150-pounder, lacks experience, but is improving rapidly. All are returning lettermen.

The Bear line lacks depth, but the first-line forward wall is experienced with exception of tackle slots. Veterans are available at both guard and end positions and center. Mike Watson and John Lambert are the lettermen guards; Chris West and Bryan Lee Reese are the ends and Sonny Collins is at center.

4 Bisons Hurt

Four Bisons are sidelined by injuries. Starting tackle David Merryman has been ordered out of action for three more weeks with a slight concussion. Broken bones have benched squadmen Jesse Moon, Wayne Bishop and Robert Lewis. The squad otherwise, Coach Les Cowan has indicated, should be ready Friday.

37-Game Record

Buffaloes and Bears have met 37 times on the gridiron with two games being played in 1925 and 1945. Herds have won 18 games, and Baird has triumphed 16 times. Three games have ended in ties.

Proposed Change In State Constitution Aired Briefly

Editor's Note: Here is the 10th of 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which will be explained in the order in which they will appear on the official ballot to be voted Nov. 5. These analyses are intended to be unbiased.

Number 10 of the proposed amendments which you will vote FOR or AGAINST, reads as follows:

"A Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous with Texarkana."

Proponents of this proposal say that it would be purely local in its effect and would benefit merchants of Texarkana, Tex., which constitutes approximately two-thirds of the Texarkana metropolitan area, without detriment to a majority of those selling cigars and tobacco products in other parts of the state. They point out that revenues lost from the refunds would be minimal, and would allow Texas retailers of cigars and tobacco products in Texarkana, Tex., to compete with those in Texarkana, Ark.

Opponents contend that if this proposal is adopted, merchants in all areas of the state now losing business to out-of-state competitors because of tax inequities would seek equal-competition benefits of this type.

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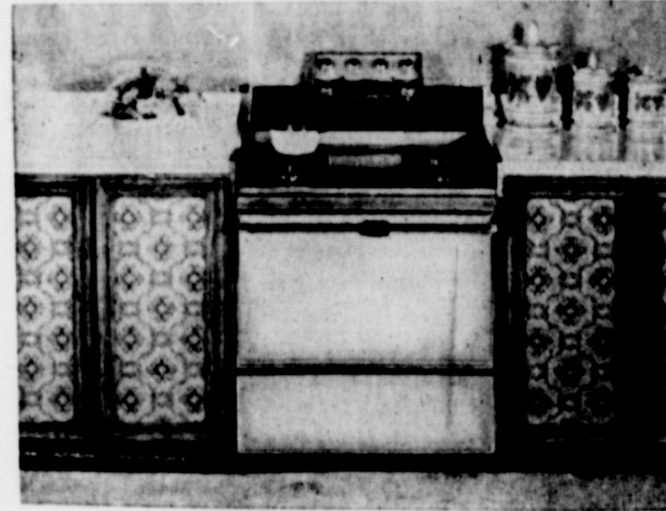

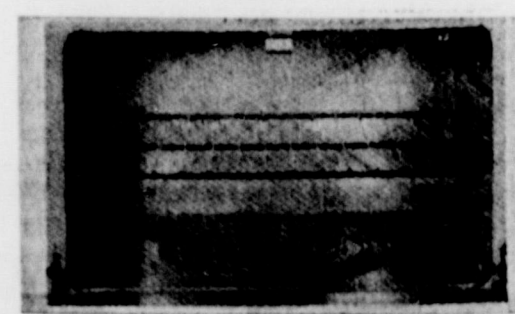

Opening kickoff gave an indication of things to come. Buffalo Tailback Bobby Cowan raced 87 untouched yards with the opening kick to put Cross Plains ahead, a lead never relinquished. The fleet Bison grabbed the ball and followed a fine wall of blocking down the right sideline for the tally. Slotback Leslie Cowan booted the extra point and Buffaloes led 7-0 with only 20 seconds gone in the game.

Buff defensive back Joe Dodds stopped an Indian counter attack with a pass interception

at the Herd's 18. A punt followed, but Buff Guard Deibert Turner pounced on the ball which had bounded from the grasp of an Indian at the Buff 43. The 57-yard drive, plus 11 on a loss, took eight plays with Tailback Cowan going the last three over left tackle. Kicker Cowan again booted the extra point, and Bisons led 14-0 with 2:04 left in the opening period.

Indians Rally

Momentum then swung to Jim Ned. The visitors took the ensuing kick and moved 80 yards for a touchdown. Hard-running Fullback Teddy Herron bounced off a quartet of Buff defenders on his 16-yard scoring scamper. A two-point conversion failed, but it did not deter the Indians. With three minutes left in the second quarter, Indian Herron decreased the deficit to 12-14 with a two-yard blast over the middle. Again a two-point try failed.

Airborne Attack

Buffaloes went to the air lanes and 64 yards and eight plays later Cross Plains scored again. The clincher was a 24-yard pass and run screen beauty from Quarterback Ricky Jones to Left End James McMillan. Jones then passed to Split End Rusty Beggs for the two-point conversion for a 22-12 lead with 31 seconds left.

Cross Plains quickly re-ignited in the second half. Jim Ned was foiled on a fourth down gamble, and Buffs gained possession at the Indian 46. Bobby Cowan climaxed the nine-play drive with a four yard jaunt over left tackle. Jones hit McMillan for the two-point conversion for a 30-12 lead.

Safety Bobby Cowan latched onto a stray Indian aerial after it had been batted into the air returning it 33-yards to the Jim Ned 12 late in the third stanza. A pass to Beggs for seven preceded Jones' five yard spurt into the end zone. Jones then sneaked in for two more points.

The Indians were not through although Cross Plains had mounted a 38-12 edge. Just less than eight minutes deep into the final canto, Indian Left Halfback Rex Miller capped a 68-yard, 15-play drive with a

three yard run. Quarterback Bobby Reeves skirted left end for the two points.

As the Buffalo bench was emptied, Jim Ned mounted the final scoring drive of the night. It carried 50 yards in 13 plays with Miller tallying from the two.

Buff Point Total

The 38 points was the most amassed by a Herd since the 1965 Bisons tallied 40 in blanking Gorman on Oct. 8. The 12-point victory margin was shaded twice last year.

Tailback Cowan was the leading rusher for the second consecutive week. He netted 131 yards in 17 carries for a 7.7 yard average. Leading Bison receiver was End McMillan who snared five for 62 yards.

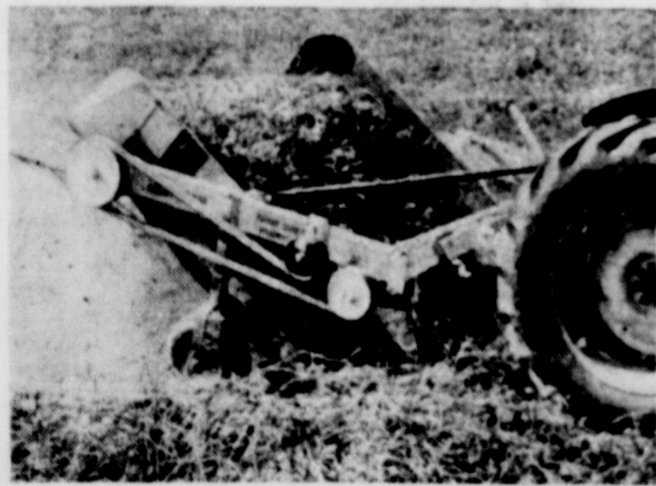

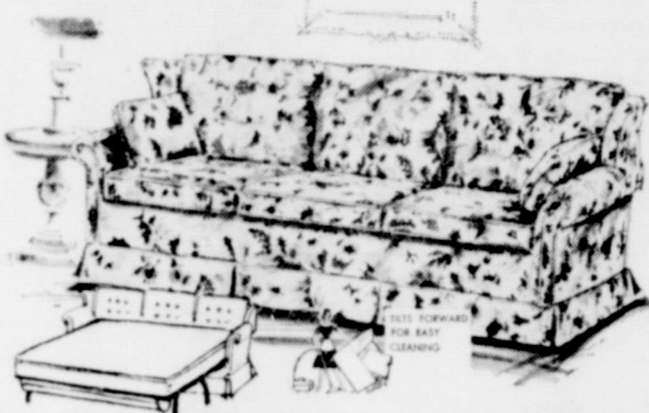
