# 750 Votes Forecast Here Next Tuesday

Tuesday is general election day throughout the nation.

With hotly-contested races all the way from the courthouse to the White House, the greatest turnout of voters in history is forecast.

Cross Plains is expected to poll 750 and Callahan County 3,200.

### Campaigns Heated

Spirited campaigns by Hubert H. Humphrey and Richard M. Nixon, Democratic and Republican standard bearers respectively, have developed seething interest in the quadrennial contest. Added this year, though, is the strong challenge of George Wallace, whose American Party is likely to poll the greatest third party total in history of the United States. The presidential race alone, though, will not be entirely responsible for Tuesday's turnout. Hard campaigns have been waged by candidates all down the ticket, even to the precinct level, and much interest centers on local races.

In Cross Plains voting will take place at the City Hall. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

### Vote Forecast

Mrs. Kilgore said yesterday that she expects to handle 750 votes at the Cross Plains box and that results should be available within one hour after the polls close.

The ballot for Tuesday's election is 10 inches wide and 19 inches long. At the bottom are 14 proposed changes to Texas Constitution. All have been explained in recent issues of the

Cross Plains Review, the final two being summarized on page one of today's edition.

No election party will be held at the newspaper office this year for the reason that most interest will center around the national outcome.

## Summaries Made Of Last 2 Proposed Charter Changes

Editor's Note: Discussed hereunder are the final two amendments proposed for Texas Constitution, the fate of which voters will settle at the polls next Tuesday.

Number 13 reads as follows: "A Constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse."

Proponents point out that 34 states and the District of Columbia, have some form of free port tax legislation. The 16 states, including Texas, without free ports are placed at a disadvantage competitively and are also limited in potential growth as distribution centers for manufacturers and processors.

They say that adoption of the proposed amendment would allow Texas to attract a wealth of new dollars which are now going to states in a more competitive position because of the tax advantage they are able to offer warehousemen distribut-

ing interstate goods. Opponents contend that adoption of this amendment would be just another step in a long series of getting "around" the "equal and uniform" provisions of the Constitution as they relate to taxation.

They say that this could clear the way for inaccurate renditions under the temptation to avoid taxation also on goods which could not be legitimately considered exempt. They contend that it is impractical for the state to give up another source of revenue, when there is a great need for new revenue sources now.

Proposed change number 14 and last on the ballot reads as follows: "A constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

Proponents point out that the proposed amendment merely negates the unintended result

caused by overlap in terms stemming from the 1966 amendment which set the commencing date of a legislator's term of office as the date of convening of a regular session of the legislature. Proposed amendment does not in any way impair the effectiveness of existing restrictions designed to prevent a legislator from resigning to take another government position which was either created or had its emoluments increased while he was a member.

Opponents contend that since Section 18, Article III, was designed to prevent legislators from resigning to take state offices which were created, or the emoluments of which were increased, during the term of office, no change should be made. They argue that any relaxation of this prohibition, even for only a few days as proposed by Amendment No. 14, would set a bad precedent for future legislators.

## About Lady Called Sam

Out around Rowden the name Sam has a feminine connotation. In that community it generally refers to Mrs. Poley Holloway, a little lady soon to be 78, whom friends describe "as pleasant a character as you're likely to encounter."

The late Lewis Nordyke's book, "Nubbin' Ridge," was written about the farm where she was born, long before the author saw the light of day. Her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. A. J. (Nuff) Arvin — married at Cross Cut — moved into the area northwest of Cottonwood when the country was first being settled.

Sam was born there on a frosty morning, two days before Christmas in 1890.

"Back then I never heard anyone refer to that locality as Nubbin' Ridge," she says "however, I must admit the name seems to fit."

She married Poley Holloway Dec. 24, 1913, in Cross Plains.

Nine years later the couple and their little daughter — now Mrs. Roy Thornton — lived on the "prairie," six miles west of Rowden, when a spring tornado blew away the family home. It happened in the middle of the night and none of the four persons inside the dwelling — Mr. Holloway's aged mother was also there — was seriously hurt. The house, though, was demolished and furniture and household belongings littered the countryside. The John Lofton family which lived near by was not so fortunate. Their house was also destroyed and a little girl was killed.

Mr. Holloway died Dec. 7, 1944 and was buried at Belle Plain.

Adjusting to widowhood is described as one of life's greatest transitions but what eases the process for one person may not always work for the next. In Sam's case, though, hard work proved helpful.

"For 13 years, she said, "I continued to run a little string of cattle, did my own fence-mending and the hundreds of other chores which such a job entails."

She offers no panacea to others but reminds that busy

people have little time for self-pity or lamenting.

Sam has seen the Rowden community centered at three separate locations, witnessed the demise of its school and transfer of its churches. She has watched population thinned by changing conditions which sapped the life-blood an agricultural economy. One thing remains constant, she claims, withstanding the ravages of time, that is the bond of affection that binds remaining neighbors of the Rowden area in enduring friendship.

"They're a pretty special bunch of folks," she says, "and I'm fortunate to have spent my life among them."

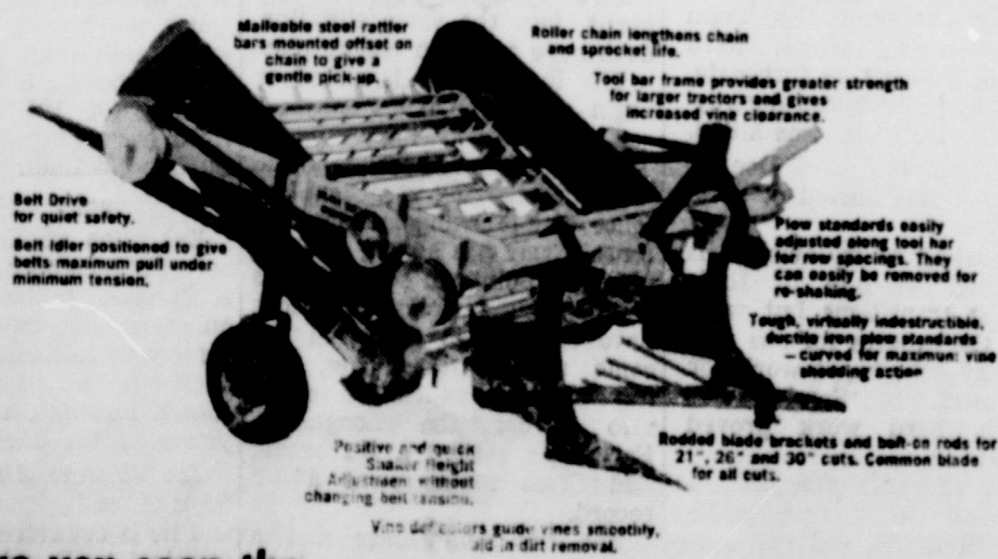

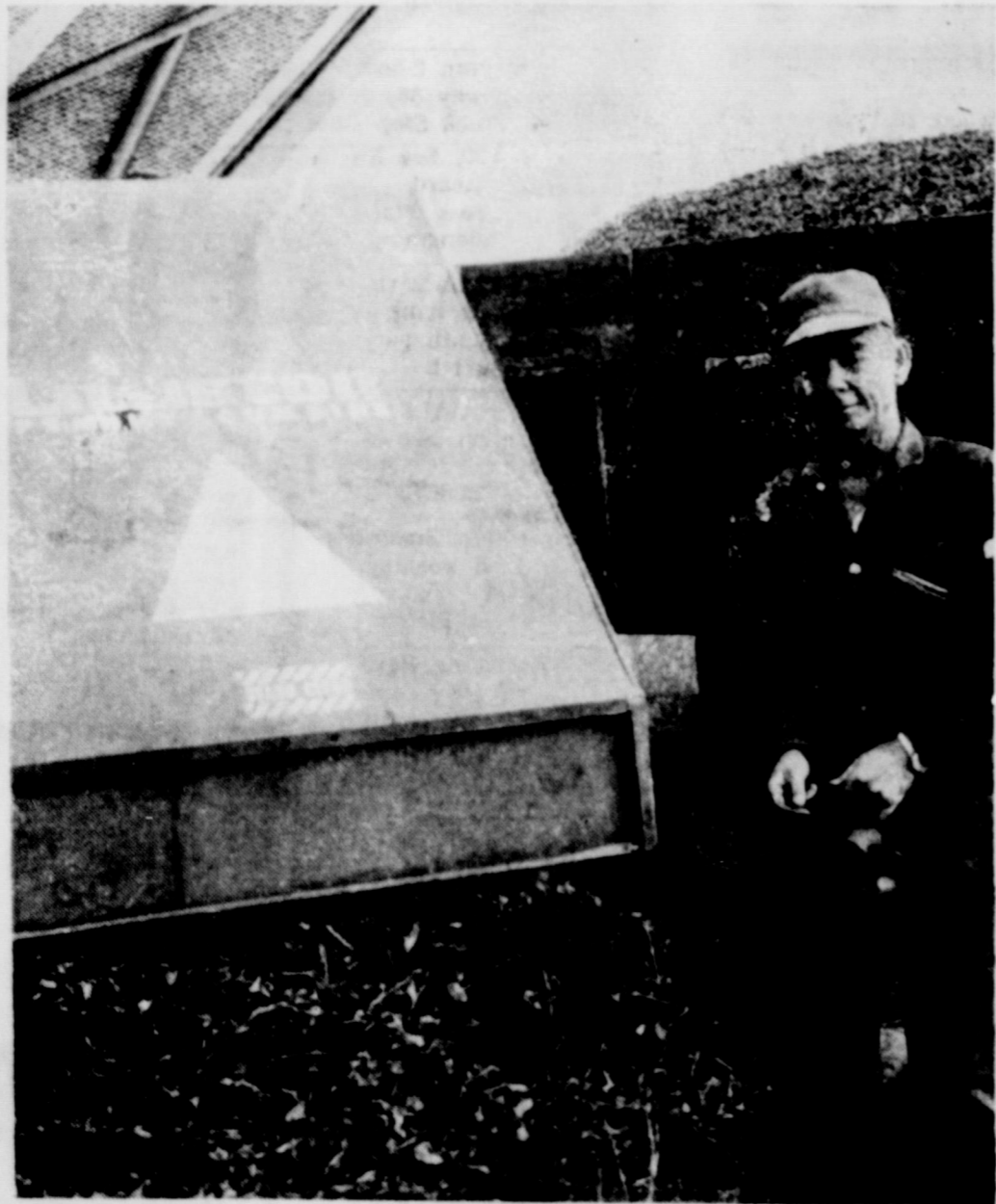
