Dyer, Jr. took the oath as county judge Tuesday presided over the session of Commission-

ers Court immediately following.

The swearing-in ceremony was witnessed by members of the Dyer family and a number of other relatives and friends. The oath was administered by County Attorney James Paul Shanks.

Dyer was elected in the general election Tuesday of last week to fill out the unexpired term of the late Roy Gilbreath, who died June 9. Mrs. Gilbreath had filled in as an interim appointee until a successor could be elected.

The term which Dyer began Tuesday will expire Dec. 31, 1970.

Dyer, who formerly served as Callahan County Democratic Chairman, is a member of one of West Texas' best known families. He is an army veteran and attended Hardin-Simmons University. His immediate family consists of his wife, Patricia, and their two sons and two daughters.

Snow Fails To Stop Big Peanut Harvest

Cross Plains residents arose Friday morning to view an unfamiliar sight. The ground was covered in five inches of snow.

Not in memory of oldest residents had such a blanket of whiteness ever before covered the Cross Plains area so early in the Autumn season. S. F. Bond, official weather observer, said: "I've never seen such a snow this early." He reported it yielded 1.20 inches of moisture.

Following the driest month of the year — 22 of an inch in October — the moisture was especially welcomed by grain farmers, a few of whom have not yet received a stand from seed planted as much as six weeks ago. Total moisture for 1968 now stands at 31.14 inches. With heavy rains the remaining 55 days of the year, '68 could become one of the wettest years in history.

The snow slowed but did not stop peanut harvesting in the Cross Plains area. Drying plants here and Pioneer began catching up with "backlogs" but never suspended operations. Both were continuing to run around-the-clock Monday night.

Estimates were that from 5 to 10 per cent of this year's peanut crop in the Cross Plains area is being field-dried and will move to markets mainly

in sacks. Peanuts handled in this manner by three local concerns, together with those which have gone through drying plants approximated 4,500 tons at midnight Tuesday. Census was that this represented 75 per cent of the 1968 crop, one of the best in history.

When all harvesting is completed it is believed that three local handlers will have moved 5,200 tons, with an average price of about \$250 per ton. This would make value of the crop handled by Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company, Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply, Inc. and Pioneer Farmers Co-Op total \$1,300,000.

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School Here For Gamecock Handlers Gains Wide Fame

If horse racing is the sport of kings, gamecock fighting might be called the pastime of American patriots.

Six men, each from a separate state, comprise Ratliff's first set of students. Other than Dr. Brainard and Frasure they are: Junior Dewey, Brewster, Kansas, rancher, who once won fame as a national champion cowboy rodeo contestant; Ralph Grass, a mechanic from Evanston, Indiana; Lewis Majocha, a brick mason from Guilford, Connecticut, who held the distinction of having come the greatest distance to attend the Cross Plains school; and Tom Heartsill, a Texas educator and rancher from Walnut Springs.

That bit of philosophy was provided Friday by W. D. Brainard, a veterinarian from Pine Bluff, Arkansas, who was in Cross Plains attending Mike Ratliff's first class in the "Care and Culture of Gamecocks". Dr. Brainard revealed that George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, Andrew Jackson and Theodore Roosevelt were all chicken fanciers and followed the sport of rooster fighting.

Although Ratliff's first class is just now nearing graduation, his school is already internationally known. Magazines closely followed by gamecock fanciers around the world have told of the institution in recent issues. Ratliff plans to operate about eight months per year, from November through July, starting a new group every third week.

Bill Joe Frasure, Route 1, Saint Mary's, Ohio, a machinist and also a member of Ratliff's initial class, pointed

out that the American eagle was chosen emblem of this nation by a scant margin of one vote. It barely nosed out the gamecock, which held the admiration of many of the founding-fathers.

"Early day periodicals tell of mains (gamecock fights) being held at the White House," he said.

The six students vary in age from 26 to 48. The average is 39.

Ratliff's spic and span chicken ranch is located on State Highway 36, four miles east of Cross Plains, and bears some resemblance to the well-organized training camp of a national prize-fight contender. More than 2,000 birds were on the grounds when visited by a reporter Friday. From this number Ratliff will eventually cull all but 350 stags and 200 cocks which will go to his customers around the world.

When the school was visited by a reporter Friday, students were asked to write their comments at the end of a brief questionnaire which each filled out. Dr. Brainard seemed to express the consensus when he wrote: "I'm having the best time of my life in this school, down in this great Texas country."

Although the sport of gamecock fighting is legal in a number of states — Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona, Kansas and Oregon, to mention a few — its greatest following is in Asia and islands of the Philippines, is site for many of the world's top con-

test. It is in this area that most of Ratliff's cocks are shipped each year. They go to California by air freight, where health certificates and actual physical condition of the birds are checked before beginning overseas flight.

"I don't think Mike's school will ever be co-educational," jested one of his students Friday.

With 39 years experience in the sport, some say Ratliff has perfected secrets in the early training of gamecocks that give his birds both speed and stamina that is seldom equaled.

Trainees stay in a local motel, where Ratliff reserves accommodations. They take meals at Cross Plains restaurants.

Ratliff has wealthy sportsmen, professional men (both doctors and lawyers) enrolled for future instruction. He follows a rule, though, of no mixed classes and two women

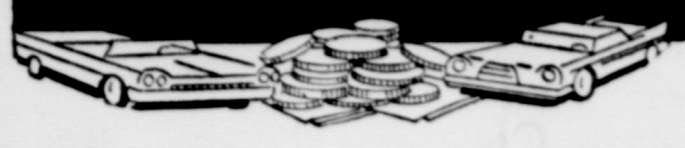

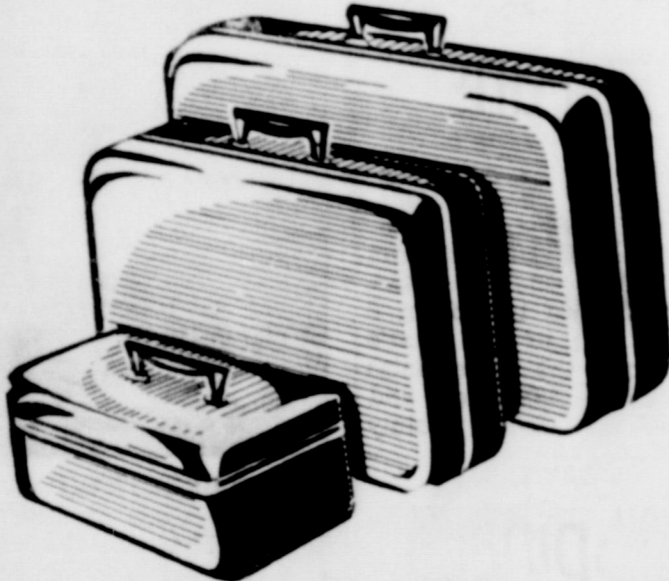

Dragons 'Snow' Buffs 37-0 In Last 9-A Tilt

It was a miserable night for both man and beast Friday as the Bangs Dragons, showing out in front of their fathers on "Dad's Night", whipped Cross Plains Buffaloes 37-0 in a District 9-A contest.

Snow was everywhere, and fog was so thick that from the pressbox players across field and near end zones were only ghostly-grey shapes. The snow on the field was about four inches deep, and yard lines were not visible, although referees had dragged out temporary lines just prior to game time.

Cold, wet hands and slippery ball resulted in numerous fumbles, 29 according to one count although some may have been missed because of inability to see all the field clearly.

First Shutout

The loss, fourth of the season for the Bisons on the road, dropped the Herd's record to 5-4 and 2-2 in 9-A competition. It was the first time in 19 games that the Buffs have been held scoreless. Last time was final game of the 1966 season when Rising Star blanked Cross Plains 26-0.

The loss dropped the Herd to third place in District 9-A behind Goldthwaite and Bangs, however, the latter has one league contest to play.

Quick Start

Bangs lost no time getting out front in the slippery, sloppy snow. End Jackie Ferguson gathered in the opening kick, and he raced 70 yards for a touchdown. Play then settled into a rut of punt and fumble exchanges until early in the second period when Buffalo Leslie Cowan hopped on a Dragon bobble at the Herd's four stopping a Bangs drive which had carried 25 yards.

With 1:10 left in the first half Bangs increased its lead to 12-0 when Tailback Scott Pruet rambled 17 yards after a Buff fourth down, punt attempt went wrong.

Pruet got the Dragons going early in the second half with a 59-yard run, and conversion attempt failed. Later in the third canto Dragon kicker Philip Sheffield attempted a 45-yard field goal which missed, according to officials on the field who could see the goal posts which were obscured by fog looking from the pressbox.

Bangs tallied 19 points in the fourth stanza. Sheffield toed a pair of field goals, 24 yards and 29 yards, and kicked one extra point. Quarterback Bobby Nelson sneaked in for a touchdown from the one after a Buff fumble at the two, and Dragon Roy Martin hit pay with a 29-yard return of an intercepted Buffalo pass.

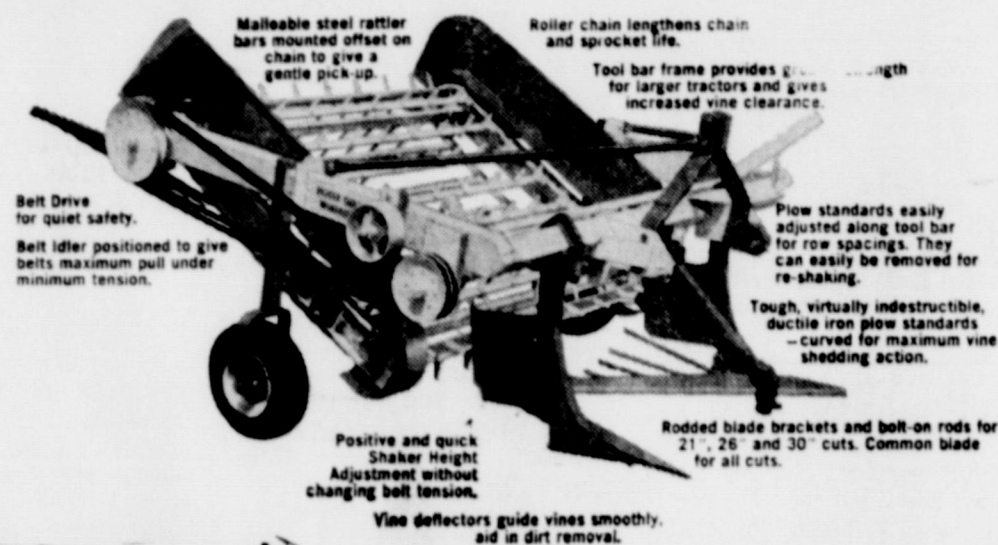

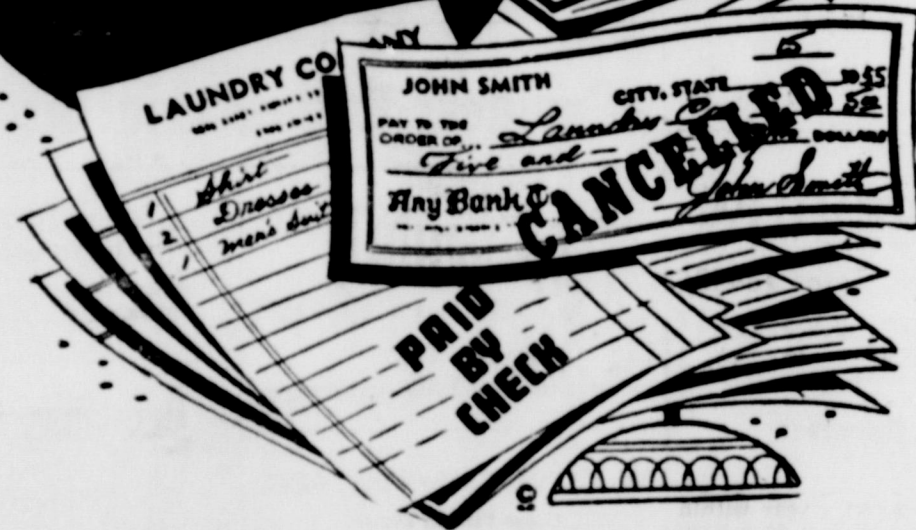

The clipping is reproduced hereunder:

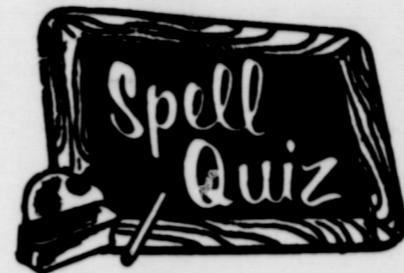
