School Hosting 3-Day Tourney

Cross Plains High School's annual Invitational Basketball Tournament will unfold in Buffalo Gymnasium Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

This year's event is a week earlier than in the past several seasons, occasioned by the affair's knockout by inclement weather in 1967.

A full slate of 16 teams, eight feminine and eight male, will battle for championship in each division. Girls teams sche-

duled to participate are Early, Eula, Rising Star, Talpa, Bangs A and B teams and Cross Plains A and B squads. Boys bracket is composed of Bangs, Comanche B, Early, Eula, Putnam, Rising Star, Talpa and Cross Plains.

No Favorites

No one team in either the male nor female division can be established as a solid favorite.

A six team battle could de-

velop in the girls bracket with only the two B teams pre-judged for ouster. Winner of the opening game, 2:45 p.m. Thursday pitting Rising Star and Eula, could provide a championship finalist.

In boys competition eventual winner is anyone's guess. The three smaller schools participating, Eula, Putnam and Talpa, are perennial powers, and Bangs, Early and Cross Plains should also provide stout competition. Rising Star is not expected to be at full strength because the Wildcats are still involved in football playoffs, and nothing is known about the Comanche reserve team.

Tourney Card

Six games are on tap Thursday and Friday. Play will begin each day at 2:45 p.m. with a girls contest. A boys clash will follow, and the same procedure will continue each day through last game scheduled to start at 9 p.m.

First round eliminations will be completed Friday, and second round action begun. The latter will be finished Saturday morning, beginning at 8:45 p.m. with four games carded.

Four final games, determining consolation, runners-up and kings and queens, will start at 5 p.m. Saturday with girls consolation tilt.

Girls first round pairings Thursday are: Eula vs. Rising Star at 2:45 p.m., Bangs A vs. Early at 5:15 p.m. and Bangs B vs. Cross Plains at 7:45 p.m. Friday will see Talpa take on Cross Plains B at 2:45 p.m.

Initial pairings in the boys bracket are: Eula vs. Rising Star, 4 p.m. Thursday; Comanche B vs. Early, 6:30 p.m. Thursday; Bangs vs. Cross Plains, 9 p.m. Thursday; and Putnam vs. Talpa, 4 p.m. Friday.

Both local varsity units will see action Thursday and Friday regardless of outcome of the initial games.

Consolation winner, runner-up and champion in both girls and boys brackets will be given trophies for efforts. Both boys and girls all-tournament team selections will be revealed in ceremonies immediately following completion of last game.

Snows In November Set New Record Here

December 1968 will be remembered as a record-breaker. The month brought 5.03 inches of snow to the Cross Plains area and was the wettest since 1963. Most of all, though, was the amount of snow received here in the month. "White covered the ground on separate occasions. Old-timers do not recall Cross ever having had three before Christmas.

Cross Plains barely missed a snow of the present on Monday night. State Representative Burke Musgrove flew over this city at 11 p.m. Monday said that he encountered a heavy snow storm. The moisture for the first time of the year now to-

tal 34.79 inches. Normal rainfall for Cross Plains is about 24 inches a year.

Last week's snow and rain delayed the remnants of peanut harvesting, but was a real boon to small grain crops and winter pasturage. Prospects for wheat and oat yields are exceptionally good at this time, farmers say. Wild rye and winter grasses are beginning to enliven pastures.

The current year is certain to go into the record books as one of the wettest in history. If as much as 3.80 inches of moisture falls during December the year's aggregate will surpass that of 38.58, making it the wettest year since 1941 when more than 40 inches was recorded here.

Musgrove Says He Will Quit Legislature If Cross Plains Loses Its School System

"If Cross Plains schools are consolidated out of existence by enactment of conditions of the Governor's Committee on Public Education, I promise you that I will resign from the Legislature," State Representative Burke Musgrove told a meeting of local business and professional men at a luncheon in basement of the First United Methodist Church Tuesday at noon.

"Some provisions of the committee's report are good," Musgrove said, "but to abolish such fine schools as you have in Cross Plains would be disastrous."

The State Representative said that he did not believe the report should even be taken up

in a regular session of the legislature.

"It is too broad to be hurriedly considered," he declared.

Musgrove, who was recently re-elected to a second term with a majority of more than 85 per cent of the votes in his district, reminded business and professional men that he is not unaware of the contribution to good citizenship made by schools such as Cross Plains.

"I consider Cross Plains schools as good as can be found most anywhere in Texas," he said.

He stressed that such a force for good and developer of responsible citizenship should be enlarged, not abridged or abolished.

"I will champion your cause in the State House," the representative emphasized.

Musgrove had been invited here to talk with local people regarding provisions being advocated by the Governor's Committee on Public Education.

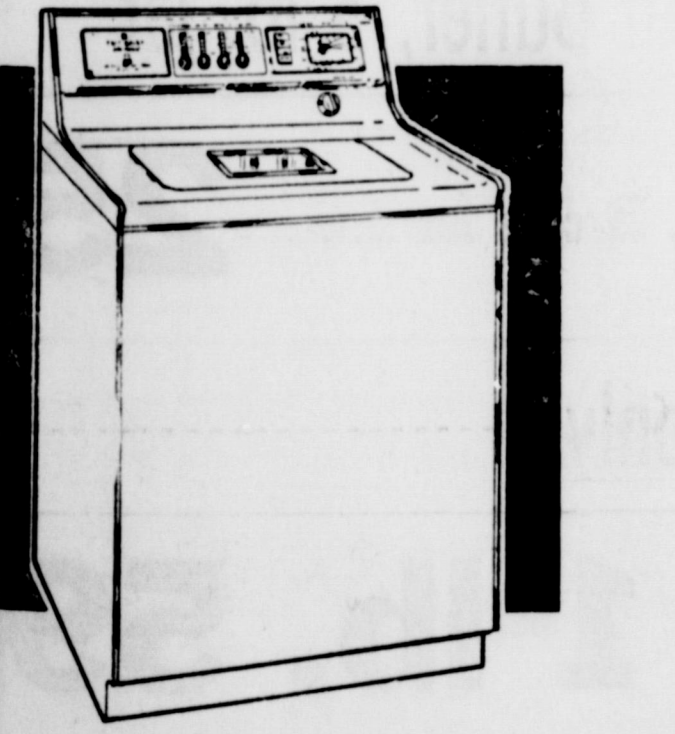

Callahan County farmers may buy or lease cotton acreage from other producers within the county and the cotton may be transferred by a farm owner to another of his places. No allotments, though, may be moved outside the county.

ASCS offices advise that producers who have released their acreage the last two years should be especially watchful. Where an allotment was released and not planted for two years and the allotment will not be planted in 1969, the acreage must be leased to another producer prior to Dec. 31 to protect the allotment.
