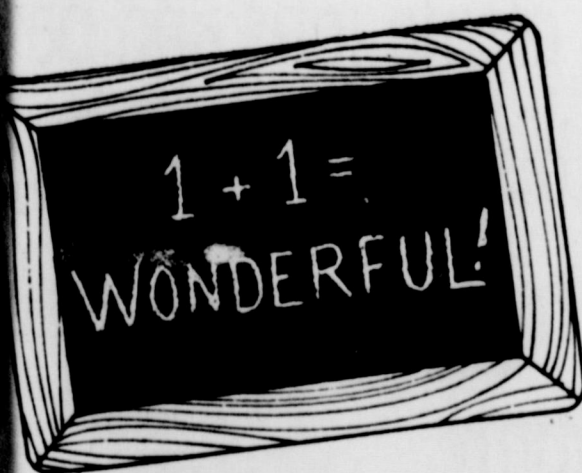

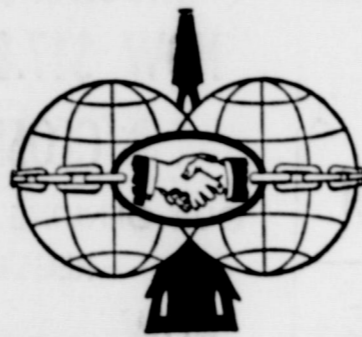

On weather records maintained by S. F. Bond, official observer here, the wettest year was an odd numbered one, 1957, when 38.58 inches fell here.



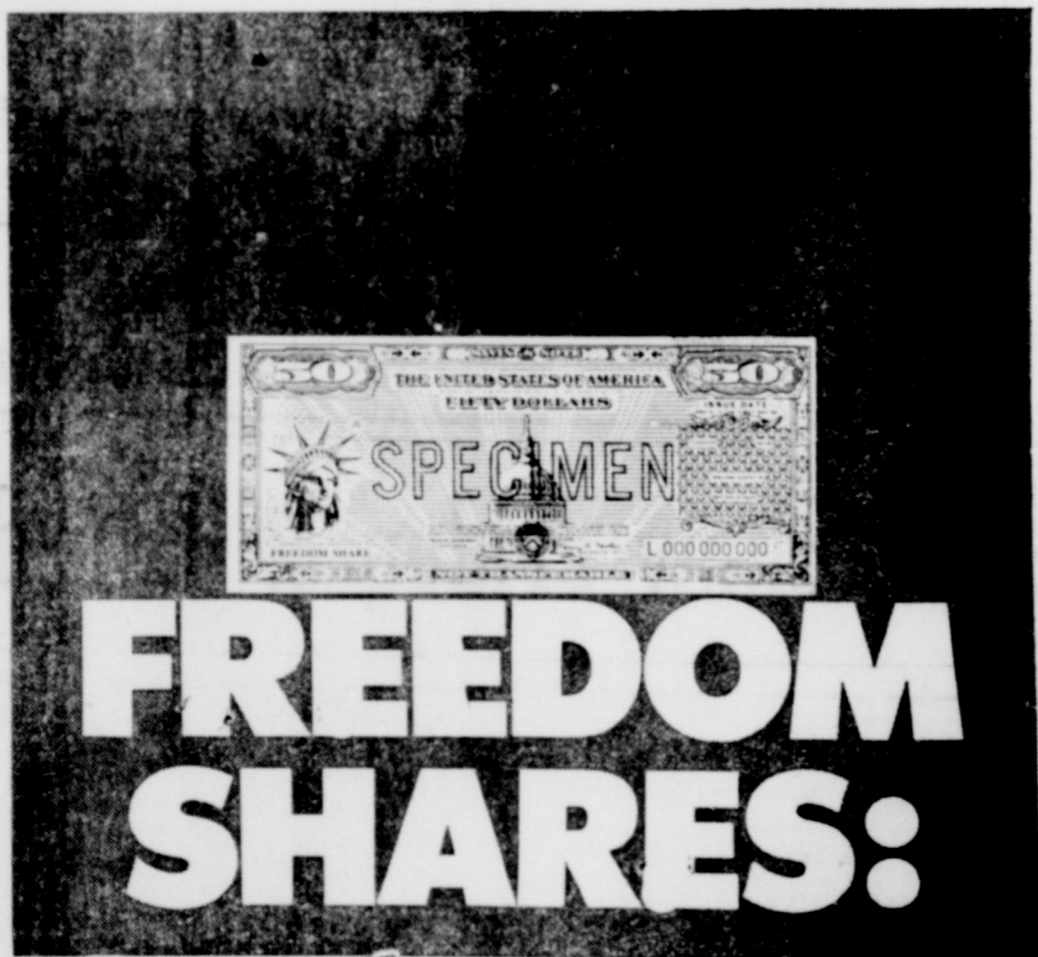
