



### Local Cage Teams Halve 2 Games With Eastland

Cross Plains High School basketball teams ended non-conference play with a split with Class AA Eastland here Tuesday of last week.

Buffettes improved their season mark by belting the visiting sextet 50-34, but Buffaloes dropped a nip-and-tuck 53-51 decision to the Mavericks.

A fourth quarter surge lifted the local feminine team to its sixth victory of the season against seven defeats. Playing on about even terms through the first 24 minutes, Cross Plains staged a rally in the final stanza and pulled away. Sue Walker netted 21 points to pace local scorers, and Vickie Hargrove bucketed 19.

Rounding out scoring were Lydia Albrecht with eight and Debbie Tyler with two.

A see-saw contest was the feature of the first half of the male contest. Visiting Mavericks gained a 12-10 advantage after

the first eight minutes, but the Herd carried a 21-20 edge to locker rooms at intermission. A strong surge by the Class AA cagers in the third spelled doom for the Bison. Eastland outscored the Buffaloes 16-9 in that period for a 36-30 margin after 24 minutes.

Buffets retaliated in the final canto, but fell short by two points. Cross Plains, hitting about 30 per cent of field goals, couldn't find the range at the free throw line. Several opportunities of a one-on-one situation in the second half were not taken advantage of by Bison.

James McMillan led Herd tallying with 13 points. He was closely followed by Leslie Cowan with 11, and Ricky Jones connected for nine.

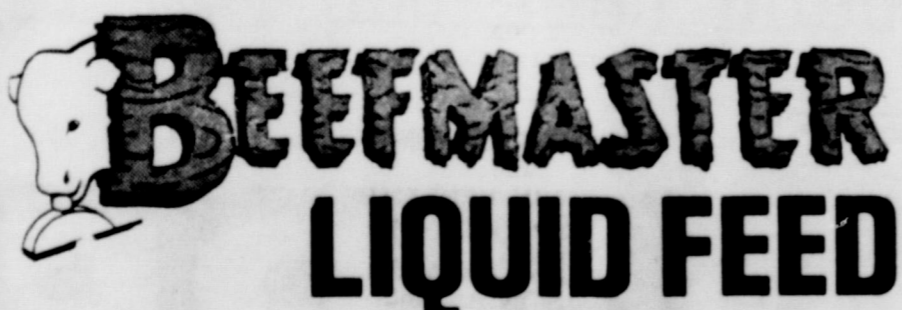

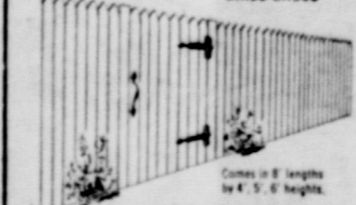

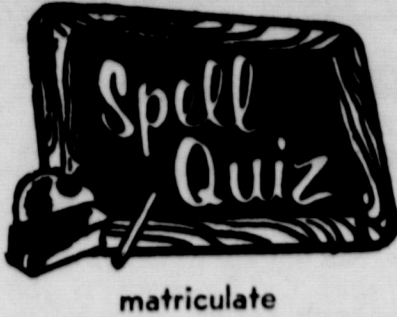

## Former Local Teacher Buried At Brownwood

Joseph Weldon Bailey Chambers, 58, who was reared at Cross Cut and once served as Cross Plains High School principal, died unexpectedly at his home in La Grange Saturday at 6 p.m. Death resulted from heart attack.  
 Funeral services were held from Davis-Morris Funeral Chapel in Brownwood Tuesday morning and burial was in East-lawn Cemetery there.  
 The Rev. Cecil Ellis, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Brownwood, officiated.
