2 Elections Face Voters In Spring

At least two elections face Cross Plains citizens in 1969, both in April.

Persons living within the corporate city limits will elect three councilmen, and patrons of Cross Plains Independent School District will choose two trustees. To have a voice in either balloting, though, patrons must have a registration certificate.

Registration blanks may be obtained at Citizens State Bank or office of the County Tax Assessor-Collector in the courthouse in Baird. Deadline for registering is January 31.

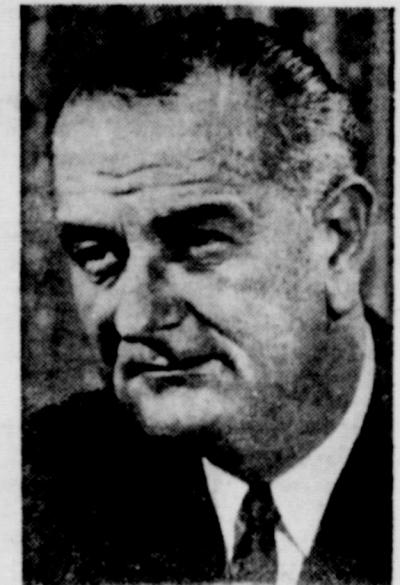

January Runs True To Form - Very Dry

January is customarily the driest month of the year for Cross Plains, and indications are that 1969 will present no change.

Through the first 21 days of January less than 25 of an inch of moisture was recorded here by S. F. Bond, official observer for the Weather Bureau. During the past 21 years an average of 1.60 inches of rainfall has fallen here in the first month of the year. Last January, was the wettest on record. A total of 9.26 inches of rain was recorded here during that 31 days.

Farmers and ranchers are beginning to feel the pinch of drought. Small crops show the need of moisture, and winter grasses have failed to arrive on schedule. Livestock feeding is general throughout the area with no prospect of diminishing any time soon.

As yet no serious situations have arisen over the need of stock water, however, lakes and ponds are beginning to get low, indicating the effects of extended dry weather.

98 Gain Honor Rate At School

Honor roll for Cross Plains schools has been announced by Supt. Wayne Ford. The list contained 98 students who earned a general average of 90 or better for the third six weeks period.



laurels with a single game output of 949 and series of 2,855 pins.

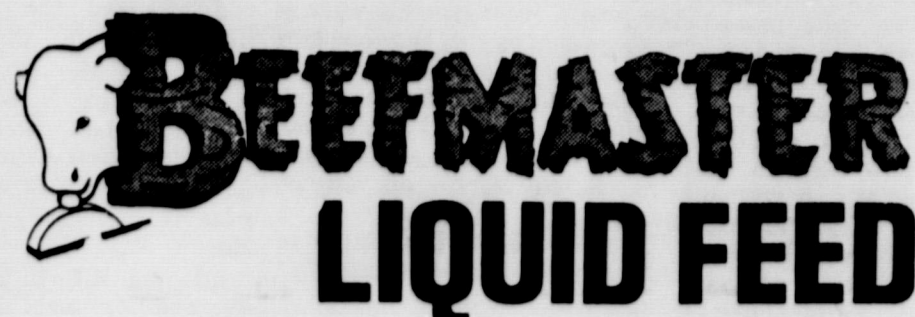

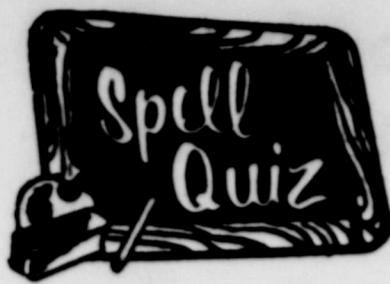
