## 150 At Barbecue Tuesday At Noon

One hundred and fifty-six persons attended a mid-day barbecue in Cross Plains Tuesday in celebration of completion of all floodwater retention lakes in Turkey Creek Water Control District.

The catered meal was served at Callahan County Junior Livestock Barn on State Highway 206, one mile north of town.

Congressman Omar Bureson was principal speaker for the event and paid tribute to the people of this area for their foresight in exercising soil conservation to preserve vital top soil.

County Attorney James Paul Shanks served as master of ceremonies.

The day's activities were begun as visitors and local people boarded buses and journeyed to the newest lake in the watershed. It is on the Nannie D. Newton lease, operated by J. C. Bowden and Tommie Conlee, 4 miles southwest of Cross Cut.

The formal program began after the group returned to the show barn.

There Shanks presented officials of Brown-Mills Conservation District, supervisors of Central Colorado Soil & Water Conservation District, and all those who had served Turkey Creek Water Control District, which successfully completed every project undertaken.

County Judges and Commissioners Courts were presented from Brown, Coleman and Callahan Counties.

Scott Lanford, chairman of the board of supervisors for Brown-Mills District, introduced other dignitaries and read communications from State Representatives Burke Musgrove and Lynn Nabers, who explained that business in the House pre-

vented their attendance. Nabers had a bill on the floor of the House for consideration, and Musgrove was tied up in a legislative committee meeting.

J. H. Martin, chairman of the board of supervisors for Central Colorado Soil and Water District, related history of flood damage in this section and told steps being taken to hold it to a minimum.

E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area conservationist, reviewed steps taken from the first to completion of the last — 13th — structure in the Turkey Creek area. He paid tribute to all persons who had a hand in prosecution of the project, and presented H. N. Smith of the state Soil Conservation Service Office in Temple. He outlined progress in other Texas watersheds.

Damon D. Jones served as local chairman of the arrangements committee. Most planning, though, was done by James Herring and his staff of the Baird SCS office. Help was received from the offices of all county officials and from Cross Plains schools.

### PRESENT 2 RANCHERS AWARDS ON TUESDAY

John D. Isenhower of Putnam and Dale Herring of Talpa were presented certificates at the SCS noon barbecue here Tuesday.

Awards were made to the two outstanding ranchers by the American Society of Range Management in recognition of outstanding work in pasture improvement and management.

Presentations were made by E. J. Hughes of Brownwood.

## Former Cross Plains Youth Owns Huge Cattle Feedlot

Charles H. Payne, a 1968 graduate of Texas Tech and son of Mr. and Mrs. Hadden Payne of Cross Plains, is owner and manager of a new cattle feeding operation being built at Hedley — on the Texas Plains — which may one day handle 30,000 head simultaneously.

Construction began last August on the huge feedlot, which when completed will be entirely automated. Push buttons will activate the giant operation.

A half section of land has already been set aside for future expansion of the feedlot, which is situated in an area of high production of milo, alfalfa and

other feeds. Much new irrigation is starting in the locality.

Although the enterprise is devoted almost exclusively to custom feeding, Payne plans to handle some cattle of his own.

He explains that all cattle are checked twice daily for sick animals. Feed is likewise distributed to all pens twice daily, 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Payne's operation is known as Donley County Feedlot, and he invites people from this area to look in on the business when in that section of the state.

"We'd be most happy to see anyone from home," he writes.

## Speed Reading Course Will Be Offered Locally

A special class in Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics, the famous course in rapid reading, comprehension and study efficiency, will be taught in Cross Plains this Spring by Scot Edgington, high school principal.

Edgington, who has completed several courses in Reading Dynamics, has now finished the instructor training program.

"Reading Dynamics has been available to the people in Cross Plains only once before," said Edgington, "and I am delighted that we again will have an opportunity to offer the course here." Edgington further explained that Reading Dynamics is the course the late President John Kennedy requested be taught to the top members of his White House staff, and it has been taken by many of our nation's senators, congressmen, the Joint Chiefs-of-Staff and is now taught on over 50 college campuses.

"Seating in this class will be limited," Edgington added, "and

anyone needing further information should call me at the high school or at home."

"Everyone is invited to attend a free orientation on this course Monday, March 3, at the high school at 3:45 p.m. or 7:30 p.m. It will last only an hour," Edgington concluded.

## Burkett Area May Get New Shallow Oil Tests

Riddle Oil Company of San Angelo plans to re-enter five shallow oil projects a mile and one-half southeast of Burkett. All are 250 feet deep and are on land owned by E. E. Knight.

No. 1 and No. 5 Knight are in Coleman County, and the others are in Brown County.

Site for No. 1 Knight is 690 feet from the south and 640 feet from the east lines of Lot 14, A. White Survey 161.

## "City Dads" Ponder More Water Shortage

Cross Plains City Council is now accepting bids for additional water storage. If purchased, the new reservoir will be located near existing storage at the settling basin and water treatment facilities on East 9th Street.

Bids are being taken on a 3,000 barrel, bolted, galvanized steel tank and also one of 5,000 barrels. The galvanized steel tank now in use is of 3,000 barrel size.

The overhead water-tower tank near the fire station has a capacity of approximately 1,750 barrels.

Councilmen point out that the reason for purchasing additional storage is to avert shortages during the summer months and possibly a lack of water with which to fight a major fire.

Three bids have been received by the Council, however, none has yet been accepted. Action on the bids is expected at the March 4 session of the board.

A 3,000 barrel reservoir is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$8,500 and a 5,000 barrel one about \$11,000.

## Glass Bead Plant Told To Stop Polluting Air

The Reflex Glass Bead Co., Inc., located on State Highway 279 between Cross Plains and Brownwood, has been ordered by the state to stop pollution of the air. The Texas Air Control Board has given the corporation a variance — extra time in which to comply with pollution control regulations. A Nov. 1, 1969, deadline was set.

Board engineer Ralph Claypool said he happened to notice the plume caused by emission of fine glass dust from the plant when he was in Brownwood and began an investigation.

Samplings show that the dust emission was 29 times higher than the Air Control Board's limit of 150 micrograms per cubic centimeter for 14 hours a day.

"Glass dust is hazardous material," board member Herbert W. Whitney of Corpus Christi said.

But board staffer Michael Peterson said the plant was not in a residential area, and no persons are being affected by emissions at the present time.

"The plant's proposal for pollution control would help the in-plant conditions as well as air pollution control," Peterson said. He stated that Reflex Glass Bead Co. officials were rushing to cure their pollution problems, by installing a dust collector, and were "ahead of schedule" in control efforts.

But the high emission report shocked Air Control Board members who agreed to set a cutoff date on granting variances.

To Move Forward - Push control forward.

To Stop - Pull control back to neutral position.

For Reverse - Pull control back and hold.

Before tilling lock depth bar in vertical position, and stake into soil.

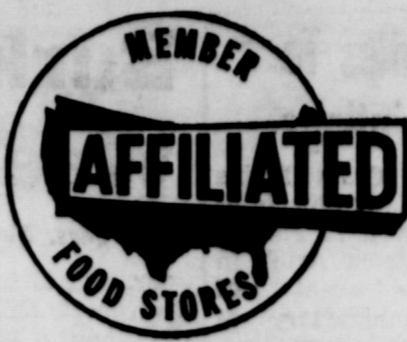

## Buffaloes Split Two With Carbon Team Last Week

District 9-A basketball champion Buffaloes split a pair of practice games last week with Carbon, District 24-B kings, in preparation for bi-district clash this week with Albany.

The Herd was scheduled to tangle with the Lions, District 10-A winners, in Abilene's Eagle Gym Tuesday night. Winner of that game will participate in the regional tournament carded for Friday and Saturday, Feb. 28 and March 1, in the men's gymnasium on the North Texas State University campus in Denton.

### Overtime Loss

Buffaloes dropped the opener of the two practice sessions to host Carbon 77-74 in overtime Tuesday of last week. Friday on local hardwood, however, Bisons claimed a relatively easy 69-54 decision.

In the first session Bisons gained a 10-point advantage in the first period, but lost half of that, 30-25, at intermission.

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
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## Some Signs Of Spring Seen Around Sabanno

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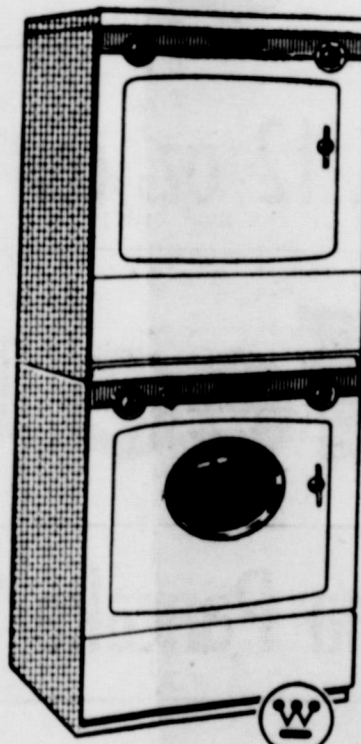
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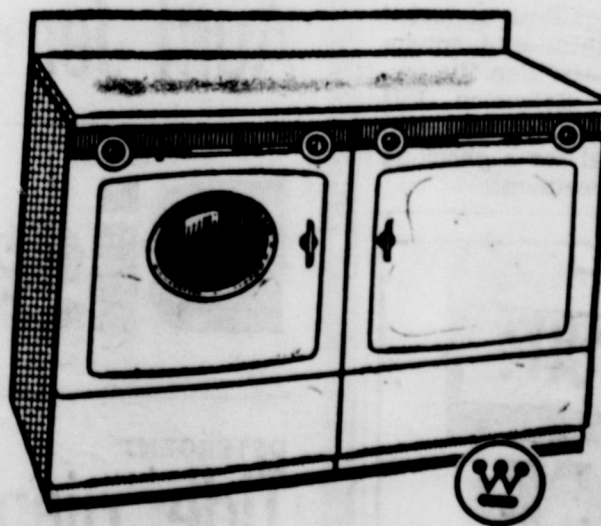

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### Couple From Minnesota Research County Kinsman

Minnesota kinsmen of the late Dick Cordwent, colorful early-day Callahan County rancher, visited Cross Plains and Baird last week doing research on the man whose land holdings were once the largest in this area.

The visitors were Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Ringkob of Jackson, Minn.

Cordwent, whose headquarters ranch was near the Spring Gap Mountains west of Cottonwood, was a first cousin of Ringkob's grandfather.

"My grandfather came to America from England," Ringkob says, "and he was so impressed with the possibilities of this land that he wrote back to Britain and encouraged his brother and Cordwent to settle here. They came and joined him for a while in Minnesota. The weather there was too cold for Cordwent and he came south to Texas, going first to Decatur and then to Callahan County."

Cordwent spent the remainder of his life in this area, buying land and enlarging his cattle empire from year to year. He never married.

The late Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Goble of Cross Plains spent many years at the Cordwent headquarters and knew the famed Englishman probably better than anyone else locally.

Mr. Goble served as ranch foreman and he and Mrs. Goble lived in the same house with Cordwent. The Gobles were given a 73 acre piece of land from the Cordwent holdings.

Cordwent died Oct. 11, 1924, while loading cattle at a ranch he owned in the Itan Flats, just east of Big Spring. The late Gordon Phillips, who was the Texas & Pacific Railroad conductor on the freight which had pulled to a siding to load the Cordwent cattle, said that the rancher leaned against a box car and then dropped dead, seemingly without warning. Death was attributed to heart attack. He was brought back to Baird and buried in Ross Cemetery there.

At the time of his death newspapers reported that Cordwent owned about 100 sections of land. There were only 12,000 acres in the headquarters spread in the Spring Gap country but in addition Cordwent owned the place in the Itan Flats and another large ranch farther west, near Van Horn.
