## Schools Have 108 Stars In Classroom

## April 1 Final Date For Peanut Acreage Shift

April 1 is final date for transferring 1969 peanut allotments.

Owners and operators who are reminded to call at the ASCS office in the county in which the allotment is situated. Application blanks are available at the ASCS office.

Leases may be made for from one to five years and the maximum acres that can be transferred to a farm by sale or lease is the smaller of the available cropland or 50 acres.

Other important dates for farmers are listed as follows: March 10, Final date to release cotton acreage; also final date to request additional cotton allotment.

March 21, Final date for signing agreement to participate in feed, grain, wheat and cotton programs.

April 1, Final date for buying, selling or leasing peanut allotments.

April 4, Final date to release peanut acreage. Also final date to request additional peanut allotment.

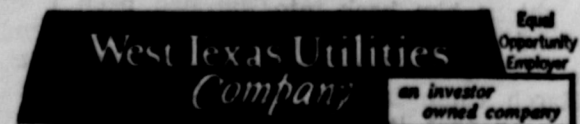

Santa Anna bowled over Bangs 43-17 for the District 9-A girls basketball championship Thursday. The two units ended regular league play tied with 7-1 marks.

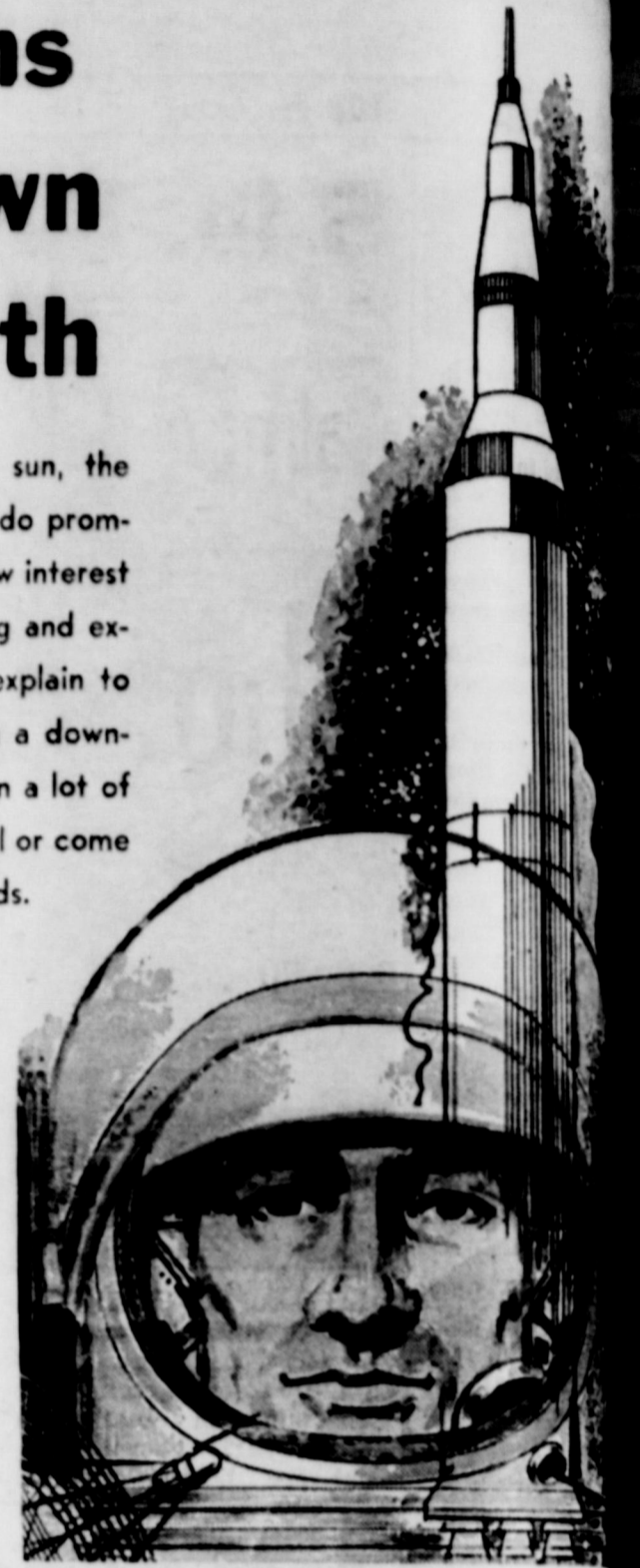
Santa Anna was to take on Dublin girls, 10-A winners, in bi-district play Tuesday.

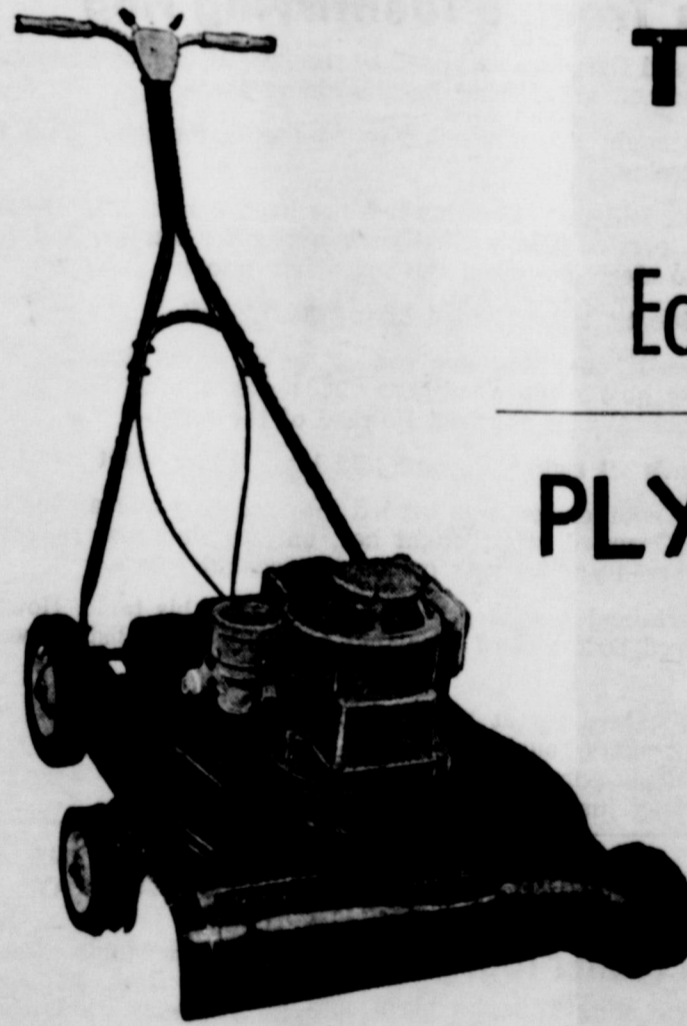

Failure of a large producer to either plant at least 75 per cent of the allotment, sign-up and plant some cotton or release means reduction in next year's allotment by 50 per cent.

Jan. 27, 1933: A. L. (Loran) Barr, whose service station was robbed recently, has run down the culprits and apparently broken a "ring of thieves" in the process. An automobile dealer at Tuscola was taken into custody but has since been released on \$2,000 bond. Additional arrests are expected soon. Barr, who was never before engaged in law-enforcement, demonstrated much natural talent for this type of work. He is credited with uncovering virtually all of the pertinent evidence, which had hitherto gone unnoticed by veteran peace officers.

March 8, 1935: Effective after Saturday all M.K.&T. trains from De Leon to Cross Plains will operate on an every other day schedule, it was announced from the railroad headquarters Monday morning. A decision granting the schedule change was handed down by the Texas Railroad Commission Saturday.

Feb. 27, 1942: Kent Davis, Fred J. and Jack W. Tunnell, Cross Plains youths attending John Tarleton College, are listed on the institution's honor roll of superior students.

March 5, 1943: News has been received here that Franzel Odum, who is stationed at Camp Carson, Colo., has been promoted to sergeant. He is a 1934 graduate of Rowden school.

March 3, 1944: The first train to run into Cross Plains arrived here Jan. 12, 1911. The last one will depart here March 15. Some of those who saw the "iron horse" puff into town that cold winter day 33 years ago are planning to be on hand to bid a fond farewell to the last to leave the local station.

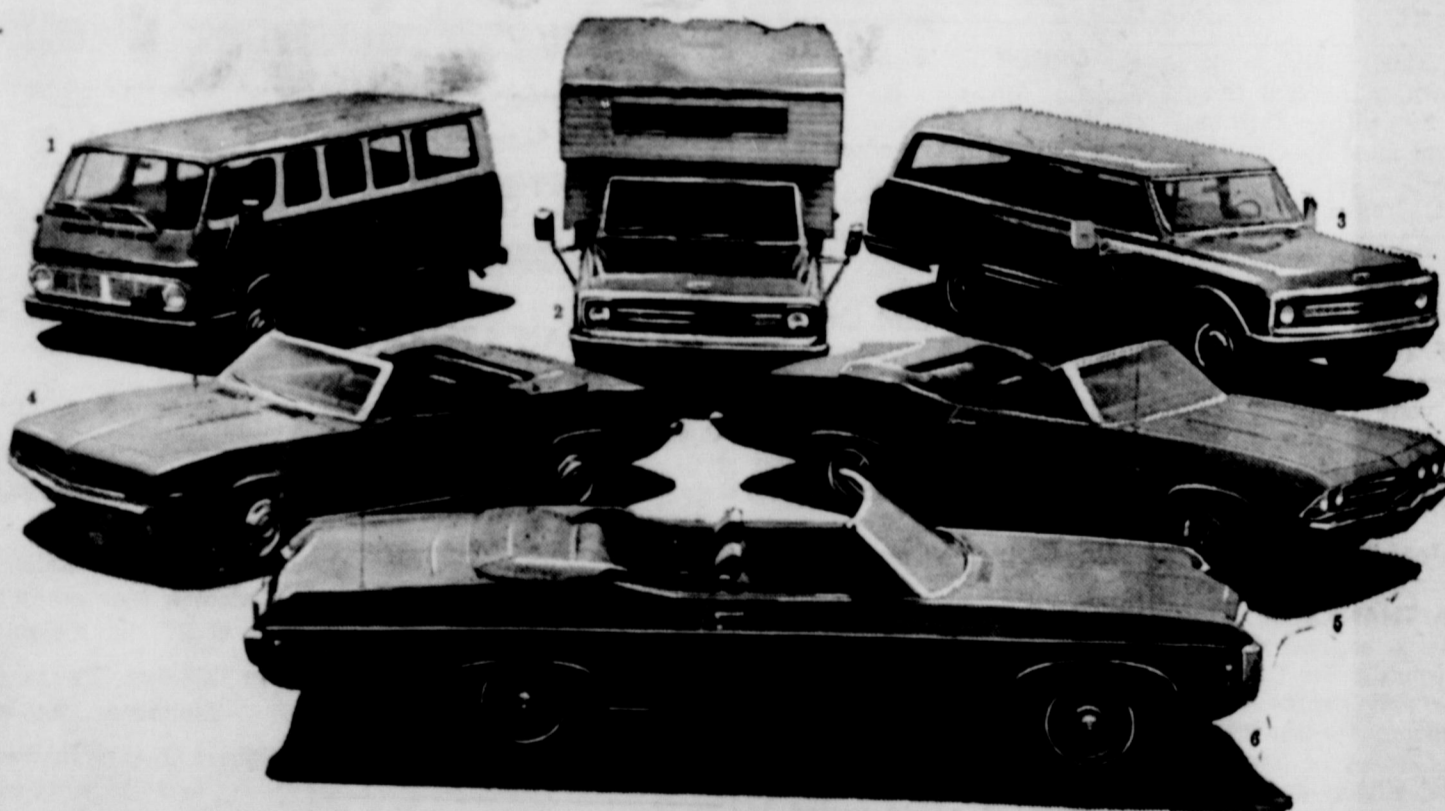
