Bids Sought For Hyde City Lake

Plans for installation of a multi-purpose dam on the Clyde multi-purpose project are being circulated. A bid opening has been scheduled for May 1, by the Soil Conservation Service in Temple, according to District Conservator James Herring of

area conservationist with the SCS in Brownwood states. Installation of the multi-purpose dam will be supervised by M. W. McNeese, Project Construction Engineer with the SCS. The job inspector will be H. C. Anglin.

The multi-purpose lake involving flood detention storage and impoundment of municipal and recreational waters will be broken down into about three contracts for total installation. Coordinated with installation of the dam and emergency spillway, bids will be awarded for installing water supply facilities and recreational facilities by the City of Clyde.

Overall plans for the multi-purpose lake were coordinated between the SCS and consulting engineers, Henningson, Durham and Richardson Inc. of Dallas which was employed by the City of Clyde for planning municipal water and recreational developments in connection with the upstream flood control program of the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed.

Oklahoma Professor Sifts Ancient Campsites Near Here

L. Dubois of the geology department of the University of Oklahoma, was at the Eubank Ranch, near Clyde, over the week end to sift an Indian campsite, he did extensive probing.

Dubois, an archaeologist, gathered specimens of ancient hearts and fire-thrower much of the world. He is able to determine the position of the magnetic pole at the time of the site. In this way he dates the site.

ruins in Arizona and New Mexico, and plots migration of the north magnetic pole during the past several thousand years.

Last year Dr. Dubois spent several weeks in the Sudan, along the Nile River. Last summer was spent in Mexico and next week he will go to Wyoming pursuing his study.

Work at the Eubank Ranch is his first in Texas. The particular firesite is believed to be much older than those in New Mexico and Arizona.

Dr. Dubois has plans to return to this area and check other sittings, particularly several along Pecan Bayou.

Small turnouts characterized two elections held in Cross Plains Saturday. Balloting was to name two school trustees for

three-year terms and to pick three city councilmen for two-year tenures. Both elections were held in

the City Hall, the municipal ticket being voted in the front office and the school ballot in the larger, back room.

R. D. (Dick) Koenig and Lewis Fortune won places on the school board. Results as announced by Mrs. W. F. (Katie) Kilgore, a few minutes after the polls closed, were as follows:

Payne, asking a first term, finished in a tie with McCord, who stood for re-election. Koenig and Bowden are incumbents.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield telephoned Austin and conferred with the Texas League of Municipalities Monday afternoon to determine what action should be taken to break the tie between McCord and Payne.

He was referred to Texas election laws, which offer two solutions. One method would be to hold a runoff election not sooner than 20 days nor later than 30 days after the votes from the first election have been officially canvassed. The other plan would be for one of the candidates to concede or withdraw.

The City Council was due to meet Tuesday night, April 8, and it was presumed that a method of breaking the tie would be worked out at that time, both McCord and Payne being consulted in regard to whatever solution is reached.

Mason and Rising Star have been chosen favorites in the event at Comanche.

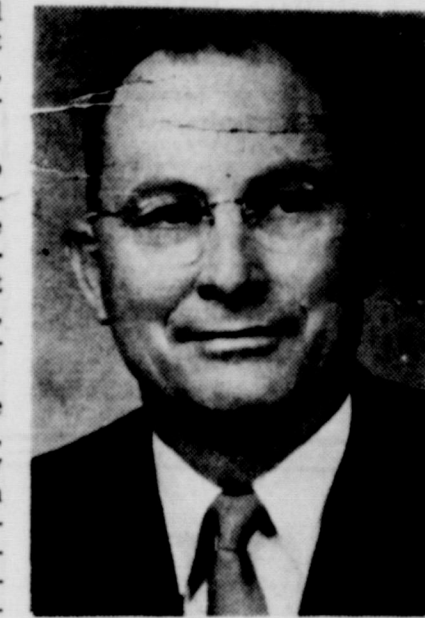

Little Church With Colorful History Shuts Down In Sabanno Community

25 years the focal point of community life at Sabanno, the little rural church and its members came to work and served as the backbone of the community on festive occasions, such as Christmas tree, and the place from which sermons were spoken in the area's honored

versity in San Antonio.

John Moss bought the old Sabanno farm and moved to Sabanno in 1883. He gave land for the first cemetery and school built a year later. The school was first called Friendship and his daughter, Julia Moss, who became the mother of Mrs. S. H. McCannies of Cisco, taught the first term and had 16 pupils. They walked from as far as four miles to attend classes.

Church services were held in the school building with a Rev. Mr. Gattis, Methodist minister from Scranton, preaching once each month, and Rev. D. A. Knox, a Presbyterian minister, doing the same.

The post office at that time was called Curtis and was located some three miles east of the present cemetery.

The Rev. Mr. Knox organized the first Presbyterian Church at Sabanno in 1888 with nine charter members. They were: Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Harris, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Erwin, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Lewis, Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Kelly and Nora Patton.

Some time thereafter a Presbyterian church building was constructed to the north of the cemetery. This congregation grew to become one of the strongest in the Abilene Presbytery. The building continued in use until 1913. Names of some of the pastors who filled the pulpit regularly in those early days include: the Revs.: D. A. Knox, E. D. Stockton, N. R. French, W. E. Green, W. M. Bennett, C. C. Bullock, S. Lee Shell, J. R. Gaines and S. P. Collins.

Sent out from the church as ministers, lay-leaders and evangelistic singers were: Garland and Bernie Shell, sons of an early pastor; Chester E. Green, who pastored numerous California congregations and served as executive secretary of the Board of National Missions in that state until his death in 1949; Horace F. Erwin, who for 40 years was an evangelist singer of national renown, until his death in Providence, R. I. in 1958.

A highlight of the little church's history was when the Abilene Presbytery met at Sabanno in 1906. Records reveal this convocation attracted "the largest number of delegates in years."

The Rev. Lee Shell gave the welcome address and pointed

out that the Sabanno church had a large group of young people and an active Y.M.C.A.

The congregation grew and in 1913 Liberty Presbyterians consolidated with it. A new building was erected at Sabanno with the Rev. A. Crane as pastor for a while. He was followed by the Rev. S. P. Collins, widely loved and respected both as a minister and educator. Other pastors in order were: the Rev. J. H. Howell, Rev. Chalmers Kilbourne and then the Rev. Collins again.

Later the Methodist Church was moved from Sabanno to Barnes Chapel and their members in the community joined with the few remaining Presbyterians. Together they maintained a union Sunday School and had alternate pastors of

Methodist and Presbyterian faiths. The Rev. W. C. Crawford, present Methodist pastor at Cross Plains, attended church here in his boyhood, as did the Rev. Albert Gage, now Baptist pastor at Lubbock.

There were the Rev. Mr. Little, a Methodist pastor who was widely loved, the Rev. A. C. Evans, a Presbyterian, Rev. Ralph Cooper, a Methodist, Rev. M. Slatten and then the last pastor, the Rev. Harold G. Wise. The church which had originally started with nine charter members and had grown to as many as 60, was by this time down to seven and never again had a fulltime pastor.

Some of the remaining members will affiliate at Cross Plains and others will go to Cisco.

Older members reflect upon memories of the little church building as time for its demise arrives. They point out that through the years it stood undamaged by fire or storm, save for one memorial window being broken by hail in 1962. The original two acres dwindled with Highway 206, which runs nearby, taking about one-fourth of it. Money from sale of the building will go to the Board of National Missions and the church bell will hitherto toll for Lutherans, leaving only a memory of the physical properties. Within the hearts and souls of three generations of men and women who attended services at Sabanno, the little church will live on, though, and its tenets of Christian stewardship will remain a lasting memorial.

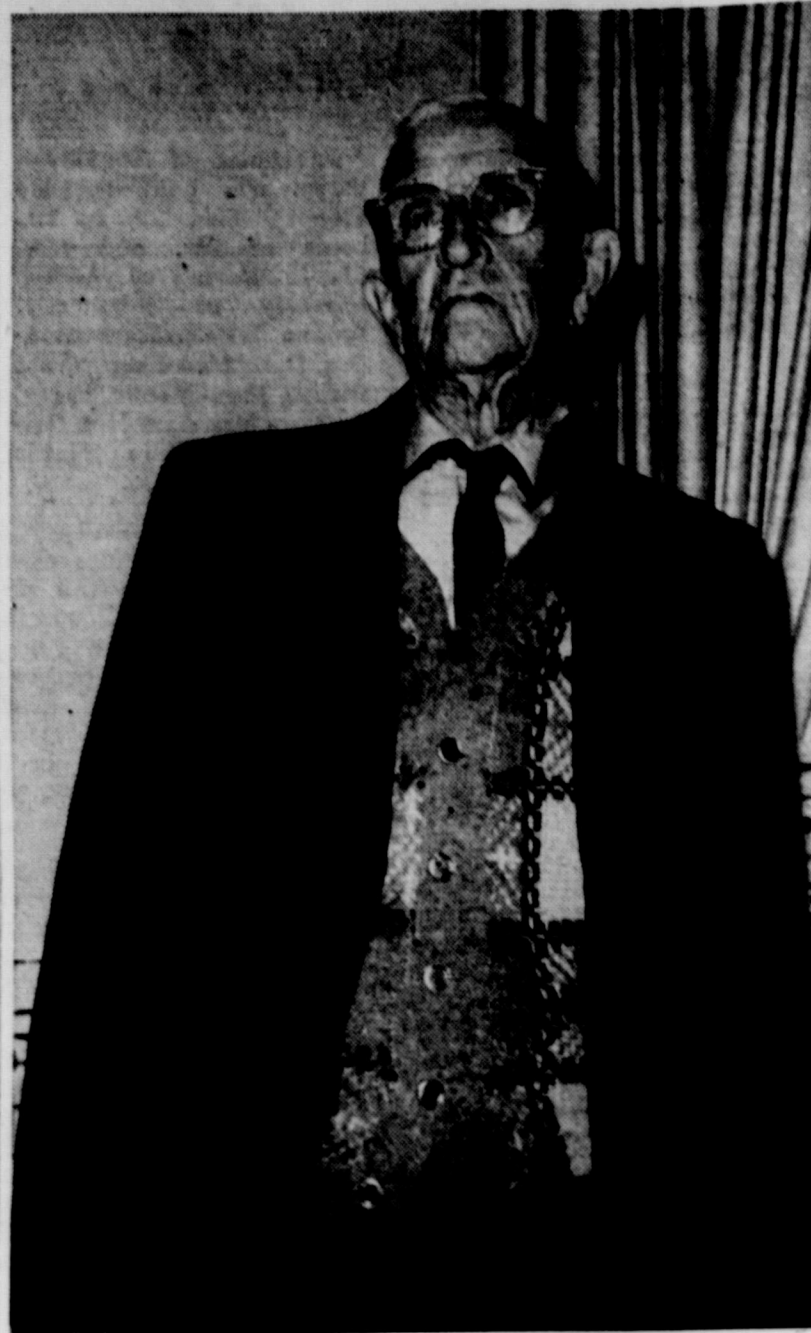
