When you next call The Review, 725-3571, to place a classified ad, remember that words are your business. Words properly put together in an ad mean more phone calls and more sales for you. Follow the rules below and get more and faster results.

- 1. Put in the address**
Many out-of-town readers will write you, but will not spend money for a long distance call.
- 2. Put in the phone number**
Many readers will call you but will not find it convenient to come to your home or business.
- 3. Avoid use of blind boxes**
Avoid them if possible. They are difficult to answer and people prefer to deal directly.
- 4. Put in the price, by all means**
Surveys show that many people will not answer an ad unless the price is given.
- 5. Keep the readers from guessing**
On important details it is better to include them if they are relevant to a sale.
- 6. Be available**
If you advertise your phone and address, be sure you are not absent when the ad appears so as to accommodate the reader.

Words are your tools in advertising. Competent sales help is available to assist you in writing the proper ad.

McCord And Payne Will Run Off Council Race Tie

A special run-off election was ordered by Cross Plains City Council Tuesday night for the purpose of breaking a tie which developed between J. P. McCord and Jimmielee Payne in their race for an alderman seat at the April 5 municipal balloting. The two tied at that time with 72 votes apiece.

As a result of a drawing conducted at the City Hall by Mayor Doyle Burchfield, McCord's name will be first on the printed ballot. He was elected in 1965 and has completed two terms. Payne is seeking a first term on the council.

Texas law requires that unless one of the tying candidates

withdraws that a runoff election be held no sooner than 20 and no more than 30 days after the election returns have been officially canvassed. In this particular case, the returns were checked the night of April 8, and the election has been ordered for 21 days thereafter.

Mayor Burchfield pointed out that write-in votes will not be tabulated in the run-off. A write-in of any type will invalidate a ballot.

It is believed that the upcoming run-off will be the first for a municipal post since elections were first held here following incorporation on Jan. 12, 1911.

The bond of brotherhood is not broken by 30 years of separation.

That truth was evidenced here this week as Harry Millward and his brother, George, of Dade City, Fla., hurried to catch up on things which had happened to each of them since they went separate ways in Oklahoma 30 years ago.

George, the younger by six years, brought news to the Cross Plains man that their father and only sister had died during the years in which contact was lost.

"It was like a foretaste of Heaven," said Mrs. Millward, "to see the brothers so happy to be in one another's company."

Safety Award Goes To James Herring

James Herring of Baird, district soil conservationist, is a safe man with an automobile.

During a recent meeting in Brownwood, E. J. Hughes, area conservationist, presented Herring an award in recognition of the Baird man having completed five years of accident-free motor vehicle operation.

Herring was also cited for his safety program involving all personnel in the Baird Work Unit. Hughes pointed out that the Baird unit is a good example of cooperation in the U. S. Mission Safety 70 Program, whereby federal agencies are trying to reduce employee injuries and costs by 30 per cent.

The Baird Work Unit provides technical assistance in planning and application of conservation resource activities within the Central Colorado, Middle Clearfork and Lower Clearfork Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The afternoon schedule: Blanket, 1:15 and 1:25; Comanche, 1:40 and 2:00; De Leon, 2:20 and 2:40; Rising Star, 3:20 and 3:40; Cross Plains 3:55 and 4:15. Arrival back in Baird is timed at 5 o'clock.

Sheriff Grayson Miller said yesterday that he hoped a large crowd would plan to make the first trip. "We'll have a nice time and meet a lot of friendly people," he said.

Notaries Public Must Ask Re-Appointment

Mrs. Beatrice Deal, Callahan County district and county clerk, reminds that all qualified notaries public who desire re-appointment for the new term, beginning June 1, 1969, and ending June 1, 1971, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the county clerk between May 1 and May 15, 1969.

Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. cautions that notaries public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to his office, inasmuch as the law specifically requires that county clerks approve notary bonds and forward copies of applications to the secretary of state.

Dies further stated that any person not now a notary public, who desires appointment during the new term, should apply to his county clerk before May 16. Applicants must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the U. S. and Texas, and a resident of the county for which appointed. Application forms are available at all county clerks' offices.

Damage \$5,000 In 3-Truck Crash Here

Damage estimated at \$5,000 resulted from an early morning accident Friday at the intersection of Main Street and State Highway 36. Three trucks were involved.

Anthony Frishenhahn, 33, of New Braunfels, was injured and was rushed by local ambulance to an Abilene hospital. The accident was investigated by Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch of Cross Plains and Mack Kniffen of Clyde, Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox of Cross Plains assisted.

The Department of Public Safety reported that a wrecker was dispatched from Abilene to pry apart the three vehicles. A spokesman said Frishenhahn was driving one of the trucks when they collided.

Mighty Mites Annex Track Championship

Cross Plains Mighty Mites surprised everyone but themselves Thursday by winning the U.L.L. District 9-A junior high school track championship.

Local cindermen scored 48½ points to capture the crown. Early was runner-up with 36½ points, edging Goldthwaite with 36. Host Bangs team was fourth with 27 and Santa Anna was fifth with 26.

The Cross Plains team, which fielded 34 in preliminaries, tallied six firsts, two seconds, one third, four fourths and two fifths. Scoring was on a five-point basis for individual events and double in relays.

Coach John Geer said that the team as a whole did a real good job, and I am very proud of them.

Leading the Mite drive to the title were Rodney Renfro and Sammy Davidson, each scoring about 20 points according to Coach Geer.

Renfro earned blue ribbons in the following events: broad jump, 17-feet, 6 inches; 110-yard dash, 11.1 seconds, and 50-yard dash, 5.9 seconds. He also placed third in the shot put with a heave of 39 feet.

Davidson took first place in the high jump, 4-feet, 10-inches, and 440-yard run in 57.4 seconds. He placed second in the discus with a throw of 115 feet and 110-yard dash, 11.4 seconds.

The two Mites teamed with Donnie Dillard and Gary Rodgers to win first in the 440-yard relay which was clocked in 49.3 seconds.

Tony Golson placed third in the 60-yard high hurdles in 10.3 seconds.

Rex Mayes gained two fourth

places, pole vault, 8 feet, and 50-yard dash in 6.6 seconds; and a fifth place in the 100-yard low hurdles.

Donnie Dillard was fourth in the discus with 105 feet, and Larry Tatom finished fourth in the 880-yard run in 2:29.0.

Glen Dale Phillips tied for fifth place in the high jump, and Roy Merrill's 12 pull-ups was sixth.

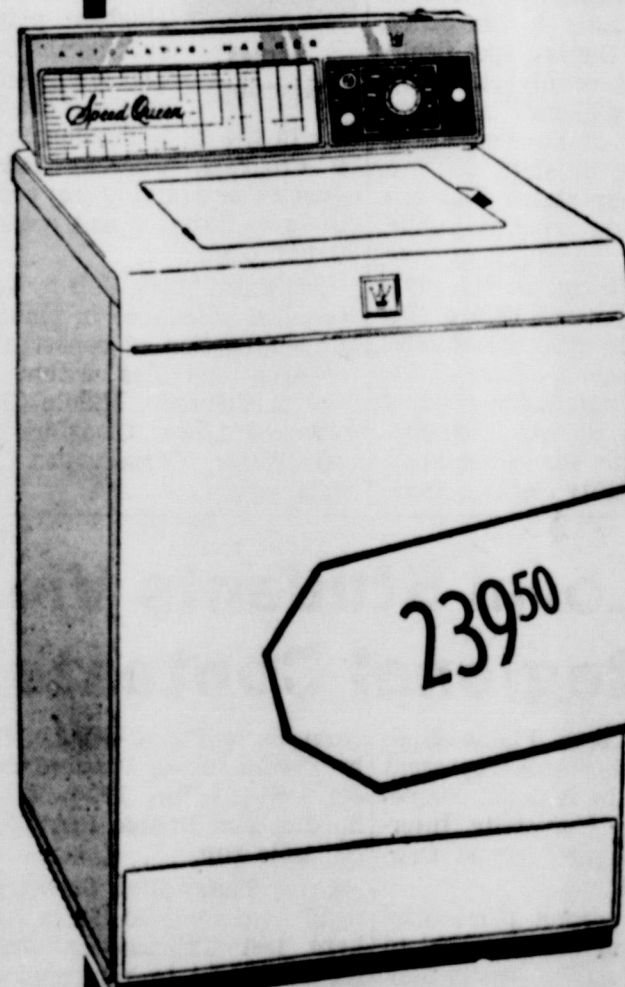

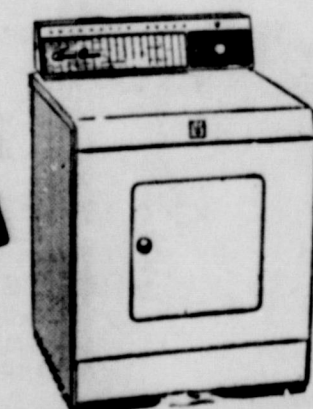

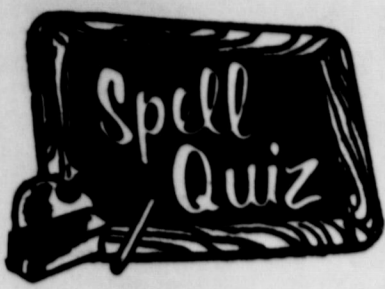
