## Payne Victor In Council Run-Off

Jimmelee Payne, a newcomer to local politics defeated J. P. McCord, incumbent, in a special run-off election for a City Council seat Tuesday.

Payne tallied 54 per cent of the 211 votes cast. The count was announced by Mrs. W. F. (Katie) Kilgore almost immediately after close of the polls was: Payne 114 votes and McCord 97.

McCord and Payne had tied with 72 votes each in the regular municipal election held April 5.

McCord had completed two terms on the Council, having been first elected in 1965.

Payne is expected to be sworn-in immediately and officially take his seat at the next regular meeting of city fathers.

The vote Tuesday was not considered heavy and never in history of Cross Plains had returns of an election been announced faster by a presiding judge. Mrs. Kilgore's helpers were Mrs. L. D. Koenig and Mrs. Chester Glover.

Other members of the City Council, with whom Payne will serve, are: Doyle Burchfield,

mayor, and Oscar Koenig, Gerald Bowden, T. T. Nichols and Raymond DeBusk, aldermen.

## Street Parade To Open Baird Rodeo Thursday

Callahan County Sheriff Posse's 21st annual rodeo will be opened with an elaborate street parade in the county seat town Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

The professional, featuring riding clubs from area cities, colorful western entries and more than 300 cowboys and cowgirls, will officially open a three-night rodeo calendar.

Rodeo performances will be held at the Posse's \$50,000 arena on Interstate Highway 20, one mile east of Baird. Shows begin Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights at 8 o'clock.

Producer of the show again this year is Walter Alsbough of Colorado, who brings a string of bucking stock said to challenge the finest skills of world-champion riders, many of whom will compete in the show.

Taking part in Thursday afternoon's rodeo performances will be horsemen of Cross Plains Riding Club, led by Miss Terry Edington, sweetheart of the organization.

B. H. Freeland, chairman of publicity for this year's rodeo, said yesterday that he had had a hand in helping with all the past 20 rodeos and that prospects for a spectacular show never equaled the outlook this year.

"We're going to have a great three-night performance and I hope no one who enjoys this true sport of the old West will be absent," he said.

## Storm Wreaks Havoc Here Sunday Morning

Nature appeared to disapprove of Cross Plains switching to Daylight Saving Time.

In the early morning hours Sunday — shortly after time for advancing clocks one hour — winds of near gale proportion hit, wreaking havoc to small structures, trees and shrubs. The blow was accompanied by 1.20 inches of rainfall.

Roof was ripped from a rear portion of the Bishop Chevrolet Co. building and the Higginbotham warehouse in the alley between Main Street and Avenue D suffered extensive damage. A newly-completed shed structure at the J. H. (Preacher) Lee farm, two miles northeast of town, was demolished.

A sheet iron building owned by C. H. Dawson and located near the intersection of Main Street and Highway 36 was unroofed. A small building used to warehouse oil at the F. C. (Slim) Newton Station was also damaged.

Utility poles in Cross Plains, west of the city and north of Pioneer were snapped by the winds.

Television antennas were mangled at the homes of Mrs. Clyde D. Sims, Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Edmondson, the Reuben McCowan rent house and at Souder's Grocery.

Large shade trees were ripped at the Dick Dillard, S. N. Foster Raymond DeBusk and W. A. Payne homes.

A window was blown in at the Woodmen of the World Lodge building on East 8th Street, and a large sign was blown from its mooring at Thlate's Automatic Laundry on North Main. A huge billboard on South Main was toppled onto

a link fence at K-Oil Well Service yard.

The accompanying rain brought to a total of 11.51 inches of moisture received in Cross Plains during the first 120 days of 1969.

## Vivian Franke Wins Contest Of 3rd Grade Letter-Writers

To a third grader, learning to write a letter properly can be a quite dull affair. Nevertheless, this task does present itself in the latter half of the first school semester.

We started out on the first effort full of vim, vigor, and vitality, but after the fourth or fifth try at writing to a non-existing person, about nothing of importance, and for no particular reason, motivation was running at a dangerously low ebb.

Trying to "pull the fat out of the fire," the teacher asked, "How would you like to write to a pen-pal in a far-away school?" Instantly the sparks of interest flew in all directions. We chose a tiny village nestled in a small valley high in the Rocky Mountains between Ouray, Colorado and Durango. The village is called Telluride, and 870 people live there. They have a modern school building, though, of which they are proud.

We had a contest. The pupil who handed in the best and most perfectly written letter

would have it mailed to Telluride — addressed simply — Third Grade, Telluride, Colo. For the next several days, it was not easy to keep any lesson going except writing! Form, capital letters, punctuation, correct spelling, margins, and indentations became the order of the day. The contest was close — so close that outside teachers had to make the final selection.

That selection was Vivian Franke, a pretty blue-eyed blond with dimples. Vivian's letter was rushed on its way via air mail. Then came the days of waiting. Every day everyone checked the mail box. Then one day, there it was, their reply! Not only a reply, but we received the name and address of each pupil in their third grade.

Letter writing? It's a snap, and the postal service between Cross Plains, Tex. and Telluride, Colo., has increased noticeably. The students have exchanged pictures, post cards, and information. We feel as if we know everyone in the family.

Our class is completing a Texana scrapbook which we plan to send to our unseen friends in Telluride. It is to be a surprise for them. Our parents have been so kind and helpful in gathering material for this scrapbook, that we wish to express our thanks.

Letter writing can be fun — if there is a reason to write one.

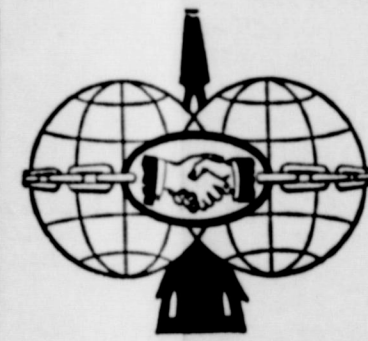

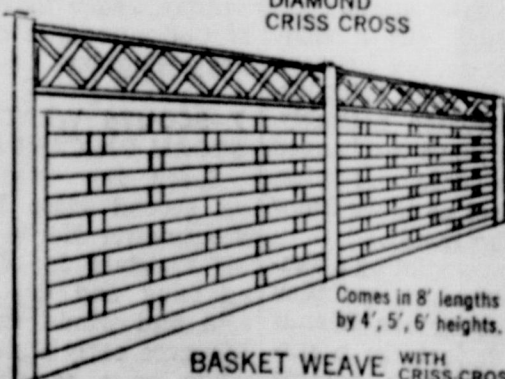

### SOME COUNTY FARMERS TO GET CROP SURVEY

Selected Callahan farmers are due to receive a crop acreage survey questionnaire, beginning May 19, and cooperation to completed and return forms is being urged.

The purpose of the survey, co-sponsored by USDA Statistical Service and Texas Department of Agriculture, is to secure accurate information for planning of future production and marketing, according to J. C. Earp, ASCS manager in Baird.

### Mail Social Security Changes To Abilene

Changes of address and other notices affecting a person's monthly social security checks can now be processed much more rapidly if the notice is sent directly to the social security office in Abilene, Box 3258.

James Smith, social security field representative for Callahan County pointed out that many notices are now being handled by teletype from the local office. The electronic transmission saves many days' processing time over the previous method of mailing the notices to the payment centers issuing the checks.

Smith said that beneficiaries may call, write, or visit the office in Abilene or see him when he is here to make these reports. If they have cards addressed to the payment center, cross out that address and add the Abilene one. Notices, in addition to those mentioned above, might also include marriage, divorce, dropping out of school, or any other event affecting the beneficiary's entitlement to his monthly checks.

All notices or reports, Smith stressed, must show the person's name and the social security claim number under which the benefits are paid. Without the claim number, no action can be taken.

Ballots to all cotton producers in Callahan County are scheduled for mailing Friday by the ASCS office in Baird. The vote is to determine if sale or lease of allotments outside of the county will be allowed in 1971.

A two-thirds majority of votes cast will be required to okay the transfer outside of the county. Marked ballots must be returned to okay the transfer outside of the county. Marked ballots must be returned to the ASCS office not later than close of business May 9 or be post-marked by midnight of that date.

J. C. Earp, officer manager, indicated that instructions would be included with the ballot.

# MEMORIES OF BROADWAY

Written By Jack Scott In 1961

For a country settled by hardy people with an insatiable hunger for religious freedom, strange treatment is sometimes given those who proclaim the gospel on city streets, as did many of the saints of old.

Some argue that a busy street is no place to hold church. There may be logic to such reasoning. It should be remembered, though, that it was in such a service that Billy Sunday, a professional baseball player, surrendered to the ministry and went on to become one of the greatest evangelists the world has ever known. Few organizations can boast of greater service than the Salvation Army, whose only congregations are those who linger momentarily while a street preacher gives testimony.

Regardless of whether or not a street corner is one's own idea of pulpit, it hardly seems illogical, in a country of free speech, to expect Bible reading to be unmolested, if not listened to. Nevertheless, this writer watched Sunday night as two street preachers were jostled and silenced on Broadway, New York's busiest and brightest thoroughfare. A gang of young hoodlums converged on two dedicated men. Shouts of loud and abusive insults drowned out everything the pair attempted to say. Then, as if breaking up the service was not enough, the revelers locked arms and pushed forward, sweeping the preachers before them, scattering paraphernalia and religious tracts with sacrilegious enjoyment.

"What's behind all this?" was asked of a young sailor standing near by and looking unbelievably at what he saw.

"Beats hell out of me," he answered, in a drawl that reminded of the hills of Tennessee, "but back home those two preachers would have had some help."

Front doors of a theater swung opened and out poured a gay crowd from one of the town's popular plays. Whereas mood of the street had been belligerent only a moment before, it was now carefree and merry. Taxis hurried like ants to a den, grabbing passengers and speeding off into the night. The real life scene and changed more rapidly and more dramatically than that of any theater.

But the show had not finished.

The following afternoon Broadway was to unfold another of its strange enactments. This time, however, it was not the word of God being desecrated, but the next best thing — the good of U. S. A.

The time was 6 p.m. The locale was 43rd and Broadway, the same spot where street preachers had suffered such indignities the night before.

A crowd estimated at 500 suddenly appeared in marching mass, flying the flag of Cuba and hundreds of likenesses of Fidel Castro. The chant was "Vive Cuba". If the demonstration was not Communist inspired, it at least bore the earmarks. The whole thing seemed to be an anachronism.

Like the sailor from Tennessee the night before, thousands looked on in bewilderment, yet no one raised a hand in protest. Police received only mild sympathy in dispersing the mob.

Broadway, the street popularized in song and story, is no longer America's Yankee Doodle Dandy. The "Gay White Way" needs to take a long look at Main Street U. S. A. and learn some better rules of conduct.

That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (or) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

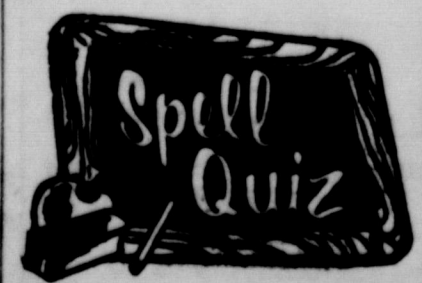
## President Nixon And Senator Tower Congratulate Local Lady

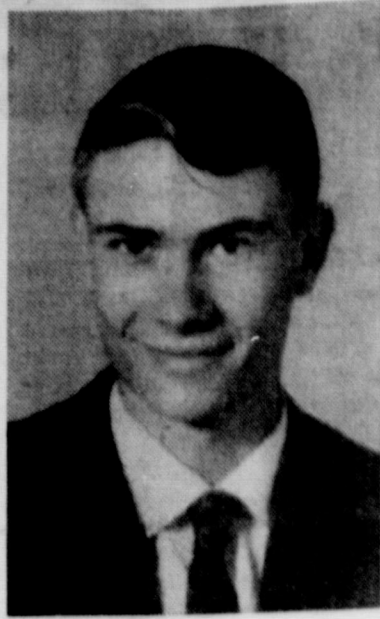

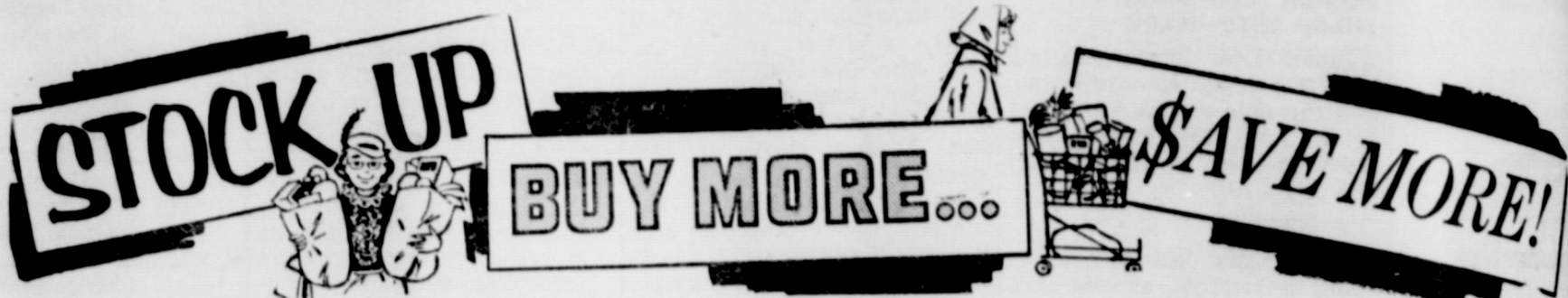
