Screwworm War Takes On Increased Vigilance

Livestock owners are asked to be on the alert for screwworm outbreaks. The warning came from Dolph Briscoe, Jr. at an emergency meeting of the Screwworm Eradication of-

ficials and livestock men in San Antonio last Wednesday. Briscoe is president of the Southwestern Animal Health Research Foundation Board of Trustees.

Four Eastland County men attended the meeting. They were Oscar Schaefer, county screwworm committee chairman; Doug Fry, president of the County Livestock Raisers Assn.;

DeMarquis Gordon, county agent, and Bob Cohen, assistant county agent.

Before the screwworm eradication program began in 1962, screwworms caused Texas livestock men to lose 100 million dollars each year. Officials estimated the program has saved farmers and ranchers over 500 million dollars since it began.

Briscoe said there were 10,000 cases of screwworms reported last year compared to only 800 the previous year. There are indications that there may be even more outbreaks in 1969. There have been 60 screwworm cases in the first four months of 1969 compared to 40 cases on that date in 1968. Program officials said the large buildup of the costly pests was due to a mild winter and a wet spring in South Texas and Mexico.

The Screwworm Eradication Program was initiated by livestock owners who contributed money to get the program started. Several ranchers expressed the opinion that stockmen were ready to give again if necessary to continue the eradication program. Briscoe said the program officials were not asking for more money at this time, but were asking for stockmen to do their part in holding screwworm cases to a minimum. Ranchers were asked to observe their livestock closely, treat all wounds, send samples of all larvae collected to the Mission Lab, and spray all livestock.

Schaefer said plans were being made to alert all local livestock owners of the urgency of the screwworm situation.

Half Million Dollar Cattle Deal Made By Local Man

Raymond DeBusk, Cross Plains cattle buyer, has recently closed deals for about 3,000 head of calves and yearlings. They will be shipped to northern feed lots. The purchases approximate \$500,000.

Largest single transaction was a 1,250-head deal made with Jim Nail of Albany. DeBusk bought his current calf crop for the third straight year. The price was 34 cents per pound for steers and 32 cents for heifers. They were taken for July and August delivery. The steers will go to Weil Land & Cattle Co. in Lexington, Ky., and the heifers will be shipped to M & G Feedlots at Henderson, Colo.

A string of 600 heifer yearlings was bought from Howard Farmer at Olney. Delivery on this purchase will be accepted July 25 for M & G Feedlots.

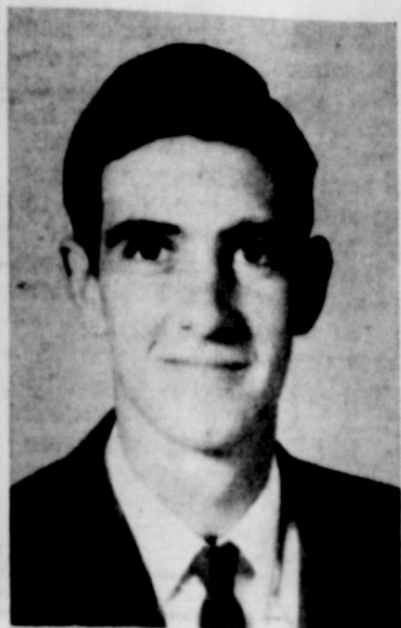
Wayne Ford Picked Chamber President

Go-Ahead Obtained For Sabanno Creek Project

Sabanno Creek Watershed Program was approved in Fort Worth Saturday at a meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board, according to an announcement from State Representative Burke Musgrove.

Musgrove said the project, estimated at about \$2 million,

covers 202,000 acres over Comanche, Eastland and Callahan counties. Its main function will be to stop further soil erosion in the area and protect Lake Proctor from refuse and sediment.

In addition, said Musgrove, the various low-water dams which are planned will give a boost to irrigation sources in the area and will provide recreational facilities. He said Gorman is planning such a facility at the present time.

County Commissioners from Eastland and Comanche counties will administer the project and maintenance. The project, which is to begin construction in about two months, should be completed in about five years, according to Musgrove.

Funds for the project come through the Federal Watershed and Flood Protection Act, said Musgrove.

The present average flood damage to crops and land is about \$100,000 per year in the area, said Musgrove, and the project is planned to reduce flood damage by about 70 per cent, sediment damage 70-90 per cent and erosion control about 80 to 90 per cent.

Contract Awarded For New Municipal Lake To Supply City of Clyde

Ford Allen Construction Company of Coleman is apparent low bidder for installation of Clyde Lake.

A bid opening in the State Soil Conservation Service office in Temple Thursday revealed three bidders on the job. The Allen Construction Company bid of \$246,648 for installation of Site No. 7 of the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed Program was \$7,706 below the bid by Lyles and Lyles of Ballinger. Leo Jenschke of Kerrville submitted

high bid of \$498,595 for the multi-purpose dam.

"Work can be expected to begin within 20 days from the final award of the job," James Herring, District Conservationist of the Baird Soil Conservation Service work unit states.

The Clyde Lake is one of 47 planned flood control structures in the Upper Pecan Bayou and Turkey Creek Watersheds above Lake Brownwood. The upstream program is designed to reduce annual flood damages to agricultural lands, cities, roads,

bridges, public utilities by about 70 per cent, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood.

Thirty-one of the 47 planned flood dams have been installed. The Clyde Lake, Site No. 7, along with No. 8, located on the Farmer and Evans ranches six miles south of Clyde, are the only remaining projects in Callahan County to be installed in the near future. The six upstream dams, known as Sites 13 through 18, are located within

the proposed Bayou Lake project just above Webb's Store and will not be built if the currently talked about large lake is built by the Corps of Engineers, Hughes reminds. Thus, 10 of the planned 47 dams above Lake Brownwood are yet to be installed with the Corps lake, or 16 will be in the planned program without the large Bayou project.

Supervision of construction on Clyde Lake will be under M. W. McNeese, Project Construction Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood.

Clayton Anglin will be the job inspector. Hughes pointed out that the Ford Allen Company has been one of the more reliable bidders and builders in flood control program for the past 15 years and recently completed two jobs, Sites 9 and 18A, on Upper Pecan Bayou.

Clyde Lake being a multipurpose structure, having flood detention, municipal and recreational water, will be jointly cost shared by the City of Clyde and the Soil Conservation Service.

Based on work plan agreement, City of Clyde will finance the municipal water development phase with 34.4 per cent of the cost attributed to recreational and municipal water development. The SCS, representing the federal government, will pay 65.6 per cent representing the flood control cost of the structure.

Municipal water and recreational items will be included in additional contracts following installation of the dam as planned by the City of Clyde.

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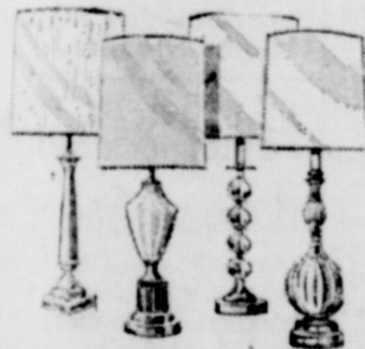

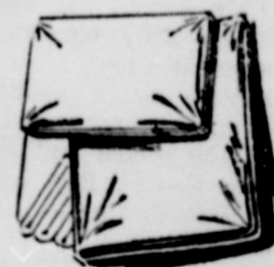

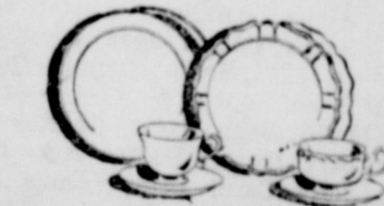

Beadels, Kilowatts Grab 2 LL Wins In First Week

Seemingly tables have turned in Little League action in Cross Plains. At least results of the season's first four games indicate such a trend.

First and second finishers in 1968 absorbed two losses each opening week, while the third and fourth place runners last season sported perfect records. The Kilowatts routed defending champion Buffs 22-6 in the season opener Tuesday of last week.

Postal Rates Seem Sure To Go Higher

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposal to raise the postage bill for residents of Cross Plains. Postmaster Dick Brown said yesterday.

Brown said he had been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington, D. C., that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added public tax burden.

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third-class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by taxpayers, the postmaster said.

For bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 percent to 20 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million.

The postmaster listed these other details on the proposed increases:

First-class mail: Letters and post cards would be increased one cent, to 7 cents an ounce and 6 cents a piece, respectively, on July 1, 1969. Airmail postage would remain 10 cents. This will yield \$557.2 million in new revenues.

Second-class mail: A handling charge of 3 10ths of a cent per piece for circulation outside home counties would become effective July 1, 1969. This would yield \$15.3 million annually and would represent a 12 percent increase in addition to the 8 per cent rise scheduled to take effect Jan. 1, 1970.

Third-class mail: For single pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This would yield \$12.4 million. For regular bulk third-class, the minimum would be increased to a uniform rate of 4.2 cents January 1, 1970, as contrasted with the present rate of 3.6 cents. The 1970 increase would lift revenues by \$46.8 million annually.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows:
"Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The repeal of the constitutional amendment to constitute, sole, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointments of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.
"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (or) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

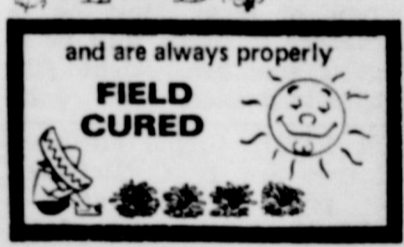

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of both houses of the Legislature.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."
