359 Local Children Get Physical Examinations

Mrs. Eulala Ault of Baird, registered nurse for Callahan County schools, reports having tested 359 of Cross Plains' 481 school children during the term just ended. Of that number 15 defects were noted, 11 of which received professional attention.

Hearing tests were given 64 children and two defects noted. Dental examinations were given 321, 53 of whom were advised to undergo treatment.

Throat examinations were given to 321 children with no serious defect noted.

Immunizations given included 57 for diphtheria, 38 for smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus two, boosters for D.P.T. seven and measles eight.

Tuberculosis skin tests were given all local first and seventh graders with no positive reactors noted.

Sabin oral polio vaccine in the two dose series was given to 123 and 260 received booster doses.

Pre-school immunizations were given: 14 for smallpox, D.P.T. (3 dose series) 5, D.P.T. Booster 9, measles vaccine 6 and polio boosters 10.

Brush Fight Starts In Eastland County

Twenty-five Eastland County land owners have voted to begin raising funds for brush control and range improvement research. John Matthews, Abilene area rancher and chairman of the Texas Brush Control and Range Improvement Association, discussed the objectives of the association with the land owners in a recent meeting at Eastland.

County Chairman Jamie Fry of Cisco said the association was formed last November by a group of land owners to raise funds to fight brush invasion of rangelands, one of Texas' major agricultural problems, and study methods of range improvement.

Fry said the plan is to solicit one cent per acre from each Texas landowner each year for five years.

Big Gas Well Hit In Burkett Sector

Thermo Dyne, Inc. of Norman, Okla., has completed a large gas well on the J. C. Bowden ranch east of Burkett.

Potential of the well has been estimated in excess of five million cubic feet daily. The flow was so strong that when casing was perforated, tools were blown from the hole and Halliburton specialists had to be called to "kill" the well while new safety valves could be installed.

Production is coming from the Fry sand, in the neighborhood of 1,800 feet. Location is 2,589 feet from the south and 700 feet from the east lines of the A. White Survey 161, Abstract 942 of Brown County.

Big New Development Set In Brownwood Lake Area

Perhaps the fastest growing residential area in this section of Texas is the Brownwood Lake vicinity, about midway between Cross Plains and Brown-wood.

A \$5,000,000 development program is now being initiated by the newly-formed Lake View Estates, Inc., which is expected to spark building activity in the locality for the next five years. Proposed development was announced recently as the cor-poration completed purchase of

approximately 965 acres adja-cent to the lake from Turner Estates.

Officials of the corporation also disclosed they are current-ly negotiating toward the possi-bility of a merger with Resort Properties Inc., which operates Lamar Terrace, a subdivision at the lake.

The projects will include golf course, club house, swimming pool, marina facilities, public and private boat dock facilities and a fishing pier.

Jimmy Helms Has Wheat Crop Expected To Exceed 30 Bushels

Cross Cut Native Gets PhD At A&M Saturday

Weldon H. Newton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Newton of Cross Cut, was awarded the Doctor of Philosophy degree in entomology during graduation ceremonies at Texas A&M Uni-versity on May 24. The 1954 graduate of Cross Plains High School formerly received the Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees from Texas A&M in 1958 and 1961.

Newton's doctoral disserta-tion involved a cytogenetic study of two species of Mexican cattle fever ticks and was entitled "Chromosome Patterns of Boophilus Annulatus, Boophilus Microplus and their F-1 Hybrids."

Local cattlemen will recall the fever tick eradication program which successfully eliminated the serious losses suffered by the cattle industry from "Texas Fever" transmitted by these ticks. Newton's work was the initial study in possible devel-opment of new tick eradication techniques which may eventual-ly provide for eradication in Mexico to eliminate the threat of re-infestation of the U. S.

The PhD recipient has been employed as Entomologist with the Agricultural Extension Ser-vice of Texas A&M University since 1960. He and his co-workers develop insect control recommendations for pests af-fecting public health, livestock and agricultural crops in Texas.

In this capacity Newton has authored many publications dealing with the identification and control of economically im-portant pests. In addition, he conducts extension educational meetings for producers, home-owners and public health per-sonnel across Texas.

Dr. Newton is married to the former Cynthia McCuin, daughter of Mrs. A. J. McCuin of Cross Plains. The couple and their two children, Angela Jan and Jon Harrison, reside at 305 Borderbrook in Bryan.

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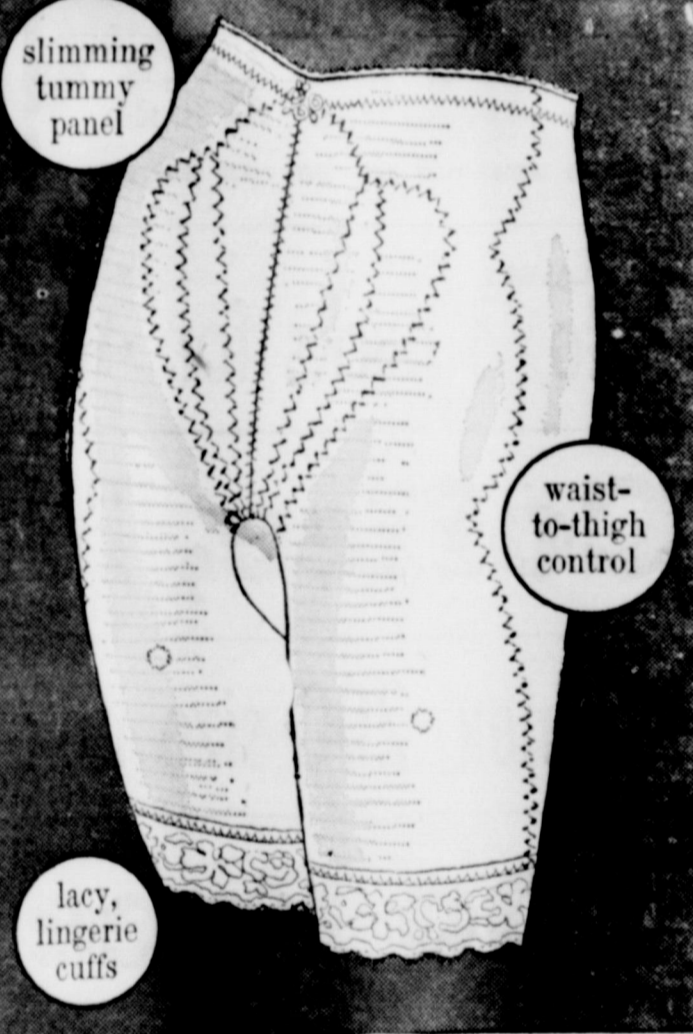

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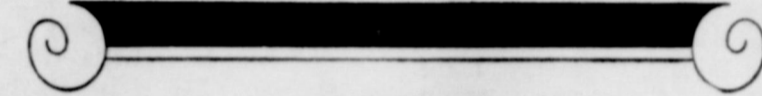
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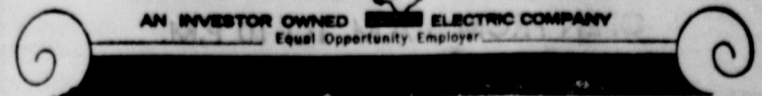
