Coleman County, which in-  
cludes Burkett and comes  
within less than four miles  
of Cross Plains.

The proposition was ap-  
proved by a majority of 10  
votes.

Coleman voters cast 404  
votes for the measure and  
372 against, while residents  
of Burkett cast 20 ballots  
for the proposal and 55  
against.

Absentee ballots in favor  
of the proposal numbered 27.

There were 14 absentee  
ballots against the proposal,  
bringing the total number of  
votes to 451 for legalized  
sale of alcoholic beverages  
and 441 against.

The election was called by  
petition and date was set by  
County Commissioners.

Several county-wide elec-  
tions on the same question  
had been held in past years,  
but this is the first such elec-  
tion on a precinct level.

All county-wide proposals  
to legalize the sale of al-  
coholic beverages and on-prem-  
ises consumption have failed.

Callahan County land own-  
ers and operators are being  
asked to participate in the  
local Brush Control and  
Range Improvement Associ-  
ation.

It is a non-profit, tax ex-  
empt association, formed to  
raise funds to promote re-  
sults of intensive research on  
the problems of brush and  
improvement of the land af-  
ter the brush has been  
brought under control.

Immediate goal of the as-  
sociation is to raise one cent  
an acre per year for five  
years.

# School Taxes Take 10 Per Cent Jump

Increased costs of educa-  
tion have come to Cross  
Plains schools, and property  
owners will see the result on  
1969 tax statements.

A blanket raise of 10 per  
cent has been ordered for  
all renditions. In addition an  
\$8 minimum has been set on  
farm and ranch lands. The  
\$8 figure, though, will be  
subject to the 10 per cent in-  
crease along with property  
of all other kinds, making  
the "floor" \$8.80 an acre on  
land tax renditions.

There are no exceptions.

Property of every nature  
within the Cross Plains In-  
dependent School District  
will be subjected to the in-  
creased levy.

School trustees pondered  
the tax hike through several  
sessions before ordering it  
to become operative.

"There simply was no al-  
ternative," said a spokesman  
for the board.

Recently-enacted laws dele-  
gate school boards with the  
authority to raise renditions  
from 10 to 50 per cent to fi-

nance soaring school budgets.  
The Cross Plains board chose  
the 10 per cent low and will  
strive to maintain that level,

although most neighboring  
school districts are already  
on a higher rendition pla-  
teau.

## Eula And Elmdale Vote School Consolidations

Only the formality of bond  
assumption elections at Eula  
and Elmdale remains before  
schools of the two communi-  
ties are officially consolida-  
ted.

Citizens of the adjacent  
school districts went to the  
polls Saturday and over-  
whelmingly endorsed the  
merger. At Eula the vote was  
74 to 0 and at Elmdale the  
count was 27 to 16 in favor  
of the proposition.

Property owners of the two  
districts must now ballot to  
combine bonded debts of the

two districts into obligations  
of the enlarged political sub-  
division. This is a formality  
required by Texas statutes.

The Elmdale school build-  
ing was destroyed by fire  
earlier this year and students  
have been temporarily trans-  
ferred into Abilene. Under  
the new arrangement they  
will attend classes at Eula, a  
system which some educators  
have described as a model of  
efficiency. Special housing will  
be arranged to accommodate  
Elmdale students and facili-  
tate their transportation to  
and from school.

## School Work Goes On During Summer

For some school teachers

tion ahead.

Cross Plains schools have  
two faculty members on 12-  
month tenures, two on 10 and  
two on nine and one-half  
month work programs.

Wayne Ford, superinten-  
dent, and O. B. Edmondson,  
vocational agriculture in-  
structor, hold 12 month con-  
tracts; Miss Betty Browning,  
title I director, and Mrs.  
Betty Odum, homemaking  
teacher, work on 10 month  
agreements, and the two  
principals, Scot Edington and  
Jack Watkins, have nine and  
one-half month schedules.

Two custodians and one  
bus mechanic at the school  
work on a year around ba-  
sis. They are Sam Lane, head  
custodian, and Junior Baugh,  
assistant, who are now catch-  
ing up with building main-  
tenance and schoolyard up-  
keep. The bus mechanic, O.  
B. Switzer, will get 10 regu-  
lar-run vehicles and four  
spare buses in tip-top shape  
during the summer, ready  
for opening for the new term  
the latter part of August.

"Despite the fact that we're  
not holding classes," said  
Supt. Ford yesterday, "there  
is plenty to be done during  
the summer and our full  
time people are always busy."

Although they are paid for  
only nine months, athletic  
coaches and the school band  
director will resume duties  
at the local campus in mid-  
August, preparing for the  
schedule ahead.

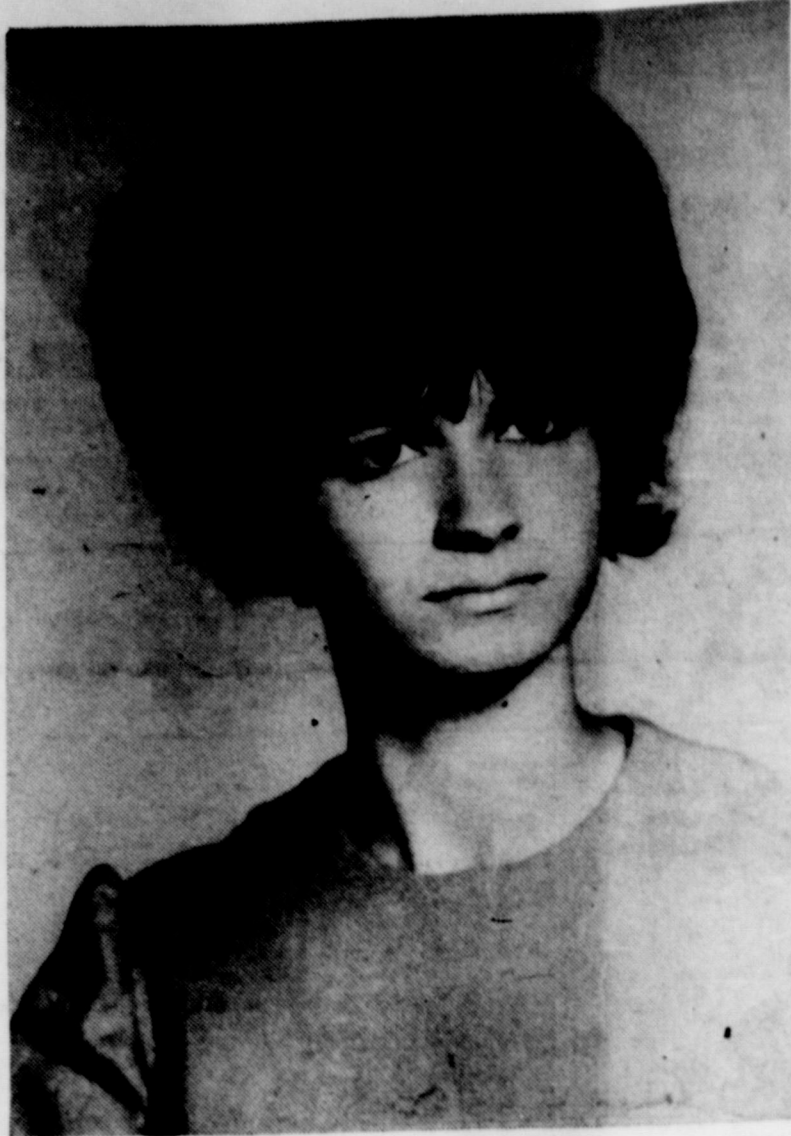

She was preceded in death by four sons and a daughter.

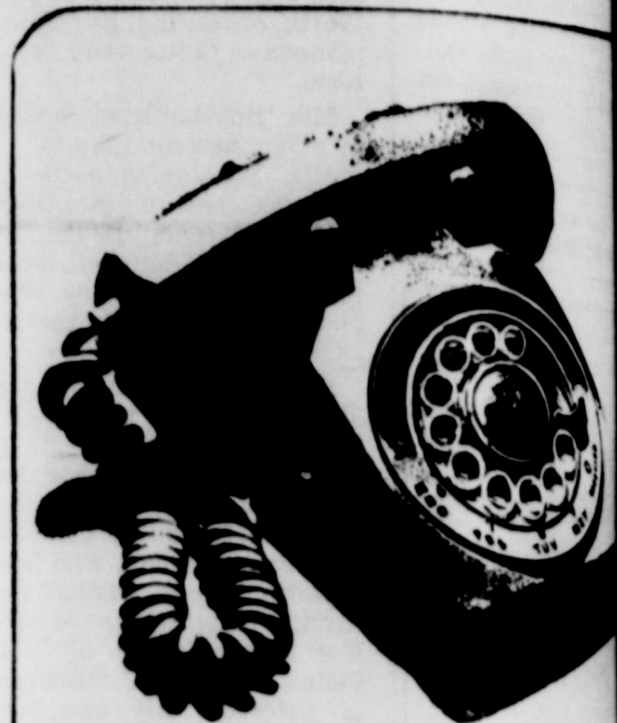
