Land Owners Lose Use Of Stream Water If Not Recorded By Sept. 1

Texas Water Rights Commission has announced that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the state must record his claim by Sept. 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible. Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was

in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective dates of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Justice Courts Collect \$8,473

Four justice courts in Callahan County tried a total of 429 cases last month, collecting an aggregate of \$8,473.75 in fines.

Precinct 5 (Clyde), for which M. E. Jolly is presiding justice,

tried 122 cases and collected \$2,376.25 in fines.

Precinct 6 (Cross Plains), for which Billy Charles McMullan is presiding justice, tried 62 cases and collected \$1,385.00 in fines.

Precinct 8 (Putnam), for which Mrs. Oollie Mae Fleming is presiding justice, tried 45 cases and collected \$773 in fines.

Harvesting Is Slowed By Recurrent Storms

Grain harvesting has been slowed in the Cross Plains area by repeated rains.

There have been scattered reports of crop damage from high winds and southwest of Burkett some loss occurred due to hail.

Combines were busy until late Thursday of last week. Just after dark a torrential downpour, accompanied by wind of near gale proportions, swept across this section.

Local grain buyers report the crop moving slower than expected. Some say there is not as much acreage planted to small grains in the Cross Plains area this year. Well-informed observers believe that the harvest is at least one-half completed.

Prices in Cross Plains Tuesday were around: wheat \$1.16 per bushel, oats 60 cents and barley 80.

Cross Plains School Lunchroom Gets \$38,000 Worth Of Foods

During the nine-months term just ended the federal government supplied Cross Plains school lunchroom with foods valued at \$3,800.93.

The foods were distributed from the Department of Agriculture's allocation of surpluses.

Principal item of supply to the local school was butter valued at \$837.60. Other main

products and their approximate value were as follows: cheese \$495.60, frozen turkey \$327.60, frozen boneless beef \$312, frozen pork \$310 and frozen cut-up chicken \$273.

The commodities were supplied to Cross Plains through the Brownwood distribution depot, for which Toney Bauer is the administrator in charge.

Fewer Snakebites Seen In Cross Plains Area This Year

Has the danger of snake bites lessened in the Cross Plains area? A local physician reported this week that he had not seen a snake bite case this year.

"Either people are more careful or the reptile population is shrinking," said Dr. Carl J. Sohns, city health officer.

Dr. Sohns warned, though, that the July 4 week end is ordinarily the most critical time. Of the four or five snake bite cases which he ordinarily treats each year, usually one or two come in over the Independence Day week end.

Notwithstanding the fact that there have been fewer snake bite victims here this year, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is currently warn-

ing that more people die from reptile bites in Texas than any other state. This year is expected to be no exception.

A bulletin on the subject issued by the state encourages Texans to obtain a thorough working knowledge of first-aid treatment for snake bite. In addition, it is pointed out, persons should learn how to avoid bites.

Statistics show that a large percentage of all bites takes place near the home, and more than a few of these are inflicted upon small children playing in their yards.

It's not really strange that snakes are attracted to civilized areas. The debris of civilization offers both a food supply of rats and mice, and cover.

Steps for making your home less attractive to snakes are simple, chief among them being removal of all rubbish. Rock piles, trash piles, stacked lumber, tree stumps and other forms of debris near or under houses should be removed.

Dense, low growing plants in settled areas where poisonous snakes are particularly abundant and present a serious problem, it may be necessary to take further protective measures.

Dr. C. M. Bogert of the American Museum of Natural History has suggested use of a quarter-inch mesh wire fence to keep snakes off residential property. This yard-high, snake-proof fence is placed around the house in much the same man-

ner as an ordinary picket fence, except that the bottom must be set about six inches into the ground to prevent snakes forcing their way beneath it.

In the field, where poisonous snakes are more common, they present a greater hazard to human life, consequently campers, farmers and others who spend a great deal of time outdoors should take extra care.

Because almost all snake bites are inflicted on the arms or legs, these limbs require special protection. The use of a little caution when placing hands or feet where snakes may be partially or completely hidden from view is the best protection you can give them.

This is particularly true when climbing hand over hand on

rocky ledges where your hands reach the level of the ledge before your eyes do.

Placing your hands and feet any place which you can't see is asking for trouble because snakes seek seclusion, and having that seclusion intruded upon makes them belligerent.

Snakes love to lurk under or in the shade of logs, so it might pay to look before you step over one.

Several types of footwear offer good protection against the bites of most snakes. Especially effective are high-top leather shoes, riding boots, rubber boots, or a combination of army "paratrooper shoes" and heavy puttees.

Probably the best of these is snakeproof pants.
