Cats, Beadels Locked In L. L. Pennant Race

Championship of Cross Plains Little League could go to the wire, or possibly beyond.

Cats retained the lead during last week's action, but Beadels cut the margin to only one-half game. That came in Thursday's opener when Beadels clipped the Cats 6-5.

If the issue is not settled in the final week of play which was to start Tuesday, the five rained-out games will figure in the final assessment. Three of the washed out tilts involve the Cats, and two include Beadels. One is a match between the two contenders.

Scoring Duel

In Tuesday's nightcap the Beadels and Kilowatts locked in a scoring contest. Fourteen Kilos crossed the plate in the first half-inning, but Beadels rallied for eight in the home half. Eventually Beadels won 26-15. Ken Hunter picked up the win in relief, and Ricky Westerman was the loser.

Highlight of the game was Randy Hunter's grand slam home run which knotted the score at 15-15. It was Hunter's second circuit blast of the season.

Cats were given a forfeit victory in the opener Tuesday over Buffs. In a three inning affair Cats owned a 19-11 edge in the

practice tilt played. Beadels closed the gap to the league throne in Thursday's initial clash edging Cats 6-5. The loss broke a nine-game win string for the Cats.

Cats took a one-run lead in the first inning, and padded that by another in the second before Beadels knotted the tally in the home half of the second. Cats then added two in the third, but again Beadels arose and claimed a 5-4 edge. Beadels added another in the fourth and Cats counted in the sixth.

Jimmy Bates was winning pitcher in going the route, and starter Tim Bishop was the loser. Jimmy Crawford relieved for two and two-thirds frames.

Kilowatts withstood a late Buff rally in second game Thursday in posting a 12-9 victory. Trailing 3-0 Kilowatt bats boomed in the third when 11 runs tallied. Buffs rallied for six scores in the fifth inning, but fell three runs short.

Westerman was the winner with relief by Randy Pancake. Loser was Royce Lawrence who went the distance.

Only Gleanings Left In Area Grain Fields

Only the gleanings are yet to be harvested from small grain crops throughout this section of Texas.

Cross Plains buyers, who were going at double time speed to accommodate movement of the crop last week,

were enjoying a more leisurely pace yesterday. Most combines have finished.

Average Crop

Consensus was that the 1969 crop will go into the record book as about average in yield but very low in the price it

brought. Number one wheat brought \$1.18 at the opening, but was down to \$1.16 at the close. This is about 10 to 15 cents per bushel lower than a year ago.

In the Cross Plains area about 20,000 pounds of wheat

went into government storage, being shipped to Corpus Christi where it was said to have netted \$1.25. That figure, though, was available only to producers who had complied with their allotments, not only on wheat but also on cotton and milo.

Largest Yield

Largest wheat yield reported here was one made by Morris Edwards on a tract of land adjacent to the Eula school building. C. Lee Smith, who combined the crop, said that it averaged 58 bushels to the acre. It is believed that this may be an all-time high for Callahan County.

Most wheat yields, though, were far below that figure. The average was nearer 15. Tommie Harris, one of the largest grain farmers in this locality, had some wheat which was well over the 40-bushel average.

Lewis Fortune was said to have averaged in excess of 40 bushels to the acre on barley. There were many good oat crops. Howard Gary was reported to have made near 60 bushels to the acre.

Hail, Rust Hurt

Two factors cut in the total tonnage of this year's grain crop. Some fields suffered from invasions of rust after the protracted wet weather, and others were damaged by hail. Everett Edington, who farms about three miles southwest of Burkett, lost one of the better wheat yields to a hail storm. Oliver Freeman and Deel Edington's crops were also damaged by hail.

Consensus was that the crop this year is poorer than that in 1968 and 1967, but about like that in 1966. Current prices, though, were lower.

Some grain farmers are now declaring that they may not plant wheat another year, contending that even with a good yield it does not prove to be economically profitable. Old timers point out that wheat sold for \$3 per bushel in 1919 and the dollar then was worth about four times that of today. "For \$12 per bushel, we could show a profit," commented one grower.

Buyer Paying 35 Cents For Steers

Raymond DeBusk, cattle buyer in Cross Plains, is presently contracting for deliveries to be made between the last week of August and early in October.

He bought 650 head from the Owen Ranch Tuesday, paying 35 cents per pound for steers and 32 cents for heifers. The cattle are being bought for Cornodal Cattle Company of Midland.

Inch Rain Falls On Monday Afternoon

Violent weather, which has characterized the first six months of 1969, flared anew in Cross Plains Monday. Rain, accompanied by severe thunder, lightning and some hail, began falling in torrential sheets shortly after 5 p.m. S. F. Bond, official Weather Bureau observer, gauged exactly one inch in Cross Plains.

Monday's moisture brought to 21.21 inches the total rainfall received here during the first 174 days of the year. Annual average is 24.54 inches.

Scattered reports from over the area set Monday's rain as follows: Paul Lutzenburger 1.50, Lewis Fortune 2.20, Collis Eager 1.40, E. G. Roby 1.70, Cottonwood 1.50, Cross Cut 50, Burkett only a trace, Rowden 1.90, Pioneer 1.20.

Marble size hail fell over much of the Cross Plains area, however, it was of short duration and damage was reported to be very light. In the Coleman locality, though, the hail was heavier and more damaging.

Monday afternoon's precipitation broke the most severe heat wave of the present summer. F. C. Newton, who watches the temperature closely in Cross Plains, reported 100 degrees for both Friday and Saturday afternoons.

Old Settlers Hold Plans Talk Friday

A meeting of Callahan County pioneer citizens has been called for Friday afternoon, June 27, to be held in the courthouse at Baird. Purpose of the session, which is to start at 2 o'clock, will be to set a time and place for this year's annual reunion. It is expected to be scheduled the second Friday in August.

J. Rupert Jackson of Baird is president of the old settlers organization.

For a short wedding trip the bride wore a pink flocked voile dress with double-puffed sleeves and white accessories.

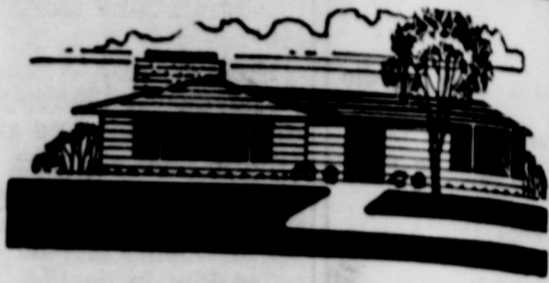
