Wish For Our Readers

Friday is July 4, Independence Day.

Your home town newspaper's holiday wish is that you will not be as cold as were those who celebrated July 4, 1924, in a snowstorm on Stone's Ranch near Cross Cut, nor as warm as was the crowd at a Confederate Reunion here July 4, 1901, when the town ran out of ice. Instead, it is hoped the day will bring happiness and enthusiasm as was manifested by a group here July 4, 1928, which revealed plans to form a new county, composed of the oil fields of Burkett, Cross Plains, Cross Cut, Hilburn, Pioneer and Blake. The new county never came about, but failure was not because of lack of enthusiasm for that was available in bottled abundance.

37-Year-Old Ex-Convict Admits Putnam Crimes

Cecil Ray Rinehart, 37-year-old ex-convict, pleaded guilty in federal court at Abilene Monday to having attempted to rob the Putnam post office Aug. 25, 1967.

U. S. District Judge Leo Brewster gave Rinehart an in-

termediate prison term up to five years, but he recommended that it run concurrently with other sentences already being served. He also has concurrent terms of 20 years from Abilene for armed robbery and 10 from Snyder for burglary. Rinehart has terms totalling 30 years for armed robbery and felony theft, assessed at Lubbock. He has been in the state penitentiary at Huntsville about two years.

Rinehart admitted breaking into the Putnam post office in an attempt to peel the safe, but leaving without any loot when his companion saw a couple watching them from outside a nearby cafe.

a favorite spot for many with several family groups planning gatherings there.

Persons traveling Texas highways are cautioned that rigid enforcement has been ordered of speed limits and traffic regulations. All highway patrol cars in Callahan County are now radar-equipped, and patrolmen will be working longer than normal hours.

All public buildings, including post offices, banks and courthouse will be closed the entire day throughout the county.

New FM Road Job Due This Summer

Four and one-fourth miles more of pavement will be built this summer on Farm-to-Market Road 2287, west of Cross Plains.

The State Highway Department has advertised for sealed bids. Submittals will be accepted in Austin until July 22. Contractor will have 125 days to complete the project and E. L. Harris will be engineer to supervise the project.

Five miles of pavement has just been finished on this road. It runs from near the highway Y in the western outskirts of Cross Plains to the home of Mrs. Flem Johnson. The new project will begin at the Johnson home and proceed westward to the Cutbirth ranch, a distance of 4.26 miles.

No L.L. Champ Crowned As Regular Season Ends

Championship of Cross Plains Little League could depend on a meeting of league officers and managers which was slated Tuesday night.

All-star selection was also scheduled for the Tuesday session.

A sudden-death playoff game between Cats and Beadels had been slated for Thursday to determine the pennant winner, but opposition to that solution proposed the meeting to iron out difficulties.

One bone of contention was reportedly that of five rained-out games which added to the perplexity of the situation.

Near Tie Exists

A near tie existed between Cats and Beadels following the final week of regular season which was concluded Thursday. Both leading squads posted 10 victories in the campaign, but Beadels had been beaten six times while Cats had absorbed just five defeats.

Cats and Beadels had battled each other from mid-season for the pennant. Beadels controlled the lead early in the season, but a rush by Cats gave that unit the top spot later. Beadels rallied in final stages, and the confusing status resulted.

Kilowatts Spoilers

Kilowatts, who claimed third place, played the role of spoilers in the final week's action. Tuesday of last week the Kilos upset the then league-leading Cats 12-3, and Beadels took a 13-4 victory over the Buffs. The Beadels triumph propelled the unit into the loop top spot.

Kilowatts then took away what they had given by beating Beadels 7-5 Thursday. Cats clipped the Buffs 8-5 which left the standings in the muddled condition which prevailed at the week's start.

Tuesday of last week Kilowatts used a late inning rally to whip the Cats 12-3. After two innings the squads were deadlocked 3-3, but Kilos insured the win with five runs in the fourth. Ricky Westerman was the winning pitcher in four innings, and allowed only three hits. Tim Bishop was the loser in relief of starter Jimmy Crawford. The two surrendered only five safeties, but issued 18 free passes.

Beadels overcame a two-run Buff lead in the home half of the first inning, and rolled to a 13-4 victory Tuesday. Beadels collected seven hits off three Buff hurlers, Tony Wyatt, Royce Lawrence and Phillip Bennett. Clarence Tension worked five innings and was the winner, and Kelly Henexson hurled one frame.

Kilos Whip Beadels

Kilowatts bunched scoring, three in the first and four in the third, to upend the Beadels 7-5 Thursday. Randy Pancake got the win in going the distance, and Jimmy Bates accepted the loss in going the route. Kilos got only one single, by Lynn Tatom, but collected 11 bases on balls. 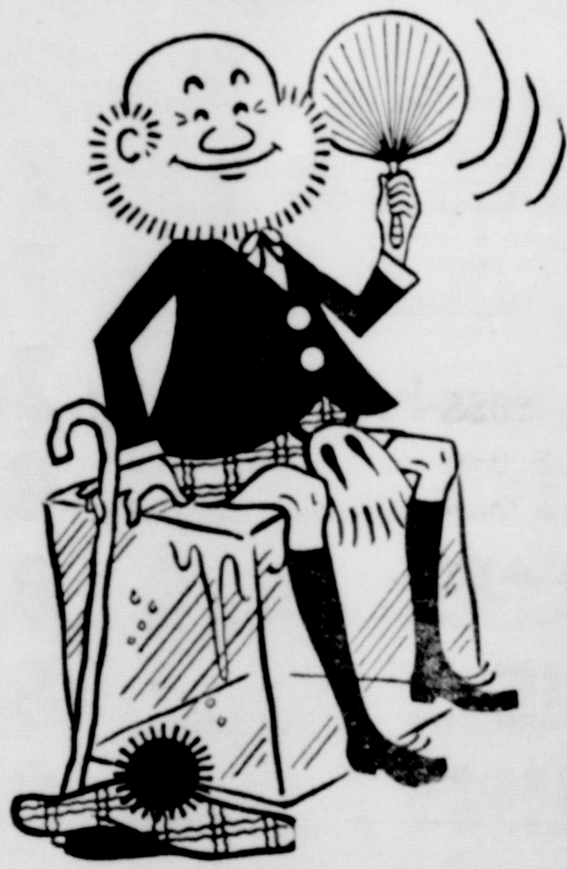

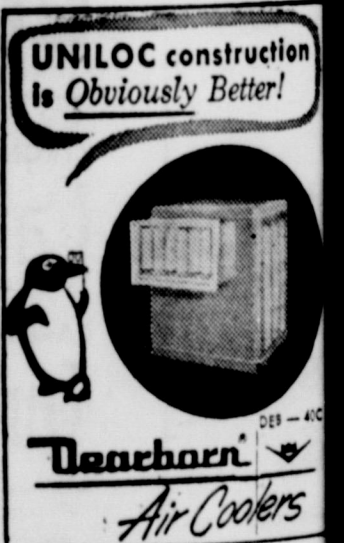
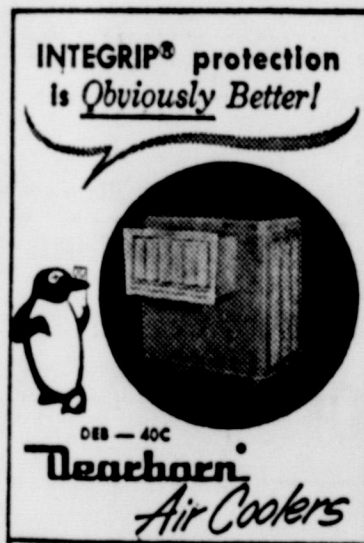

Glenn Payne Draws Wildcat Oil Probe

Cross Plains Sand will be tested by a wildcat oil venture on Glenn Payne land five miles west of this city.

No. 1 Payne is located 1,494 feet from south and 2,586 feet from east lines of William C. Hays Survey 186. The rotary test is slated for 1,800 feet by Laco Oil Co. of Abilene.

The same company also recently completed two oilers on F. L. Seale Trust in regular field six miles southwest of Baird.

No. 16, spotting 180 feet from north and 1,650 feet from east lines of Lewis Johnson Survey 252, was producing 22 barrels of 40.3 gravity oil. No. 17 Seale Trust, 150 feet from north and 2,209 feet from east lines of same survey, has a daily potential of 23 barrels. Pay was topped at 880 feet in each case.

Two more wells have been staked on the Seale Trust, and Laco also staked No. 5 S. E. Edwards, a 1,450-foot Moutray Sand probe, seven miles south of Clyde. It spots 2,190 feet from south and 2,160 feet from west lines of Section 15, BBB&C Survey.

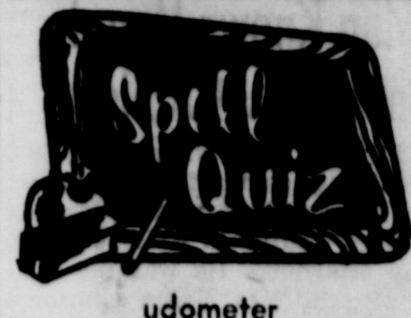
