Drillers officially won the Junior Teen Inter-Cities League baseball championship Monday night.

### Two No-Hitters

Driller pitchers Rodney Renfro and Robert Lewis hurled back-to-back no-hitters in the team's final two outings. Renfro mastered Hamilton Red Sox 18-1 Tuesday of last week. He struck out eight batters and walked only four. Hard hitting by teammates quickly insured victory in the five inning affair.

Lewis then duplicated the feat against Hamilton's Blue Sox on Friday night for an 8-1 victory. He fanned 14 and issued only one walk, which cost him a shutout when the runner came home on an error, in seven innings.

## Voters Face 9 Proposed Changes In State Constitution August 5

Texas voters go to the polls Aug. 5 to ballot on nine proposed changes to the state constitution.

Feeling that many people have not had time to study the propositions, the Review has prepared the following abstract of the proposed changes, which is intended to be an unbiased discussion of each.

**Amendment No. 1** This proposed amendment is a "clean-up" measure which makes no substantive change in the Texas Constitution. It eliminates superfluous sections of the state charter and re-words others for plainer understanding. Little opposition has been heard to this proposal.

**Amendment No. 2** This amendment would authorize issuance of \$3,500,000,000 worth of revenue bonds upon a two-thirds majority vote by Texas Legislature. The three and one-half billion dollars derived from sale of the bonds would be used to divert water from the Mississippi River, through a series of canals, pipelines and booster stations to various parts of Texas. Those who favor this

proposition point out that Texas' economic growth is dependent upon adequate water resources and this plan offers the best solution. Opponents argue that the plan will impose hardship on already over-taxed sources, that the cost of water may be too high for use by the people it is intended to help, and there is no assurance that necessary cooperation of other states to give the water can be obtained.

**Amendment No. 3** This submission would authorize a salary increase for the lieutenant-governor and speaker of the House of Representatives to not more than \$20,000 annually, and to set the pay of State Representatives not to exceed \$18,000 a year. Proponents point out that the legislator is no longer a part-time official and that the stipends likely will not be set at the maximum figure, that the present salary schedules are unrealistic and not commensurate with the jobs. Opponents argue the ceilings on salaries are too high and that public officials have too often voted all the electorate would allow.

**Amendment No. 4** This would amend a section of the constitution to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations for all ad valorem taxes, state and local. Proponents argue nonprofit water corporations perform a vital function and supply water in some sections where it would not otherwise be available and that they perform a governmental function. Opponents contend there are many privately-owned water supply corporations which are run for profit. These corporations, they say, would be placed at a competitive disadvantage.

**Amendment No. 5** This amendment would increase the statutory limit which may be spent in a single year for public assistance for the needy to \$80 million annually and appropriate \$15 million for each of the next two fiscal years for these purposes. Proponents claim this proposal is necessary with minimal standards and that families with dependent children are particularly suffering because of the state's existing ceiling on payments. They say if the proposition is defeated it

will cause another reduction in payments to needy persons. Opponents counter the large overall expenditure of state funds which this amendment authorizes would increase each recipient's income only a few dollars monthly and would require \$20 million in new funds each year at a time when the state is hard-pressed to meet its financial obligations.

**Amendment No. 6** This amendment would remove the constitutional interest rate on certain bonds subject to limitations imposed by the legislature. Proponents point out that present high interest rates make it difficult to sell municipal bonds at a rate lower than other comparable securities and that failure to pass this amendment may curtail or discontinue many state programs. Opponents claim adoption of this amendment would encourage state agencies to rely even more on creating bonded indebtedness. Too, they just generally dislike lifting the constitutional ceiling on interest rates.

**Amendment No. 7** This amendment would add governmental

employees, officers and agents, including volunteer firemen and members of police reserve, to persons whose surviving spouses and children are eligible for assistance as provided by law. Proponents believe the public has already voiced approval of this principle (aid to families of persons killed in performance of hazardous duties performed for the public) and that this amendment is needed to cover the full group for which it was originally intended. Opponents dislike the fact that the amendment does not place a limitation on the amount of assistance which may be provided. Cost to the electorate, therefore, cannot be determined. They also say that many of the employees within the scope of this change are in the employ of cities and counties, to whom this responsibility rightfully belongs.

**Amendment No. 8** Authorizes the legislature to provide for additional loans to college students under the Texas Opportunity Plan. Backers of this amendment say that funds presently available for college

loans will be used before repayments begin, that more money should be invested to improve and keep Texas' most valuable asset — its young people — within the state. Opponents say such funds should be available through banks and private enterprise, that able-bodied young people who are willing to work can easily finance their own schooling.

**Amendment No. 9** This amendment would provide for annual sessions of the Texas Legislature. Backers of the amendment believe annual sessions would provide a more realistic approach to state appropriations, that budgeting for the biennial requires greater foresight than can be reasonably expected, and that the yearly assembly has proved more workable in other states. Opponents argue the added sessions would only impose additional costs which would not be justified by accomplishments and that the constitutional change is not necessary, for the governor already has the power to call special sessions whenever they are needed.

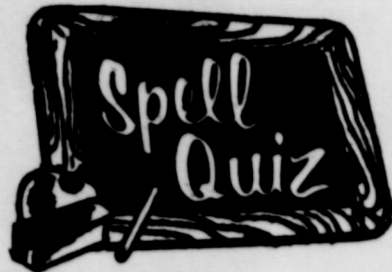
### Coats Family Meets In Annual Reunion
