## Peanut Enemies Meeting's Topic

from Texas A & M, will be here to discuss disease and insect control with local peanut producers, and to answer questions on these subjects.

## Chuck Thomas Takes Post Of City Marshal

Charles (Chuck) Thomas has assumed duties of City Marshal in Cross Plains. He began work Thursday after being hired by the City Council in regular session on Tuesday.

He fills the vacancy left by the death of Byron Richardson, who battled for life 31 days after being shot while on duty in the early morning hours of July 2. Homer Simons had served as interim marshal.

Thomas, 38, is a veteran lawman, having 12 years experience in the law enforcement field. He has held positions with Corpus Christi, Robstown, Rising Star and Coleman police departments. He also served as a deputy sheriff in Nueces County for a year.

He, his wife and three school-age children are expected to move to Cross Plains from Coleman in the next few days. The move has been slowed by inability to secure suitable housing.

## Decrease Of 30 Seen For School Enrollment

School students will register on Aug. 22, it was announced by Scot Edgington. He estimated enrollment will begin classes Aug. 25, as 170 at the close of last semester in May.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. Friday of next week and continue until noon, when a one-hour break will be taken. Work will be resumed at 1 p.m. and continue until 4. Students in all four high school classes must register at this time, Edgington said.

"Let me caution each high school student to bring a ball-point pen and be prepared to fill out numerous forms," he declared. In speaking of the increased enrollment, Edgington pointed out that whereas 38 students were lost by graduation last Spring, 68 advanced from junior high school.

An estimated 1,000 persons attended various activities during the day of the 31st annual Callahan County Pioneer Reunion held in Cross Plains City Park Friday. Despite the large turnout, only 347 pioneers formally registered.

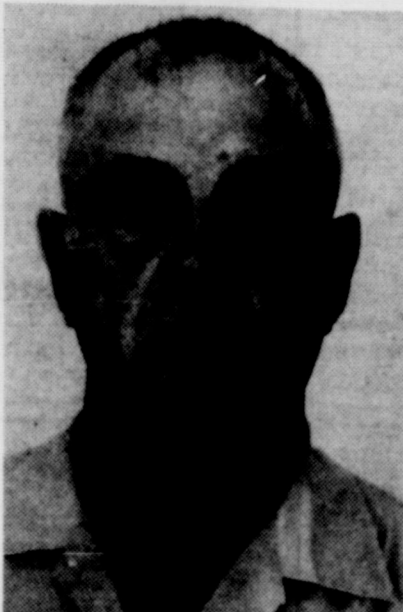
Hot temperature shortened visits of some of the old settlers, but failed to curtail reminiscing and joyous reunions of old-time friends and acquaintances.

**Spencer New President**  
Frank Spencer of Cross Plains was elected to head the old settler organization for the ensuing year, moving up from the vice-president post. He replaces J. Rupert Jackson, Jr. of Baird. Hilton Tarrant of Eula was named first vice-president, succeeding Spencer.

Other officials selected by pioneers in a business meeting include: Jewell Shirley of Putnam, second vice-president; James Paul Shanks of Baird, third vice-president, and Mrs. B. L. Boydston, who was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

**Day's Activities**  
The day-long program began with a 10 a.m. parade through downtown section of the city led and sponsored by the Cross Plains Riding Club under direction of parade marshal C. M. Garrett.

The Rev. W. C. Crawford, pastor of the First United Methodist Church here, gave the invocation.

B. H. Freeland of Baird introduced oldtimers who spoke to the gathering before A. E. Dyer, Jr. of Baird, Callahan County judge, led a memorial service for the deceased pioneers.

A noon luncheon served as intermission with the program continuing at 2 p.m. with recognition of old settlers and square

dancing exhibitions by a group from Abilene under direction of E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird.

**Pioneers Recognized**  
John A. Burks, who was born May 27, 1886, in Callahan County, was the earliest cowboy in the county registered and was also the earliest native born man.

J. P. Purvis of Cross Plains, who was born at Atwell on May 28, 1888, was the oldest native born man with continuous residence in the county.

The earliest pioneer woman was Mrs. Sam Barr of Cross Plains who came to the county in 1883, and Mrs. M. P. Wilcoxon of Cottonwood, who has resided in the county since 1892, was the earliest pioneer woman with continuous residence.

Mrs. L. Knox of Houston was born in Cottonwood in 1885, and was the oldest native born woman in attendance at the reunion, while Miss Elizabeth Burks was the eldest native born woman with continuous residence in the county, having lived on her home place between here and Rowden since 1898.

Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Wilcoxon of Cottonwood claimed the titles of couple married the longest and with continuous residence in Callahan, having been wed in 1905.

Loy Thompson and Mrs. Frank Wilson, both of Glendale, Calif., were recognized as the man and woman coming the greatest distance to attend the reunion.

Masters of ceremonies for the day were Freeland and Shanks of Baird and Randall C. Jackson of Abilene.

**Junior Rodeo**  
A play night featuring junior cowboys and cowgirls, sponsored by the local riding club, drew an overflow crowd. Estimates of spectators viewing the admission-free event which began at 8 p.m. ranged from 500 to 600.

No entry fee was charged nor were prizes given event winners. No official records were kept of several events, including barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing, greased pig contest and boot scramble.

Results of events that were noted follow. Maxey Evans of Cross Plains took first place in the 13-19 years breakaway calf roping with a time of 32 seconds, while Ricky Vestal of Baird had a score of 68 for first place in the 13-19 tiedown calf roping.

Barrel racing for youths 12 and under, saw Sam Koenig of Cross Plains grab first with 20.8 second timing, and Tianey Boyd of Cisco was a close second with in 21.9 seconds. Third place went to Glenn Boyd of Cisco with a clocking of 23.9 seconds.



### Small Turnout For Amendment Vote

Less than 20 per cent of the voters in Cross Plains turned out Tuesday of last week to cast a ballot on nine proposed amendments to the state constitution. The 135 local persons who did vote, though, approved six of the changes and rejected the other three.

Over Callahan County the same six amendments were approved and the same three rejected.

The county as a whole balloted 376 to 239 for amendment number one to modernize the constitution by striking out obsolete and superfluous sections. The vote in Cross Plains was 61 to 45 for passage.

On amendment number two (water development) Callahan County voted 401 for and 255 against. In Cross Plains the count was 73 and 52.

Amendment number three (legislative salaries) lost overwhelmingly in both the county and city. Callahan rejected it 159 to 477. In Cross Plains the tally was 36 to 79.

Proposition number four (tax exemptions) carried in the county 361 to 261. Cross Plains favored the proposal 56 to 52.

Amendment number five (public assistance) won overwhelming approval in both the county and city. The county favored it 463 to 210, and Cross
