Mrs. J. W. Fore Will Head Annual United Fund Drive

Mrs. J. W. Fore has been named campaign chairman for the annual United Fund drive to be made in the Cross Plains area. Her first assistant will be Mrs. Harold Garrett. They were appointed at a meeting of the U.F. board of directors Thursday afternoon.

Pat McNeel, Jr., U.F. president, reports that the two ladies will announce date for the money-raising campaign within the next few days.

An effort will be made to raise \$3,254.32. This is \$350

more than last year's goal, and believed to be the largest local U.F. budget in history. The increase will allow \$350 assistance to a Boy Scout troop.

Other items of the budget are as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$700, Medical and Research Foundation of Texas \$50, M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Research \$500, The Salvation Army \$175, American Red Cross \$175, Girl Scouts (local and council) \$404.32, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Local and

transient relief \$500, and the Christmas Cheer (Goodfellow Program) \$300.

Mrs. Fore said Monday that

this year's drive will definitely be made during the month of October, the exact date to be set within the near future.

Wheat Quota Cut 12 Per Cent Next Year

Wheat producers will have their quotas reduced by 12 per cent in the federal government's program for 1970, it was reported yesterday by J. C. Earp, office manager of the A.S.C.S. program in Callahan County.

Farmers signing up in next year's program can qualify for price-support loans, domestic marketing certificates and diverted acreage payments where they choose to withhold acreage below 1970 allotments.

"In other words," Earp said, "the 1970 program is very similar to the one followed in '69 with a few small exceptions.

Some of the major options are: (1) Divert 30.3 per cent of the 1970 allotment and plant 48 per cent and the full allotment, (2) Divert 30.3 per cent plus up to one-half of the 1970 allotment and plant the remaining acreage, and (3) Divert 30.3 per cent plus the entire 1970 allotment when it is 19.2 acres or less.

A producer can substitute wheat for feed grain or feed grain for wheat in any combination. Wheat may also be substituted for oats, where an oats base has been previously determined.

Sidney Man, Known Here, Hit By Accidental Gunshot

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Cox were in Sidney Sunday where they visited in the home of his nephew and wife, Postmaster and Mrs. J. A. Cox.

The Sidney couple's son, Terry, was critically wounded Aug. 22 in an unusual accident at Fort Worth, where he had gone to work only two days before.

The young man was in bed when a friend came into his room, playfully announced that he was going to shoot him, explaining later that he thought

the pistol he held was unloaded. He pulled the trigger and the weapon snapped. He repeated and it fired. The bullet hit Terry in the stomach, passing through his liver and small intestines and lodging in a kidney. He underwent five hours of surgery and was given repeated blood transfusions. He was returned home and is thought to be recovering satisfactorily, but will have to undergo another operation in about three months to remove the bullet.

D. A. Asks Death Penalty

Curtis Sherman Goade, Jr., 26-year-old painter, must stand trial on charges of "murder with malice and aforethought" in connection with the recent death of City Marshal Byron Richardson. That was the verdict of grand jurors in session at Baird Thursday.

At the arraignment Tuesday afternoon District Judge Raleigh Brown set trial for Nov. 10.

District Attorney Ed Paynter has announced that he will ask the death penalty.

Charles Scarborough, Abilene attorney, was appointed by the court to represent Goade.

Scarborough stated that he would not ask a change of venue, assuring that the case will be tried at Baird.

Judge Brown ordered that Goade be held without bail until trial time. His attorney had asked bond be set at \$5,000.

Goade's wife, who was with him when the Cross Plains officer was fatally wounded in the early morning hours of July 2, was no-billed.

Goade, who has been held in jail at Baird since being arrested at Cisco a few hours after the altercation, is charged with shooting Richardson in the elbow and abdomen after Richardson had given him a warning ticket for not having a Texas drivers license.

City Police Adds New Communication Facet

Residents of Cross Plains now have a faster and more convenient method of contacting city police.

City Marshal Chuck Thomas now has a base station radio in operation at his home, and through it and his mobil rig in his car, he can be contacted in a matter of seconds.

It went into operation last week after a telephone was installed at his home. The number is 725-2262.

Thomas said that city residents needing police should feel free to call at any time, day or night, noting that the telephone and radio would be manned continually. The system is an innovation for city law enforcement.

The communication system has proven effective wherever used. It puts Cross Plains into immediate contact with area police, including city, county and highway patrol offices and mobil units. Firemen applaud the system, stating that it could be of invaluable assistance in recruiting help to rural or city blazes.

An added safety measure is that Cross Plains can receive alerts of impending severe weather from Texas Department of Public Safety broadcasts.

Ballots Approved For Sept. 24 Peanut Vote

Ballots for the Texas peanut growers check-off referendum have been approved for the Sept. 24 crop assessment vote.

Peanut farmers will be asked to complete three major sections of the ballot. The first proposition is a vote on the self-assessment provision. Candidates for the Commodity Producers Board which will administer the check-off funds are listed in the second section of the ballot. The third section provides a space for the grower to indicate his last year's production in pounds on the ballot form.

New growers who had no production during the last crop year are still eligible to vote. However, they must certify on the ballot that they are new producers.

The Southwestern Peanut Growers Association at Gorman is the official body conducting the referendum. Information relating to production is available at all county ASCS offices.

All peanut growers are eligible to vote on candidates for the Commodity Producers Board regardless of whether they vote yes or no on the referendum proposition. Decisions of the elected board members will affect all peanut growers if the referendum is approved.

It is essential that growers indicate their last year's production in pounds on the appropriate section of the ballot, it was pointed out.

Ballots must be mailed to the polling site before midnight, Sept. 24, 1969.

New Law Requires Slow Traffic To Drive On Right

Local officers warn that "slow poke" drivers — a long-time hazard and source of irritation on the state's high speed roads — must now quicken their pace or keep to the far right when driving on divided highways.

It is now illegal to get near the centerstripe and move along leisurely.

Under a new law, which went into effect Monday, Sept. 1, vehicles traveling at less than the normal speed of traffic on divided highways must be driven in the right-hand lane or as close as practicable to the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway — except when passing.

In commenting on the new law, the Safety Association expressed hope that the traffic measure will be a practical solution to the mounting problem of slow drivers who tie-up traffic on heavily traveled roads and

are frequently a contributing factor in traffic crashes.

The new law should also ease the tension of drivers who use the high-speed inside lanes on divided highways and not only find it mechanically difficult, but also emotionally difficult to cope with such drivers, the Safety Association continued.

Many drivers become quite irritated when there is no safe way to pass a slow driver. They often take risks that they would not ordinarily take and wind up in trouble.

Another provision of the new traffic law calls for all moving traffic to stay right of the center line on roadways having four or more lanes or traffic — except when authorized to go to the left by traffic control devices, or when making left turns into or from an alley, private roads or driveways, regardless of whether there is a double yellow stripe or not.

Charlie Sowell was harvesting 45 acres of irrigated peanuts Tuesday, believed to be the first from the new crop to move to market in the Cross Plains area.

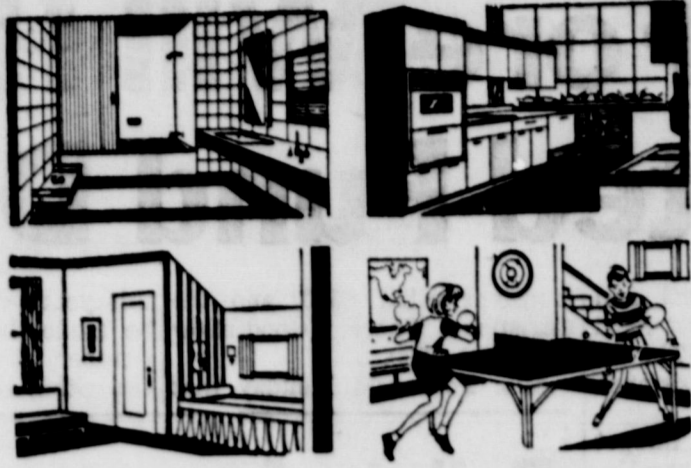
Conger Family Holds 20th Annual Reunion

Sept. 6, 1940: First bale of new cotton for the Cross Plains trade territory was brought in Wednesday by Porter Lee. A premium of \$20 was awarded by local merchants and professional men.

Sept. 5, 1947: Eight sets of twins enrolled this week in school. They are Dale and Donny Tennison, Herman and Shirley Weaver, Verna and Vernon Baum, Buck and Winnie Gibson, Edgar and Edwin Ramey, Billy and Bobbie Wright, Charles and Barbara Gibson and Roxie and Doxie Pillans.

Sept. 13, 1940: A local chapter of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers was organized Tuesday night. Primary purpose of this group's formation is to obtain a lunchroom for the local school system.

Sept. 5, 1941: Two school consolidation elections are pending in the near future. Voters will decide the future of Caddo Peak and Dressy schools.

Sept. 12, 1941: Enrollment at Cross Plains schools passed the 600 mark this week according to Lec Varner, superintendent.

Sept. 4, 1942: A giant junk rally is scheduled for Cross Plains Saturday. Every person is urged to give some metal to help this nation in the battle for victory.

Sept. 11, 1942: Mr. and Mrs. W. J. (Son) Sipes are the parents of a baby girl born Thursday afternoon. The little girl was named Rita Gay.

Sept. 3, 1943: Congressman Sam Russell was in Cross Plains last week end.

Sept. 10, 1943: Four inch rain breaks drought. The consensus of farmers, merchants and everyone in general seemed to be that, "It was a million dollar rain."

Sept. 1, 1944: Fred Tunnell, local banker, had the misfortune of breaking his left arm just above the wrist. He was riding a tractor with J. C. Bowden and was thrown from the vehicle as he started to dismount.

Sept. 8, 1944: The Cross Plains school doors were thrown open Monday morning for a year of better learning with 450 students registering. Opening exercises were begun with an address by Superintendent A. J. McCuin.

Sept. 7, 1945: Pioneer High School transfers here; 40 student increase.

Sept. 14, 1945: Approval of a three-year highway construction program totaling \$6,467,000 for the 12 counties of this highway district has been made by the highway commission.

Sept. 6, 1946: Enrollment tops all-time record for the 46-47 school year as registration in Cross Plains nears 700. The local system also boasts a staff of 24 teachers.
