County Is Lagging In Bond Purchases

Saving Bond sales in Callahan County during the month of August totaled \$3,808, according to County Chairman Howard Farmer of Baird. The year-to-date sales total is \$44,768 for 34 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$130,000.

During August total sales of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas amounted to \$15,376,241, an increase of 6.8 per cent over sales during August 1968. Last year sales in Texas totaled \$14,390,299 during the month. Year sales to date totaled \$119,638,086 for 70 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$170.1 million.

Over the nation the sale of Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares for the first eight months totaled \$3,277 million with 67.4 per cent of the goal achieved. August sales of Freedom Shares were \$27.5 million, up 11 per cent over August 1968.

Moms And Dads Dig Deep For Inflated Costs Of College This Year

In Callahan County, the proportion of young people going to college this Autumn is said to be greater than ever before.

And, at the same time, as the parents of these college-bound youngsters are discovering, tuition costs will be at an all-time high.

On the basis of local enrollments and the new schedules

of rates for tuition, fees, room, board and incidentals — the parents of these students will be shouldering a \$465,333 load for the current academic year, it is estimated.

Tuition Costs Up
The Institute of Life Insurance finds the cost of sending children to college for four years could amount, for some

families, to the biggest expenditure of their lives.

The total could very likely add up to more than they invested in their homes.

This is particularly so in the families that have two or more youngsters to put through college.

Facts and figures on college costs and enrollments have be-

come available through surveys made by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and others.

Seven Million In College

They show that no less than seven million Americans will be attending college this year, as against 2,935,000 in 1960.

Of this total, Callahan County

will be supplying 175. In 1960 the number from the local area was about 120.

As to cost, at state colleges and other publicly supported institutions, the bill will come to about \$1,600 on average, for tuition, fees, room and board. Some charge more for out of state students and less for local ones. At private colleges,

the average will be close to \$2,500 this year.

To these figures must be added the cost of books and supplies, clothes, transportation and incidentals.

The \$485,333 overall cost for Callahan County families, is based upon half of the students going to public colleges and half to private ones.

Precipitation for the first 265 days of 1969 totaled 25.89 inches in Cross Plains. This is nearly an inch more than the annual average, and the current year has three full months more to run.

Wettest September on record for Cross Plains was in 1964 when 8.95 inches fell. Wettest year on record for Cross Plains was 1941. Rainfall that year totaled 43.25. The following year, 1942, was the second wettest on record when 41.20 inches of moisture was recorded.

Peanut farmers have welcomed recent showers, feeling that the additional moisture helped to mature late nuts. Cotton producers, though, complain that the moisture aided insects and reduced yields. Livestockmen report pastures lush and the prospect for winter grazing the best in more than 10 years. Most ponds are full and streams have been running.

Clasp Envelopes — Review

Pecan Crop Said To Be Half Size

Best opinions are that the pecan crop in the Cross Plains area this year will be about one-half of normal size.

Heavy rains at the wrong time of the year and more than a normal amount of chuk-worms and case borers are blamed with being chief causes of shorter yields.

While actual tonnage of nuts will be smaller, size of the individual pecans appears to be noticeably larger. This is particularly true at the C. T. Barton orchard, three miles northeast of Pioneer, where 100 well-tended trees promise a crop about half the size of that gathered a year ago. The Burkett variety seems to have suffered more than possibly Stewarts and Halberts.

Native pecan trees, too, have less than a normal yield.

Indications are that pecans will be from 10 to 20 cents per pound higher this year, due mainly to the under-supply.

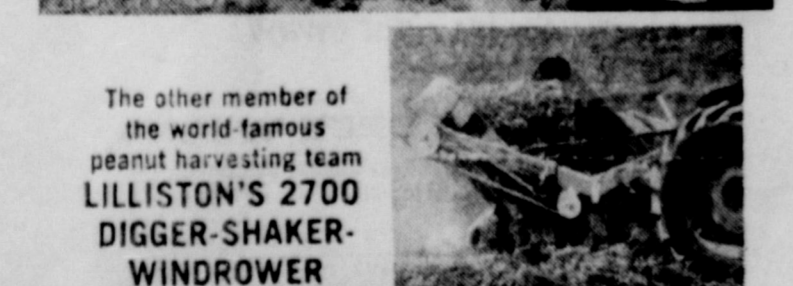
