The poet who wrote: "Come along and grow old with me, the best of life is yet to be," must have been inspired by such a couple as Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Butler of Cross Plains.

They celebrated their sixty-ninth wedding anniversary Friday at their home on State Highway 36, in the western edge of town. They are today Cross Plains' longest married partners.

It was in the home of her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Bond, that the young couple faced the Rev. E. C. Austin to plight their troth on Sept. 26, 1900. One of the three persons who stood with them at the improvised altar on that long ago wedding day was still around last week to offer congratulations. He is S. F. Bond, Mrs. Butler's brother.

The Butlers moved to a farm owned by her father, between here and Dressy, and lived there 10 years.

When their oldest child, a son, LeRoy, who now lives in Abilene, started to school they moved to Cross Plains and built the home they now occupy. Their only other child, Mrs. Porter (Faustine) Henderson, passed away several years ago. Mr. Butler, who is now 93, is a retired merchant. Mrs. Butler is 92, and despite the fact that she must read with a magnifying glass, she continues to be one of Cross Plains' best informed ladies. Both her mind and her interest remain keen and she stays abreast of day-to-day developments around the world.

"I'm grateful for having lived in what I believe to be the most eventful age in all history," she said to Mrs. M. C. Baum, a longtime friend, this week. "I've seen transportation move from the ox cart through various stages to interplanetary vehicles and it has all been most interesting."

New Law Demands Written Vote Form

Voter registration period opened in Texas Wednesday with one significant change in requirements.

Albert Lovell, Callahan County tax assessor-collector, offered the following explanation:

Every applicant for registration in the voting year 1970 must submit a written application showing the following:

1. Applicant's name, sex and post office address (or if living in an incorporated town, the street address).

2. Statement of the applicant's age. If the applicant has not attained the minimum age for voting (21 years) the applicant must show date of birth by month, day and year.

3. A statement that the applicant has resided in the state more than one year, in the county more than six months, and in the city or town more than six months immediately preceding date of application; or, if not a resident for such length of time, a statement of the date on which he became a resident of state, county and city, as the case may be.

4. A statement that applicant is a citizen of the United States.

5. If application is made by an agent, a statement of the agent's relationship must be included. No person other than husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter of a person is entitled to act as agent for an applicant. However, none of these may act as agent unless he is a qualified elector of the county.

Lovell explained that if an applicant is unable to sign his name because of physical disability or illiteracy, he shall affix his mark, if able to do so, which shall be attested by a witness whose signature and address must be shown on the application.

Persons applying by mail are required to do it by Jan. 31.

For the convenience of property owners, voter application blanks are printed on the reverse side of 1969 tax statements. Additional application forms are obtainable at the offices of tax assessors and collectors and at other places to be designated later.

Lovell also cautioned that care should be taken to see that the right number of the applicant's voting precinct is listed. Polling places in this county are numbered as follows: Baird, 1; Clyde, 2; Cross Plains 3; Putnam, 4; Eula, 5; Denton Valley, 6; Oplin, 7.

Tax Values Up \$111,769 In Callahan, Lovell Says

Tax valuations grew \$111,769 in Callahan County during the past 12 months.

This fact was announced yesterday as members of Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell's staff prepared 1969 tax statements for mailing.

Assessments for 1969 totaled \$13,235,589 as compared with \$13,123,820 for 1968.

Of the \$188,884.24 in taxes due to be paid to Lovell's office, \$105,886.61 will go to the county, \$34,615 to the Farm-to-Market Road program and \$48,381.98 to the state.

Lovell pointed out that the \$11,769 increase resulted after sizeable reductions in the oil and gas renditions from a year ago. This loss was overcome and the accompanying increase, he declared, was made possible by new buildings mainly in the Clyde and Eula communities.

Bufs Drop Third Tilt To Wylie Squad 39-0

Wylie Bulldogs scored 30 points in the second half Friday night in Buffalo Stadium and blanked a listless herd of Cross Plains Buffaloes 39-0.

It was the Herd's third consecutive loss in as many outings this season.

Wylie made a shambles of Buffalo defenses in the third quarter. The visitors netted 23 points in the period started by a 103-yard touchdown return of the kickoff after intermission.

Cross Plains began the contest with a good drive, 44 yards in 13 plays, before bogging down at the Wylie 26. It was late in the game before Bufs threatened again, the end result of a desperation passing attack.

After killing a Wylie drive early in the second period penalties shoved locals into a hole at the 11. Bulldogs partially blocked a Buff punt, and took possession on the Herd's 24. Quarterback Randy White sneaked two yards for the touchdown with 6:52 left in first half. Marlin Wilson kicked the point.

Wylie scored a two-point safety with 55 seconds left when End Barry Gipson trapped Buff Steve Fortune in his own end zone.

103-Yard Run

Wylie Fullback Doc Sublett bolted 103 yards with the second half kickoff after once fumbling the ball which had

been touched by a Bulldog upfield. Conversion failed.

Guard Jimmy Leverett gave Wylie the ball three plays later, but Bufs stopped the drive at the three. Bufs punted, and Wylie roared back with Halfback Larry Brown going up the middle for the final five of a 36-yard drive. Wilson added the point with 4:10 left in the third. Wilson then booted a 32-yard field goal three minutes later for a 25-0 lead.

Leverett smothered his second fumble at the Herd 20 about 10 seconds later, and Sublett blasted through a host of Bufs on first play. Wilson again split the uprights.

A pass interception by Bulldog Brown set another Wylie drive in motion, but Buff Left Tackle Robert Lewis ended it with a fumble recovery. Midway of the final period a Buff fourth down gamble failed, and Wylie gained possession on the Herd's 47. On second down Sublett rambled up the middle 46 yards, and Wilson added the 39th point.

Buff Left End James McMillan blocked a Wylie punt, and Quarterback Ronnie Pancake promptly hit Right End Leslie Cowan with a 30-yard pass. Four downs later Pancake passed to McMillan who finally ran out of blocking, time and into too many defenders 27 yards down-field at the Bulldog five.
