Agricultural Census To Be Made Through Mail

The 1969 census of agricul- ture will be conducted entirely by mail with no enumerators involved, Tommie Harris of Cross Plains, chairman of Call- ahain County Agricultural Sta- bilization and Conservation Committee, said Saturday.

According to the chairman, the Bureau of the Census has announced that in January, 1970, every operator of a farm or ranch will receive a census form by mail and will be asked to fill it out and mail it back.

Harris said the decision to use the mail method is the latest in a series of plans to gain efficiency and economy by using the mails to the greatest possible extent in conducting all censuses.

He said the completed ques- tionnaire for each farm, ranch or other agricultural operation will be completely confidential. He urged all farmers to cooper- ate in the census.

The information obtained, without names or clues to iden- tify, will be grouped in statis- tical totals and published by counties and states as well as for the entire nation.

Harris added that in addi- tion to the number and acre- age of farms, the agricultural census will ask farmers for an estimate of values of land, buildings, amount of time farm operators worked at off-farm jobs, and number of autos, trucks, tractors, combines and implements.

J. W. SORRELLS, JR. IS BUSINESS VISITOR HERE

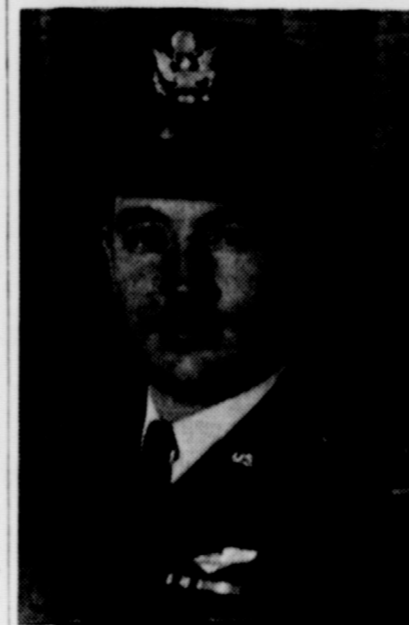

Buffaloes Test Santa Anna Mounties In 9-A Warfare Friday Night

Cross Plains' Buffaloes will head for the hills Friday to take on the Santa Anna Moun- tainers in a District 9-A foot- ball conflict.

Friday's clash will start at 7:30 p.m. instead of the 8 o'clock beginning in the four previous non-conference tilts.

Seek Improvement Both units will be seeking to improve league finishes posted in last year's campaign. Santa Anna was winless in the four outings, and Cross Plains di- vided evenly in the quartet of games, finishing in a tie for third.

Both teams looked forward to better seasons at the start of the '69 campaign, and the Mountainers have already im- proved on their 0-10 mark ball with an opening victory over Baird. Bisons, however, have not been victorious in four out- ings. Cross Plains was rated a solid second at season's begin- ning and a possible challenger to the pre-season favorite

Bangs. Santa Anna was de- legated fourth place, but it was noted possibly possessing the personnel to stage some upsets.

No Mutual Foes The two squads have not

played a mutual opponent, al- though Baird was scheduled by both. The Buffalo-Baird game was washed out by a rainstorm last Saturday.

Defensive statistics reveal the elevens virtually even. Santa Anna has given up 128 points in five games for an average of 25.6, and Cross Plains has surrendered 105 points in four tilts, a mean of 26.2. Offensively, though, the Mountainers have fared much better. Fri- day's hosts have tallied 52 points, an average of 10.2 per game, while Bisons have scored only one touchdown.

A pattern has developed in games between the two schools the past few years, and should the trend continue, Buffaloes will emerge victorious. Since 1964 each school has won over the other two consecutive years before the other claimed a tri- umph. Cross Plains broke a two-year win string by Santa Anna last year with a 29-0 victory.

Mountainers Large

Mountainers present a se- nior packed lineup with numer- ous starters back from last year's contingent. Most of the experience is in the line, but

the backfield also boasts vet- erans.

Heavyweight linemen are tackles Nolan Perry, 195-pound senior, and Roddy Dean, 190- pound junior. Experience is also available at the guard slots in Ronnie Walton, 170 junior, and Raymond Valdez, 150 senior, and senior David Yancy, 155, at center. End positions also are manned by experienced per- sonnel.

Backfield Less Experienced

The backfield is somewhat less experienced, but has over- all good speed. Senior Don Fitzpatrick, 160-pound senior,

is explosive as is senior Jerry Horner, 165. Signal calling is handled by 175-pound Ricky Beal, sophomore. Other capable runners are available in Ron- nie Cooper, 155 junior, and Dan- ny Williams, 130 senior, who doubles at end on occasions.

Buffalo Head Coach Les Cow- an said first of the week that barring practice injuries, the Herd should be in near top shape for Friday's district open- er. Junior J. S. Archer, who has been injured, is slated for limited duty, probably at offensive tackle, according to Cowan.

Baltimore and New York opened the World Series, thousands of football games, elementary through professional ranks, were played, a pair of professional basketball teams collided in Abilene and rain canceled the annual Baird-Cross Plains gridiron clash Saturday night.

Through it all Ben's Grid Picks and District 9-A managed to slightly improve their images.
