Buffaloes Nearing District Championship

Buffaloes have won the District Championship, but the game comes Friday. Kickoff is 7:30 p.m.

The Thundering Herd won at least a share of the crown by beating Early Longhorns 48-29 last Saturday night.

A victory Friday would give the Bisons the 9-A title outright and a bi-district berth against winner of District 10-A, now led by De Leon. A loss, however, would move Bangs into co-leadership and entail a number of possibilities involving Cross Plains, Bangs and Santa Anna.

Aim of the Buffaloes will be to settle the issue Friday with a win in the last 9-A clash of the campaign.

Stats Favor Bangs

As usual season statistics seem to favor Bison opponents. Offensively the Dragons are a bit more potent, scoring 15.75 points per outings in eight games, while Bisons have averaged 14 markers in seven outings. Defensively the Dragons also rate a slight nod. Bangs has surrendered an average of 20.75 points per contest or an aggregate of 166, and Cross Plains has allowed a mean of 22 points, a total of 154. Each unit has won three games, while the Buffs have lost four and the Dragons five. Bisons own a 3-0 league mark and Bangs is 1-1. Comparative scores tend to

favor the Herd slightly. Cross Plains defeated Early by 19 points while the Dragons won by 14 points, and Buffaloes clipped Goldthwaite 16-13 while Bangs dropped a 31-7 decision. Both units lost to Jim Ned by similar scores early in the season. Bangs won last year's clash 37-0 on a snowy, slippery field.

Dragons Talented

A number of outstanding veterans are back from the Dragon 5-5 squad of 1968 which shared the loop championship with Goldthwaite.

An especially fine backfield includes Quarterback Billy Nelson, 161-pound senior, who is a capable runner and fine passer. Ample help is available in running backs Phillip Sheffield, 180 senior, Randall Bush, 165 senior, and Darcy White. End Maurice Huggins is Nelson's top pass receiver. Interior line is headed by tackles Johnny Meador, 200-pound senior, Loyd Cole, 170-pound junior, guards Paul Rodriguez, 175 senior, and Mike Harper, 180 junior, Danny Woodridge, 190 senior, mans the pivot spot.

Several Bisons sustained painful bruises in the Early game, but Coach Les Cowan opined that none were seriously injured, and all should be ready by Friday.

Damage Light From First Frost Over Area Sunday

First frost of the season blanketed the Cross Plains area late Sunday night and in the early hours of Monday morning. It was not regarded as a killer though, as only tender vegetation suffered.

Average date for the first killing frost in the Cross Plains area is Nov. 10.

There were no reports of ice here early Monday, however, temperatures are known to have hovered close to the freezing mark just before sunrise. The Weather Bureau in Abilene reported 32 degrees was registered there.

Damage from the Sunday night and Monday morning frost was minimized here by the fact that vegetation was wet from an approximate half inch of rain, which had fallen 24 hours earlier. In Cross Plains the precipitation was measured by F. C. Newton, official observer, at 47 of an inch. Alton Tatom gauged .60 at Atwell and Frank Spencer reported an exact half-inch at his place, 14 miles west of town.

Soil Fertility Topic Of Shortcourse At Baird

A three-night soil fertility shortcourse will be held Nov. 11, 12 and 13 at Callahan County Sheriff's posse clubhouse in Baird. Starting time each night will be 7:30.

The shortcourse will be an introduction to soil fertilizers and soil management.

Dr. John Chapin, area agronomist from Stephenville, will give the first night's program

on general fertilizer recommendations for crops grown in this area. Also he will present information on use of potassium.

Dr. Charlie Welch, head of the soil testing laboratory at Texas A&M, will present the program Wednesday, Nov. 12. He will explain soil test interpretation and give an explanation of phosphorous requirements in this area.

The last night's program will be given by extension agronomist John Box from College Station. Nitrogen sources and uses and soil management will be his topics.

Interested farmers, ranchers and businessmen are invited to attend.

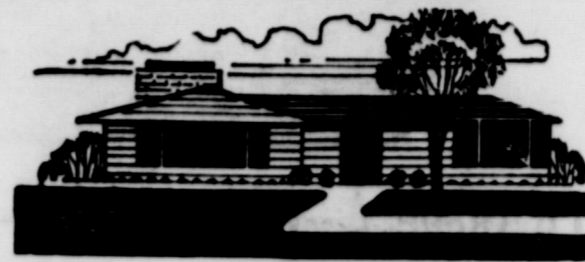

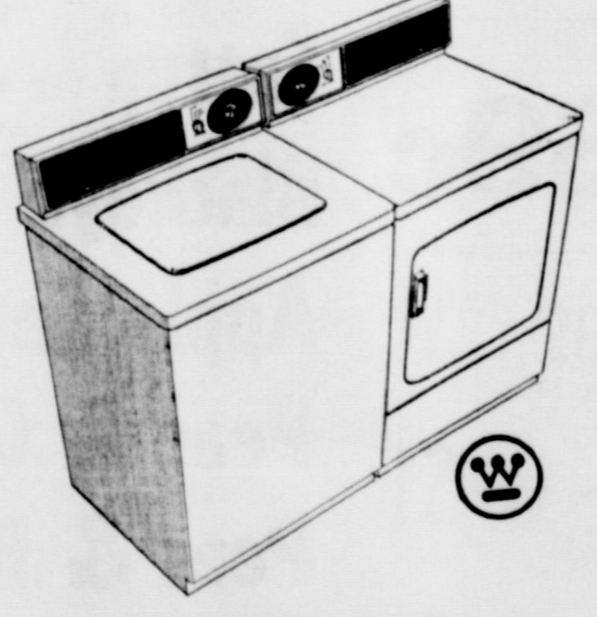

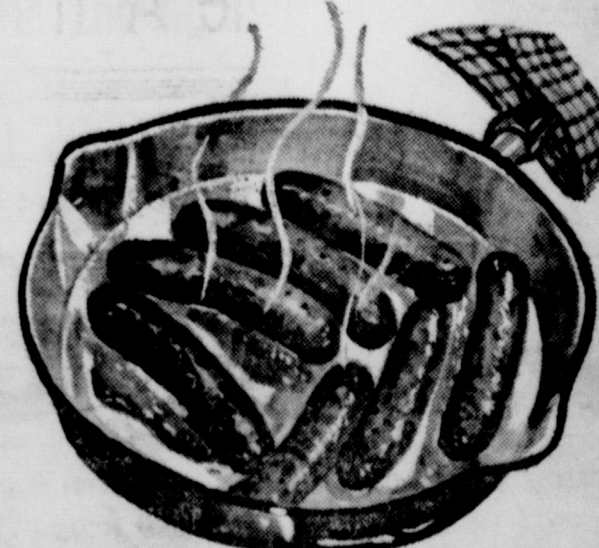

Herd Beats Early 48-29 For Share Of 9A Crown

Cross Plains Buffaloes captured a share of the District 9-A football championship by outscoring host Early Longhorns 48-29 Saturday night. The 1969 Herd is the first grid-iron champ since 1956.

As the 77-point aggregate score indicates, Saturday's clash was a wild offensive display. Buffaloes amassed 494 net yards from scrimmage, 325 on the ground and 169 through the air. Longhorns totaled 298, 198 on passing and 100 rushing.

Cross Plains had 14 points only three minutes and 17 seconds deep in the game, but a scrappy Early eleven battled back. Bisons led 23-14 at intermission, but early in the fourth period Longhorns cut the lead to five points, 34-29. Another Herd surge pushed the score to the final 48-29 count.

First play from scrimmage Halfback Bobby Cowan hit over right tackle, cut left and raced 70 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Ronnie Pancake passed to Left End James McMillan for two points and with only seven seconds gone Cross Plains led 8-0. Three minutes later Pancake lofted the ball to McMillan as the defender fell and the Buffalo end outran pursuers remaining 50 yards of the 75-yard play.

Early drove back 62 yards, to the Herd's three, but was held on downs. After a short punt Longhorns scored with Tailback David Kemp going the final seven, cutting the margin to 14-6 with 9:08 left in the

second canto. Only 24 seconds later McMillan tallied on a 62-yard screen pass, aided by fine blocking. Pancake then threw to Right End Larry Bishop for 21st and 22nd points.

Fumble exchanges preceded Bishop's grabbing an Early lateral and waltzing five yards into the end zone with 6:43 left in first half. Just over two minutes later Early scored on a 21-yard pass from Quarterback Lance Blackwell to Left End Keith Ward. Blackwell ran the two-point conversion.

The Longhorns cut the deficit to six points after taking the second half kick. Blackwell sneaked in from the two and circled left end for the two bonus points and a 22-28 tally.

Bisons stormed back 85 yards in 14 ground plays taking five minutes, nine seconds. Wingback Leslie Cowan followed his left side for the final three yards and a 34-22 lead.

Early again retaliated primarily on a passing attack, covering 75 yards in 11 plays, with Blackwell again sneaking for the final yard. Kemp kicked the point, and Early trailed by only five, 34-29 with 26 seconds gone in the final period.

The Herd used ground power and a 25-yard screen pass to score the sixth touchdown. The 66-yard march in a dozen plays took five minutes. Bobby Cowan skirted right end from the four, and Pancake tossed to McMillan for the two points.

Both teams held for downs, and Cross Plains took possession on the Early 43. Two plays later Halfback Cowan took a pitch and circled right end for 34 yards and the touchdown for a 48-29 final score.




