Harvest Festival Is Set Here Saturday

Annual Harvest Festival of the First United Methodist Church of Cross Plains is scheduled Saturday.

Preparations have been going forward for several weeks in readying for the event which is not only a major fund-raiser for the congregation, but has

come to be an anticipated occasion for this and surrounding communities.

Agenda for the day calls for opening of a country store at 8 a.m., where baked goods, objects of art, paintings, quilts and bedcoverings will go on sale. This feature presents an attrac-

tion, something akin to a local fair, as crowds habitually come to view the handcraft as well as to make purchases.

Serving at the church's annual harvest supper — some prefer to call it a feast, saying this word better describes the meal — begins at 5 p.m. and will continue until 8. The bill of fare will include turkey and dressing, giblet gravy and a wide variety of accompanying dishes, with hot rolls and a vast array of pastries and cakes from which to choose desserts.

Tickets for the supper, available at the door as well as from congregation members, will be \$1.50 per plate.

Both the country store and the supper will be in Fellowship Hall, basement of the church. Those attending either event are asked to enter at front of the building.

"We're inviting everyone to see the merchandise on exhibit and then to take the evening meal with us Saturday; our welcome will be warm, the fellowship sincere and food wonderful and abundant," said the Rev. W. C. Crawford, Methodist pastor.

South Dakota Magazine Features Former Cross Plains Area Rancher

Harold Odom of Cottonwood, S. D., who is the son of Mrs. John Watts of Cross Plains, was the subject of a recent article in The Farmer, a magazine which circulates widely in his section of the country.

Odom, who is a partner with Blain Odom, Callahan County rancher, was asked if beef calves should be kept or marketed during this fall. He starts buying and feeding calves when most ranchers are selling and the publication wrote of his operation as follows:

"Wintering calves fits into his work schedule. Since Odom grows small grains, there's time to work with calves during fall and winter. He has been able to increase total animal unit numbers on his ranch by trimming his cow herd from 250 to 90, buying calves and feeding home-grown grain. Profits are maintained or increased without much extra risk.

"How? Heifer calves are sold in August, following wintering and feeding on pastures. Steers are held for sale until October, when replacement calves are purchased. That lets Odom buy and sell on the same market — a hedge against losses.

"True, weaning and wintering calves have never been particularly easy. Most sickness and death losses occur during weaning. Odom weans calves on forages — chopped sudangrass, alfalfa and crested wheatgrass, which they are used to eating. Calves usually are vaccinated with an antibiotic at weaning.

"Last year, he wintered 900 calves, mostly crossbreeds. Calves get about 3½ pounds of grain per head daily plus ground hay until Christmas. After that, they get about 4½ pounds of grain.

"Calves on grass in fall eat from creep-feeders. Salt, which makes up 11 to 12% of the grain ration, is used to limit consumption. Calves in lots are fed in bunks.

"We try to winter calves as cheaply as we can while still putting on gain," Odom explains.

He waits until winter to add ½-pound of protein supplement per head daily to the grain ration. This is fed until spring, when grass is lush enough to support the calves without weight loss. Grain feeding is withheld until July — when grass quality starts to slide. Then, calves get 7 pounds of barley and 1 pound of protein supplement. Intake again is limited by salt in the ration.

"Last year, his steers went to market weighing about 800 pounds and his heifers tipped the scales at 710 pounds. "We like to double the weight of calves — or better — in a year," says Odom, who's been doing just that for six years. He starts with his own calves, which weigh about 425 pounds at weaning, and buys other calves that average 370 pounds.

"Many cattlemen don't have enough grain, so they prefer to winter calves mainly on hay,

alfalfa and protein cake. In experiments at the Cottonwood, S. D., Experiment Station, researchers tested wintering performance when calves were fed 3, 1½ and ¾ pounds of 40% protein supplement.

"The research was conducted during 1965-66 and 1966-67, explains Bernard Beer, station superintendent. Mean gain on calves during the two trials was .88-pound per day for those getting 3 pounds of supplement, .5 for those getting 1½ pounds, and .2 for those getting ¾-pound.

"If wintering calves on grass, I'd feed at the 1½-pound rate. I wouldn't do it to get the extra gain over that from the ¾-pound rate — but to keep calves healthy and thrifty so they can tolerate winter weather. Calves wintered for a low winter gain put weight on faster the following summer anyway."

The sergeant, a 1954 graduate of Cross Plains High School, attended Sacramento (Calif.) City College and the University of Oklahoma.

Herd Clobbers Chargers 54-13 In Football Finale

Cross Plains Buffaloes unleashed a bruising attack in football season finale Friday, crushing visiting Central Catholic Chargers 54-13 before a sparse, cold crowd.

The Herd looked like the champions they are, sharing the District 9-A diadem with Bangs who will represent the league in state playoffs, in the campaign wrap-up. Bisons amassed 402 net yards rushing and another 69 through the air. Tailback Bobby Cowan was the leading rusher with 163 yards in 15 carries. Fullback Delbert Turner, converted from guard last week after Steve Fortune was injured, gained 93 yards in 17 bull-like rushes. Quarterback Ronnie Pancake netted 71 yards on 12 carries, and Wingback Leslie Cowan got 37 on three totes.

Big First Quarter

Cross Plains ran through the visiting Chargers almost at will in the first quarter. The Herd rang up 27 points in the first period. They added 6 in the second, 14 in the third and 7 in the fourth in their biggest offensive show of the year.

The win was the first in five non-conference starts and improved the season record to 4-5. The Herd was 3-1 in District 9-A play.

Touchdown Parade

Buffaloes took the opening kickoff and blitzed 51 yards in seven plays, after Left End James McMillan was ruled out of bounds after taking the kick for an apparent 80-yard touchdown. Fullback Turner bulled in from the six with only two minutes, 30 seconds gone in the game. Leslie Cowan kicked the point.

Turner got his second tally with 4-46 left in the first on a five-yard blast which capped a 56-yard, nine-play drive. Leslie Cowan again booted the point. Only seconds later Tailback Bobby Cowan rambled 53 yards on first scrimmage play for another TD. His brother kicked

the point. Less than two minutes later Bobby Cowan bolted 35 yards for a 27-0 led with 41 seconds left in the first quarter.

Chargers got a bit tougher in the second period, and Cross Plains used air lanes for the lone touchdown. It came on a 27-yard screen to McMillan with 1:47 left in the half. A two-point conversion pass failed.

Chargers Rally

The Chargers rallied and drove to the Herd's 20 as time elapsed, but took the second half kick and moved 56 yards in seven plays for paydirt. Quarterback Gary Lewis got the score on a three-yard plunge, and he kicked the point.

Cross Plains roared back covering 64 yards in 10 plays with Leslie Cowan circling right end for the tally. He then added the 40th point. Just over a minute later Linebacker McMillan intercepted a Charger pass and rambled 42 yards for the sixth Bison touchdown. Again Leslie Cowan's toe was accurate.

After Central Catholic posted another tally, on a nine-yard pass from Lewis to End Pat Carrigan, mid-way of the last quarter, Cross Plains wrapped up scoring. Leslie Cowan set the blitzkrieg in motion with a 55-yard kickoff return to the Charger 35. Four plays later Turner got his third tally from the three, and Leslie Cowan kicked the 54th point.

Another Cross Plains threat was wiped out by a clipping infraction in the third canto. Pancake screened to Brad Harris who was bumped out of bounds at the one, 28 yards downfield.

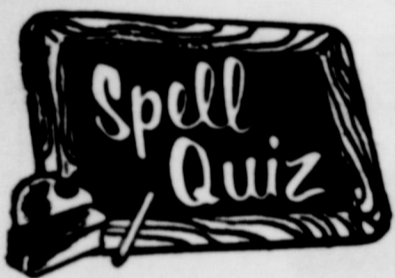
