Merchant Left High And Cold

You may have seen the movie "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof", but have you heard the story of the Cross Plains merchant stranded on a cold gravel roof?

V. L. Hobdy was the victim of a strange set of circumstances one day last week. A lady came into his store and bought a television. She asked that it be set - up that afternoon.

Although the wind was blowing near gale proportions, Hobdy grabbed his tools and hurried out to install the antenna. It was to go on roof of the housing project, just back of his store. An aluminum ladder was used to climb atop the building.

Hobdy did the job in about 10 minutes and was ready to climb down when he noticed that his ladder had blown to the ground. He was already cold, it was too far to jump and his cries for help were inaudible because of roaring winds. For more than an hour he shouted and threw pebbles at passersby all to no avail.

Finally, Miss Belle Phillips chanced to see the merchant waving desperately. She walked over, lifted the light ladder in place and Hobdy scurried down. He might have been thanking her yet if he hadn't been so cold and anxious to reach the warm stove in his store.

Need for good conduct on the part of spectators at high school athletic events is reportedly apparent. Local school officials have, therefore, asked publication of the following Code of Ethics and ask adherance to its provisions by fans. As a spectator I will:

Exemplify high moral character, behavior and leadership so as to be a worthy example.

Maintain and exhibit poise, self-discipline, and restraint during and after the games I attend.

Conduct myself in a manner that attention is drawn not to me, but to the participants playing the game.

Regulate my action at all times so that I will be a credit to the team I support, knowing the school gets the praise or blame for my conduct since I represent my school the same as does the athlete.

Support all reasonable moves to improve sportsmanship. Treat visitors as guests, being courteous and fair.

Avoid action which will offend an individual athlete. Accept judgment of the coach.

Honor rights of visitors in a manner in which I would expect to be treated.

Respect property of the school.

Display good sportsmanship by being modest in victory and gracious in defeat.

Pay respects to both teams as they enter for competition. Appreciate good plays by both sides.

Show sympathy for injured players.

Regard officials as guests and treat them as such. Direct my energies to encouraging the team rather than

booing officials. Believe officials are fair and accept their decisions as final. Learn rules of the game and strive to be an intelligent fan. Consider it a privilege to encourage others to support the precepts of fair play and good sportsmanship.

Realize that privileges are invariably associated with great responsibilities and that spectators have great responsibilities.


