Ice Storm Rages Over This Section Of State

A Wintry blast which sent temperatures into the 20 degree range ravaged the Cross Plains area this week.

The sub-freezing weather arrived late Sunday night on the heels of a two-inch rain. The excessive moisture on trees, shrubbery and power and telephone lines was quickly frozen. Many utility poles broke under the weight, disrupting service in rural areas and trees by the thousands were damaged.

Cross Plains was without electric service for only about 50 minutes Monday morning. Telephone service here remained operative, however, Rowden lines were down and some disruptions of service were reported in other localities.

F. C. Newton, official observer for the Weather Bureau, gauged the Monday morning ac-

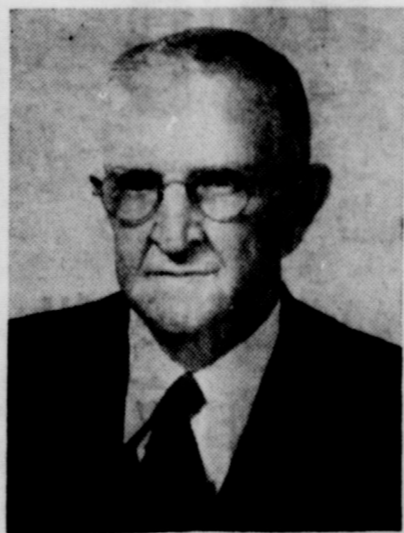
cumulation at exactly two inches. Small amounts of snow fell late Monday night and Tuesday.

December moisture here totaled 3.33 inches bringing the aggregate for 1969 to 35.77 as compared with 35.99 received here in 1968. Normal rainfall for the Cross Plains area is 24.54 inches.

S. F. Bond Gives His Traditional Soliloquy For New Year

Approximately 500 years ago we were coming to the end of an epoch of time known numerically and denominable as the Dark Ages. About this time one Christopher Columbus showed upon the scene advocating the rotundity of the world and it turned over and over in space. This was a very novel idea at this time, and the sages and seers told him that a man with a little sense should know that if the world turned over we would fall off. He kept up his harrangue until he was assigned three old unseaworthy boats loaded with provisions and manned by jail inmates. This action was hailed as a

dual benefit; one to get rid of Columbus and the criminals and to relieve the pressure on the prison walls. The Solons never expected to see him or the criminals again. To their dismay and astonishment, he and his crew returned with a report of the discovery of a new world with two whole continents. This report gave impetus and acceleration to sea going traffic.

By early in the 18th century the French had vast holdings in America, the Spanish in Florida and the British from Georgia to Maine. During the century we raised such a disturbance about taxes or more representation in Parliament, that we brought on

a war gaining our independence. We proceeded to form a nation out of 13 straggling colonies. Adopted a constitution that was proclaimed the most remarkable government document to have ever come from man's hand.

In the early years of the 19th century Mr. Jefferson, then president of the United States, borrowed 15 million dollars to buy the French possession in North America. For this plunge he was severely criticized for the purchase of unexplored waterland. We panned enough gold from "them thar hills" and that eminent domain has contributed generously to our wealth and prosperity, and still does. Some 60 years later we bought Alas-

ka. For this venture it was christened Seward's Folly. The treasury was reimbursed with Yukon gold, and we are advised that Alaska holds in store for us much wealth in the form of petroleum.

Under Governor Leland Stanford's administration there was hewn a cut through the Sierra Nevada making it possible for the California Central to be extended to Promontory Point in Utah for connection with the Union Pacific completing rail transportation across the nation. This happened just 100 years ago, and bound the states with ribbons of steel from ocean to ocean.

Our astronomers gave us a

star reputed to be 40 light years away. Since we have no notation table that can enumerate a light year into milage, we have to take their word for it. But in imagination we stand on the rim of this star and looking ahead we catch glimpses of the radiance of another star, and with this vantage we conceive of the immensity of our beginningless and endless universe as eternal as time and space.

In the babyhood days of this century, the Wrights, great brothers twain, demonstrated at Kitty Hawk the possibility of heavier than air travel, and today the siren's song of motor and propeller in all the circling winds of flight is heard around

the earth. And today we are on the threshold of another adventure to prove the possibility of inter-planetary travel and transportation. The mind of man is still busy proving the possibility of the impossible. No doubt there are people living today who will stand in the presence of the names of our astronauts chiseled in marble.

At the beginning of a new year it becomes us to resolve to do the best we can and be resigned. Please remember there is still in store for us dry weather and duststorms.

My ardent wish is for happiness and prosperity for everybody and that the government's war on poverty ends successfully.

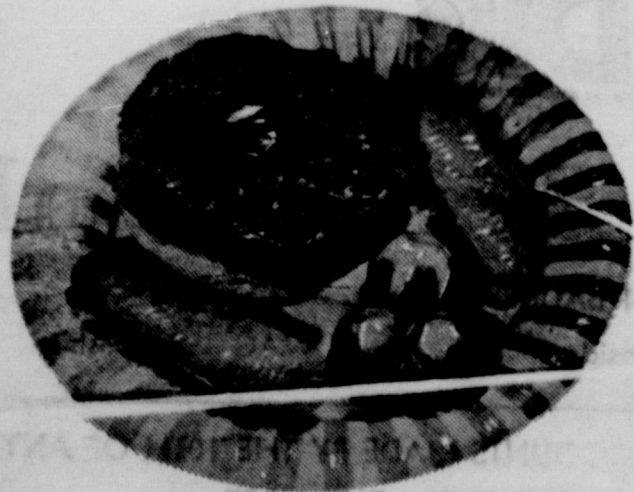

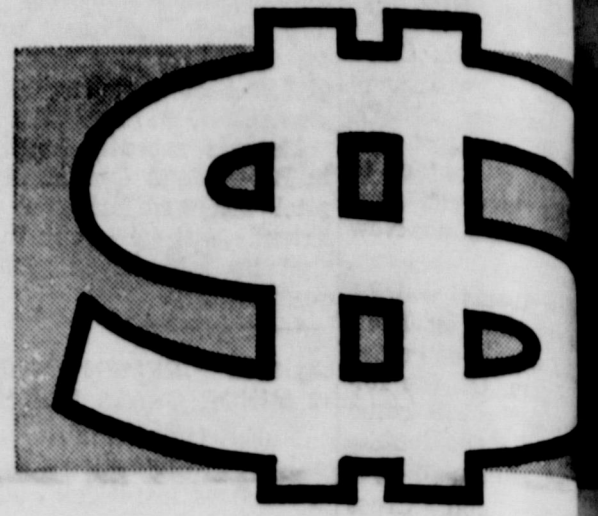

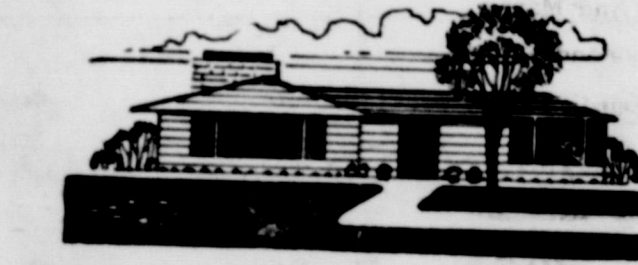

Prew House At Clyde Gets Historical Medal

Callahan County has been awarded another historical marker by the Texas State Historical Committee. It is the Prew House in Clyde.

Dedication of the marker will be announced by B. C. Chrisman of Baird, chairman of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee.

The designation of the Prew House as a Recorded Texas Historical Landmark, was announced by Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the state historical committee, who heralded the building "significant to the history of community and state, and worthy of preservation".

As a result of meeting TSHSC requirements for the high official designation, the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretive plate giving a capsule of history of the structure will be affixed to it. The inscription on the marker reads as follows.

"The Prew House. Typically Victorian in style. Built in 1906 by Frank X. Prew, who emigrated from

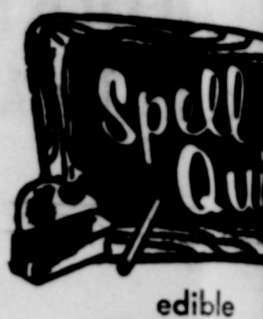
Wisconsin in 1889, to live in a young town. He began a small business worked on railroad.

"Structure is mainly oak wainscoting. The oak wainscoting stairs has decorative ing, as does woodwork windows and doors. Bread trim appears on gable. Old water food-storage cellar in good condition.
