An autopsy made by Dr. Bill Brooks, Abilene pathologist, set the time of death from 48 to 72 hours before discovery. Weather conditions which prevailed at the time are said to have made it impossible to exactly determine the hour of death.

One point in the autopsy differed from first impressions of investigators at the scene. It concerned the point of entry of the bullet into McClure's body. Dr. Brooks said the bullet struck the right side of his back and came out through the chest. Early consensus was that the shot entered front of the body.

"It was death by gunshot in the thorax," Dr. Brooks said.

Justice of the Peace Billy Charles McMillan, who ordered the autopsy, said Tuesday that he has been withholding verdict of his inquest pending possible discovery of additional evidence. "Unless there is definite change in my present thinking," he said, "I will rule it murder by person or persons unknown."

Sheriff Grayson Miller has been heading the investigation. Working with him, though, in addition to his own deputies J. H. Cox and C. S. McGowen, have been Texas Rangers Sid Merchant, Jim Riddle and L. P. Lynch, Sgt. Jerry Mathews and Patrolman H. D. Welch of the Texas Department of Public Safety, F. B. Rocha, investigator with the District Attorney's office, as well as technical advisors in Abilene and Austin.

Beetles May Control Brush On Area Farms, Ranchland

James Snyder, Baird rancher and chairman of Callahan County Brush Control and Range Improvement Association, Tuesday morning revealed an interesting approach being considered in the possible eradication of mesquite, which imperials million of acres of rangeland throughout the southwest.

"We may have to go to a biological approach," Snyder opined, "such as proved so successful in the control of screwworms."

He elaborated further on the idea saying that there is an Australian beetle which completely destroys prickly-pears. The beetle was tested in Texas and found to be useful until it fell victim to a particular type of preying ant, common to this area but unknown in Australia. Biologists are now endeavoring to crossbreed a beetle of the same appetite, capable of withstanding the ant.

Snyder points out that scientists can probably find an insect with an appetite for mesquite, if given time and funds for research.

While biologists pursue this school of thought, an equal effort is being mounted by chemists to develop herbicides which will be allowed by the Food and Drug Administration and prove effective on Texas ranges.

Snyder pointed out that the Food and Drug Administration has recently imposed restraints on use of many chemicals, used as herbicides and pesticides on local farms and ranches. D.D.T. is now forbidden and 2-4-5-T is said to have only temporary approval.

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Snyder pointed out that Callahan County land owners contributed \$1,675.89 last year for furthering the program of Texas Brush Control and Range Improvement Association, an organization headed by John A. Matthews of Abilene. Of the funds collected in this county \$115.25 went for postage and expenses incidental to the first year's activities. The remainder, \$1,559.64, was mailed Tuesday by Howard E. Farmer, Callahan County treasurer, to the state headquarters and will go into the chemical and biological research programs.

Callahan County land owners will again be billed at the rate of one cent per acre per year to sustain this program. Snyder urged cooperation and continued support of every rancher and farmer.

Fat Stock Show Will Open Friday

Judging will begin at 8:30 a.m. Friday in the 16th annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show at the exposition barn on State Highway 206, one mile north of Cross Plains.

Exhibitors from Callahan County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters will compete for an estimated \$1,200 in prize money.

First day judging will be in poultry and rabbits at 8:30 a.m., breeding sheep and lambs at 10:30 and dairy cattle at 2:30 p.m.

Saturday's judging will start at 8:30 a.m. with the swine show. Breeding heifers will be judged at 1:30 p.m. and steers at 2:30.

Horse division of the county show will be at the Freeman Barns in Clyde Saturday, Jan. 24, beginning at 9 a.m.

Judges and superintendents for various divisions of the show were announced by County Agent Gregory Gerngross as follows:

Beef cattle: Payton Scott of Rising Star judge and Don Harris of Cross Plains superintendent.

Swine: Larry Osborne of Abilene judge and Jimmy West of Rowden superintendent.

Fat lambs: Jimmy Smith of Winters judge and Sidney Foy of Baird superintendent.

Breeding sheep and goats: Smith judge and Edwin Schaefer of Cross Plains superintendent.

Poultry: Marion Weber of Abilene judge and Winifred Gardner of Eula superintendent.

Rabbits: Byron Wilson of Abilene judge and Roy Goin of Clyde superintendent.

Dairy cattle: Smith judge and Larry Tennison of Clyde superintendent.

Horses (the division of the show to be held in Clyde): Jerry Chrisman of Anson judge and Burrus Miller of Eula superintendent.

County Agent Gregory Gerngross said yesterday that entries in this year's show will total 298, as compared with 452 last year. This year's entries by divisions are as follows: dairy cattle 16, beef heifers 13, fat steers 78, sheep 46, goats 17, swine 49, poultry 38 and rabbits 41.

Most of the animals competing in the Callahan County show will be entered later in major shows over the state, including Abilene, Fort Worth, Houston El Paso and possibly Midland-Odessa.

Vocational agriculture teachers supervising chapter activities are O. B. Edmondson of Cross Plains, James Trammell and Tim Stone of Clyde, Dick Vestal of Baird and Claude Rock of Eula. Gerngross supervises the County 4-H activities.

Exhibitors are asked to have their entries in place no later than 8:30 on the day they are to be shown. They will be released at 5 p.m. that day.

Showmanship awards are presented this year by: beef cattle, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Windham; sheep, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Schaefer; swine, Peoples State Bank in Clyde; dairy cattle, Central West Texas Milk Producers Assn.; horses, Burrus Miller; poultry, White's Auto Store in Clyde; rabbits, Estes Real Estate in Clyde, and goats, Ranchers Wool and Mohair Co. of Brownwood.

Producer Completed On Weldon Edwards

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene completed a Moutray Sand producer in the regular field six miles south of Clyde.

It is No. 1-B Weldon Edwards, 1,920 feet from the south and 1,420 feet from the west lines of Section 14, BBB&C Survey.

The well had a daily potential of 17½ barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water.

It is pumping from an open hole fractured with six sacks of sand and 110 barrels of salt water. Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 1,286 feet, top of the pay, and the hole is bottomed at 1,291 feet.

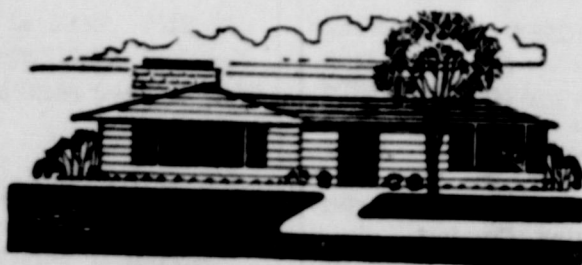

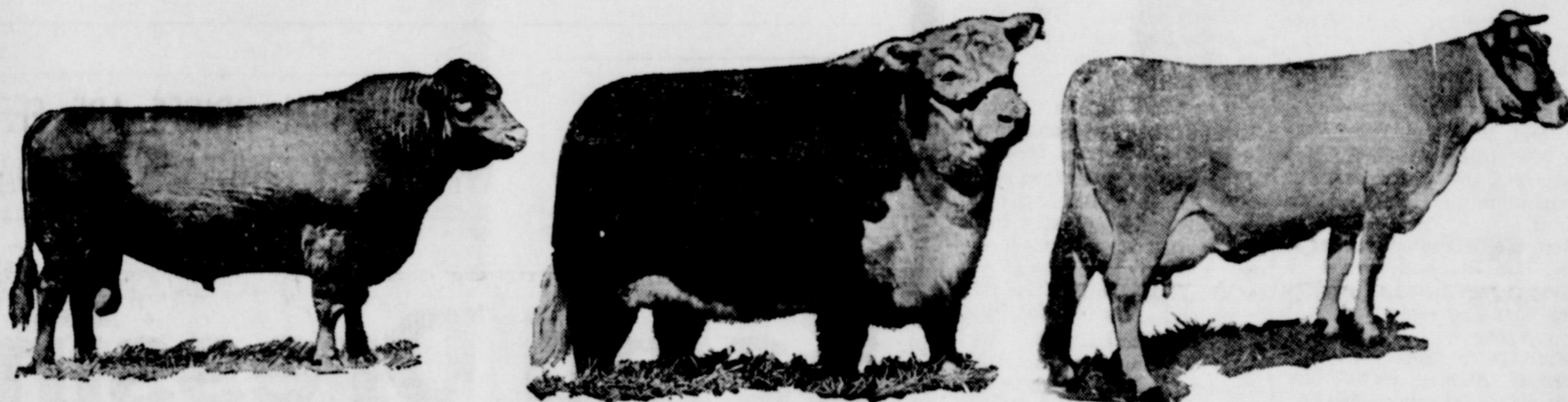

He once found a gallon jar filled with silver dollars and other coins, "and the landowner came and took it away."

"Always get the landowner's permission first," he says.
