Trustees, 3 City Dads Must Be Chosen April 4

Local elections are scheduled for April 4. The municipal ballot will be held on that date and two council members will be chosen for election.

School voting calls for the naming of two trustees. Terms of Mayor Doyle Burchfield and Aldermen Raymond DeBusk and T. T. Nichols are expiring on the city council. Neither has announced whether or not he will seek re-election. Deadline for filing is a month before election. Members of the city council, including mayor, are named for two-year terms. Holdovers are Oscar Koenig, Gerald Bowden and Jimmielee Payne.

Trustees whose terms are ending on the school board are Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Tommie Harris. Trustees are chosen for three-year tenures. Holdovers on the board are: Roy Neil Tatom, R. D. (Dick) Koenig, Lewis Fortune, Noah Johnson and Vernon Phillips. Candidates for city office file with Mrs. Ava Childers at the City Hall. Aspirants for school trustee file with Dr. Sohns, who is secretary of the board.

Bank Savings Now Earn Higher Rate

Edwin Baum, president of the Citizens State Bank, announced yesterday that the local financial institution has increased the rate of interest paid on savings accounts and certificates of deposit.

Passbook savings, which formerly earned four per cent per annum, now bring four and one-half per cent.

Certificates of deposit for six months or more but less than a year will yield five per cent, c.d.'s for a year or more but less than two years will bring five and one-half per cent and two-year or more c.d.'s will yield five and three-quarters percent.

"It will continue to be our policy to pay the highest rate possible to our customers and we will continue to do so," Baum said, "so long as it is commensurate with sound banking principles."

Food Stamp Plan Will Eventually Supplant Issuing of Commodities

Although it is well known that the federal government is phasing out the surplus commodities program of food for the poor, Callahan County officials expect no discontinuance of the issue here and at Baird any time within the foreseeable future.

Reports from Washington say that no more commodity programs are being started and that the present plan will eventually phase out in favor of food stamps.

T. T. Nichols Buys Local Locker Plant

Cross Plains Frozen Food Locker Plant passed to new ownership Monday.

Lindsey W. Tyson, who had been sole owner of the business since 1958, disposed of his holdings to T. T. Nichols, who had formerly been a partner in the concern.

Tyson said Thursday that he had no immediate plans for the future other than to rest for a while. "I've been working here mightily long hours for years and I'm tired," he said.

Nichols, a veteran butcher who has worked at that trade probably longer than anyone else in the Cross Plains area, operated the local locker plant with Tyson from September 1945 to 1958, when he sold his interest and returned to operating retail markets in Cross Plains groceries.

Other than the shift in management no change in policies of the local plant is expected. Both Greg Rogers and Jimmy Pierce, who have been working with Tyson, will continue with Nichols.

Low Interest F. H. A. Financing Available For Five New Homes

Gerald Bowden reports recent F. H. A. approval to build five new homes in Cross Plains. All would be three-bedroom size, for families with limited incomes.

The government-subsidized program provides low interest rate, based on family incomes. No restrictions were placed on building sites, other than

that they must be within the corporate limits.

F. H. A. executives who recently visited Cross Plains in regard to the project pointed out that even lot cost could be provided in original financing.

"It is possible to take ownership and move into a new, three-bedroom home for as little as \$200 cash," Bowden said.

Garrett Egg Firm Now State Leader

Garrett Egg Company of Cross Plains (formerly operated as Garrett-Lane Corporation) this week acquired Power Egg Company of Abilene. The Power firm was once the largest supplier of eggs in the Big Country area.

Harold Garrett, executive manager of the combined firm, reports that 40,000 dozen eggs are now being handled through the Cross Plains facility.

In taking over Power eggs, the Garrett firm accepted management and operation of a caged layer farm north of Clyde.

Fast, refrigerated trucks now move eggs to and from the processing plant on North Main Street in Cross Plains to retail outlets over a wide section of north, west and central Texas. Impartial observers declare that the locally-based business is now one of the state's largest marketers and suppliers of quality eggs.

Pre-Schoolers Start 60-Day Short Course Here Feb. 18

A pre-school program for next year's beginners at Cross Plains schools will be a 60-day short course starting Feb. 18 and continuing through May 15, according to letters mailed last week by Superintendent Wayne Ford to parents and guardians of upcoming first graders.

Learning experiences will be provided the beginners in: language arts (conversation, dramatic play and readiness activities), mathematics (counting, recognizing groups, shape and quantity), fine arts (dramatic play, singing, rhythmic activities, self-expression through art) enjoyment of literature

(listening to stories read and told), health and physical education (good health habits, indoor and outdoor activities).

The program will run on regular school schedule, beginning at 8:10 each morning and being completed at 3:25 in the afternoon. Classroom for the intern-regular beginners will be upstairs in the high school building. Teacher will be Miss Betty Browning, a certified elementary teacher and Title I Director. Mrs. D. C. Jones will be the teacher aide, supervising afternoon activities.

Only expense, other than 30 cents for lunch, will be the cost of supplies.

Both varsity basketball teams of Cross Plains High School ended the first round of the double round-robin District 9-A competition with unblemished records last week.

In the only conference outing for the local last week, Friday at Goldthwaite, each Cross Plains squad used a big quarter to decision host counterparts.

Buffettes tallied 31 points in the second eight minutes to come from behind and eventually post a 67-38 victory, and Buffaloes flipped in 30 points in the third canto while limiting the Eagles to just two en route to an 87-58 triumph. Both local units had perfect 4-0 loop marks going into second round of play at Early Tuesday night, teams both local contingents defeated handily in first encounter.

Turnovers Hurt

Turnovers and lack-luster play hampered efforts of both Cross Plains units in early stages of the contests last Friday.

Buffettes trailed 13-9 after the initial eight minutes, but quickly gained the upper hand in the second quarter, blistering the nets for 31 points. That effort netted the Buffettes a 40-25 lead at intermission. The squad then coasted to the 67-38 victory which evened the squad's season record at 6-6. Local defense limited Goldthwaite to just two points in the final eight minutes.

Terry Edington popped the nets for 26 points on nine field goals and eight free shots to pace Buffette scoring. Paula Petty added 21 points on eight two-pointers and five charity tosses, and Lydia Albrecht contributed 14 markers on six field goals and two foul shots. Other Buffettes scoring were Debbie Tyler four and Sherry Ingram two. Nita Berry led Goldthwaite with 24 points. Although outscoring the host

Eagles by a single point in each of the first two quarters, the Herd played loosely until the third quarter. At one point in the second stanza Goldthwaite owned a 10-point lead, and Bisons committed 10 turnover in the initial eight minutes.

Utility Firm Makes New Safety Record

A new all-time safety record was set Dec. 31 when employees of West Texas Utilities Company completed the year without a lost-time accident.

During the 12-month period WTU's 1,040 employees worked a total of 2,221,674 man hours.

During its long history of providing electric service to customers in West Texas, never before has such a record been achieved. Several times during the past 10 years the perfect record was almost reached. In 1960 only two lost-time accidents were recorded. Three were charged to the company's record in 1963; four in 1964; and only two in 1967. Since 1957 only 57 lost-time accidents have been recorded in the 10-year period.

Last September the WTU employees received special recognition when they were presented the Safety Achievement Award by the Bureau of Safety. This came after they had worked more than 2,000,000 man-hours without a lost-time accident. The last recorded was in October, 1968. The record now reads: 14 months without a lost-time accident.

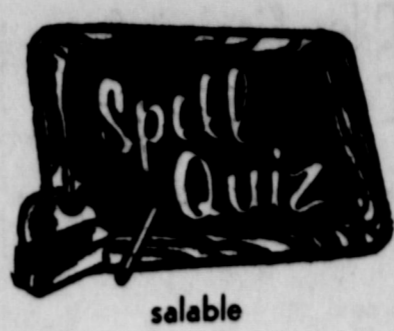
Musgrove To Run For Re-Election
