Wind Storm Rakes City Tuesday Morn

Heavy winds which roared through the Cross Plains area in the early morning hours Tuesday destroyed a number of outbuildings and did thousands of dollars worth of damage.

At the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Carrouth, three miles southwest of town on the old pavement to Coleman, a shed was lifted from over a tractor, blown 20 feet into a pasture and demolished. The tractor escaped unscathed. A barn roof at the Carrouth place was scooped askew about six inches. Heavy hail also fell there.

Mrs. Fannie Plowman, who lives a half-mile west of town on the old Coleman road, reported two tin outbuildings

blown away, a large tree felled and shingles blown from the roof of her home.

In the eastern edge of town damage was done at the homes of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Gary, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Landolt and Mr. and Mrs. Dale Gary. Damage was confined to barns, cribs, coops and other types of outbuildings. A small shed was blown over and wrecked at the W. E. Butler place in the western part of town.

With the wind came a heavy shower. In Cross Plains it was gauged at .52 of an inch, however, at Atwell at measured 1.10. Vernon Phillips reported .70 at his farm in the Pioneer locality, however, at the store Pete Fore measured only .50.

Formal Sentence Is Given Curtis Goad

Curtis Sherman Goad, 27, of Cross Plains, was formally sentenced to 65 years in prison Thursday for the July 2 murder of Cross Plains City Marshal Byron Richardson.

Goad's court-appointed attorney, Charles Scarborough of Abilene, immediately gave notice of appeal, and Goad was returned to Callahan County jail. He will remain there — where he has been since the day of the shooting — pending action on that appeal.

Prior to the sentencing, 42nd District Judge Raleigh Brown overruled Scarborough's motion for a new trial. He asked the new trial on the grounds that the jury verdict was contrary to the "overwhelming weight of the evidence".

An 11-man one-woman jury had deliberated an hour before convicting Goad and another hour before setting his punishment at 65 years.

4 Charged In Theft Of Wire At Putnam

Four Abilene men have been charged in Callahan County for theft of copper wire.

According to Callahan County Sheriff Grayson Miller, they are Curtis Shelton, Jr., Ray Fullman, Johnnie Lee Parker and Willie C. Boyd.

Sheriff Miller said the men were arrested about 2 p.m. Wednesday of last week near Putnam and taken to Baird where they were charged and jailed. He said about \$50 worth of copper wire was recovered.



Buffs Wage Furious Fight Before Bowing In Regional

Foul trouble and miserable shooting percentages, both from the field and free toss line, resulted in defeat for Cross Plains Buffaloes in first game of Region II-A basketball tournament at Denton Saturday morning. Eventual regional champion Itasca eliminated the Herd 87-72.

Cross Plains earned the regional meet berth by defeating Albany 80-77 in overtime Monday last week in bi-district play-off. It was the first bi-district victory for a Cross Plains male team in modern history, according to limited records available.

Buff's Taller Buffaloes' superior height gave the unit an initial lead early in the first quarter, but

numerous Herd fouls which extended the one-on-one foul situation to the Wampus Cats in the first quarter overcame the brief lead. Itasca carved out a seven-point margin, 22-15, in the first eight minutes, and stretched that to the largest point spread, 16, at halftime.

Itasca out-scored Bisons 22-13 in the second canto for the 44-28 advantage at intermission. Buffaloes rallied in the third period, managing their best quarter of the game. Cross Plains netted 23 points in the stanza while Itasca counted 18. Buffs pulled within five points of the Cats in each of the last two periods, but in each instance Herd fouls helped Itasca widen the lead again. Bisons scored 21 points in the last

eight minutes, but Itasca totaled 25, on six field goals spiced with 13 charity tosses.

Buff post, 6-5 Leslie Cowan, was tagged for three fouls in the first quarter limiting his action to just over two quarters before fouling out. Starter Larry Bishop, a senior, also was called on three violations in the first half and fouled out later. In the second half five Bisons, all but one starter, junior Robert Lewis, left the game via foul route. Others were senior starter James McMillan, sophomore starter Bobby Cowan and junior Ronnie Pancake. Cross Plains collected 33 team fouls, and Itasca committed 25 contact errors.

Hot outside shooting by Cats Daniel Eason, who tallied 20

points, and Tom Bowman, who totaled 29, hurt the Bisons until swapping to a man-to-man defense which countered the Wampus Cat press.

Cross Plains, usually above average in free throw accuracy, hit only 41 per cent from the charity line. The local quintet hooped just 16 of 39 attempts, while Itasca bucketed 29 of 51 shots, 58 per cent. Buffaloes were also cold from the floor, bagging a lowly 27.7 per cent of field goal tries.

Bobby Cowan paced the Bison attack with 19 points on five field goals and nine charity shots. Leslie Cowan counted 16 markers on eight two-pointers during his limited action. Joe Dadds, senior alternate, contributed 11 points on five field

goals and one foul throw. Other local scoring included McMillan nine, Larry Bishop eight, Lewis seven, Wayne Bishop one and Donnie Dillard one. Ten Buffs saw action in the contest.

Although losing, the game climaxed the best season for a Buffalo aggregation in many years. The unit posted a 22-5 season record, and earned a regional spot for the first time since long before the 1955 season.

Good Record Coach Les Cowan, who has tutored two district champions and a runner-up in his three years here, credited the players with the successful season. He said, "The kids did a real good job this year, every one of them."

Band Being Groomed For Contest At Corpus Christi

Cross Plains High School Band is preparing for a trip to the Texas Coast May 1 to participate in the Buccaneer Band Festival at Corpus Christi.

While members of the Band Boosters Club are busy in money-raising endeavors to finance the trip, Band Director Lee Bulls is grooming his student musicians daily for the highly-

competitive event.

A spokesman for the Band Boosters Club said yesterday that a minimum of \$2,000 will be required to send the 70 student musicians on the jaunt and finance their three days away from home. The trip will be the first of any length made by the band since 1964, when the group represented Texas at the Indianapolis 500. The booster organization now has about \$1,000 on hand and hopes that a rummage sale presently underway on South Main Street and a barbecue supper, scheduled March 21, will provide the necessary funds.

The trip to and from Corpus Christi will be made in school buses. Plans call for departure from Cross Plains May 1 and returning here two days later.

Tucson Names Ex-Local Boy Top Policeman

A former Cross Plains man has been chosen "Policeman of the Year" at Tucson, Ariz. He is Rex K. Angeley, 40-year-old detective and son of Mr. and Mrs. O. K. Angeley of this city.

Angeley received the award after being chosen for the honor by fellow officers. He was lauded for his efforts which led to arrests in eight liquor store robberies last year, including one in which a clerk was killed.

He was also cited for his 30 days intensive investigation and

arrest of five suspects in a service station robbery last May 20. A station attendant had been wounded in the robbery.

Sgt. Larry Bunting, who submitted a written evaluation on Angeley, said he "possess a strong desire to get the job done".

Bunting said that after the robbery last year of a liquor store in Tucson and the killing of a clerk, there were no leads. Angeley, he said, used extensive knowledge of the area he had gained in his police work

and after four weeks had suspects in custody.

He used similar techniques, the evaluator said, after a series of liquor store robberies last year done by a tall man and a short partner, dubbed the "Mutt and Jeff" robbery team. Three arrests were made in those three robberies.

Angeley, a native of Cross Plains, is a former University of Arizona student. He and his wife, Winonah, and their three children live at 931 E. La Pasadita in Tucson.

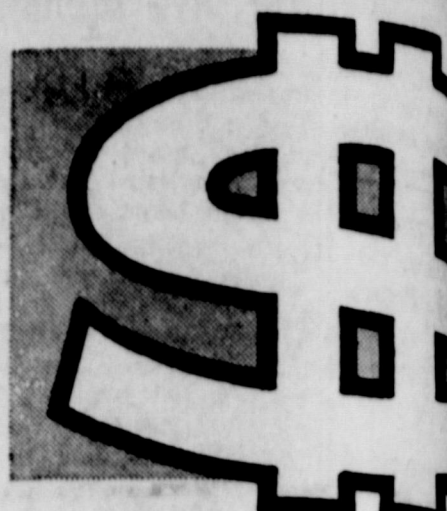

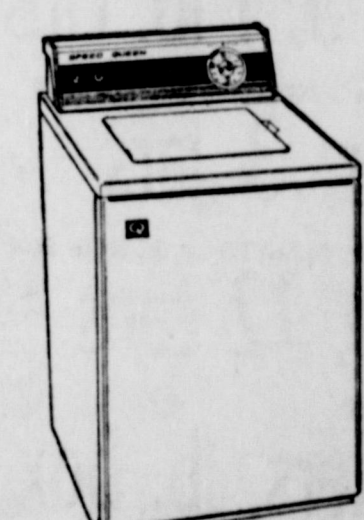

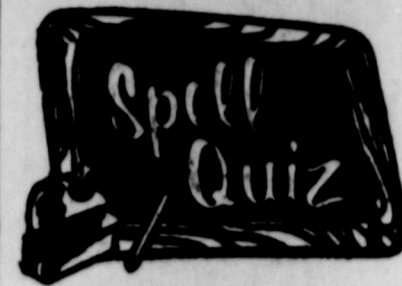
Buffaloes are scheduled to travel to Anson March 14 for season's first competition.
