Prior to the sentencing, 42nd District Judge Raleigh Brown overruled Scarborough's motion for a new trial. He asked the new trial on the grounds that the jury verdict was contrary to the "overwhelming weight of the evidence".

An 11 - man one - woman jury had deliberated an hour before convicting Goad and another hour before setting his punishment at 65 years.




