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Cottonwood Might Claim State's Most Unusual Farm

The Cottonwood area has what may be the most unusual farm in Texas. To say the least, the Lone Star State has not another like it.

The place is a 150 acre tract owned by Mr. and Mrs. Dan Childress, which they bought three years ago from W. A. Gill.

What's rare about the Childress farm?

The owner, who retired after 32 years with the U. S. Forest Service, is planting Christmas trees. The American Forestry Association's

publication recently reported that there was not a commercial grower of Christmas trees in all of Texas. The Cottonwood project is changing that.

Actually Christmas trees are only one of three types being planted by Childress. He put out pecans three years ago, and has been planting 100 more each year. The pecan trees are 36 feet apart and between each of them he has planted a specially adapted variety of peach trees. Between the nut and fruit trees is a distance of 18 feet, which

Childress is splitting and planting a Christmas tree. Four varieties of Christmas trees are being tried: Arizona Cypress, Douglas Fir, Mediterranean Pine and Afghanistan Pine. Each has characteristics making it particularly appealing as a Yuletide ornament.

Childress estimates that it will take from eight to 10 years for his pecan trees to become productive, about three for the peach, and five for Christmas trees. All will be irrigated from a 10 acre flood detention lake on the place — Site 3 in Turkey Creek Water Control District.

All the knowledge gained in graduate studies of forestry and agriculture, together with practical know-how, picked up in 32 years of actual experience, is being painstakingly applied at the Cottonwood farm. It's more than a financial venture, it's the valedictory or the thesis to a lifelong study of trees.

Retailers have indicated that yule trees of the quality Childress will place on the 1975 Christmas market should bring a minimum of \$2 each at the farm. There should be at least 1,000 for sale that year. If Childress keeps planting who can predict how many will be available 10 years hence.

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22 Face Arraignment In Baird Court Today

Persons charged in 22 indictments by a 42nd District Court grand jury in Baird last week will face District Judge Raleigh Brown for arraignment Thursday and Friday.

Trials are expected to be docketed immediately thereafter.

P.T.O. Seeks Help To Air-Condition School

A drive is currently underway to purchase air-conditioning equipment for installation at Cross Plains elementary school and have it installed in

time for use this Spring. Spearheading the campaign is a committee from the Parent-Teacher Organization, headed by Mrs. John D. Montgomery, Mrs. Travis Bailey and Mrs. Leo G. Franke.

Plans call for installation of an evaporative type cooler of at least 4,500 cubic feet per minute capacity in each room in the elementary school building. Equipping the 11 rooms would run in the neighborhood of \$1,400. The local PTO has worked diligently several months in various endeavors, all aimed at successfully completing this project, and now has \$700 on hand.

Persons willing to help raise the remaining \$700 are being asked to leave a contribution at the Citizens State Bank to be deposited to a special PTO account. If this arrangement is disliked, Mrs. Montgomery, PTO president, points out that a member will call for gifts if instructed when and what time to come. "We are most anxious to raise the required money before our next meeting time, in order that purchases can be made and work be started on plumbing and wiring," Mrs. Montgomery stated.

Cross Plains school trustees recently voted to accept the expense of plumbing and wiring and called for bids on the work.

Cross Cut Rancher Prepares For Journey To Africa To Plant Rice Crops For Ghana's Starving Millions

A 72-year-old Cross Cut man may be sent to Africa in an effort to eliminate hunger in an entire nation. If so, it will be the second such mission made in his long and colorful career, both in the United States and abroad.

The man is Bransford Eubank, Cross Cut area rancher, who is being prevailed upon by Technoserve, Inc., a philanthropic organization, based in Connecticut, to go to Ghana — the old Gold Coast of Africa — and introduce upland rice growing as a means of minimizing hunger and boosting economy of the 13-year-old nation.

Eubank would have departed for the Dark Continent early this month had not political problems arisen. He is now waiting an investigator being made by Technoserve's

"troubleshooter" who was flown from Ethiopia to Ghana to study recent developments. Eubank has taken his overseas shots, secured passports and prepared travel itinerary. He will depart immediately if the current investigation reveals that the rice growing project can be undertaken without political interference.

Second Such Chore
Eubank, whose career in agriculture runs the span from boyhood on farm and ranch to graduate scholar and college instructor, is no new-comer to the problem of taking modern techniques to a foreign land. As a young man he was sent to Peking in 1924 to introduce dairying and American methods to the Chinese. He remained three years before returning to the United States for additional

college work, and then went back to the Orient for another seven years.

In preparation for the big chore in Ghana, Eubank has been conferring with leading authorities on rice growing in the United States. He flew to Baton Rouge two weeks ago and interviewed the head of Louisiana Experiment Stations, who had spent time in Africa and written a report on the feasibility of growing rice in Ghana.

"He assured me," Eubank said, "that the idea is sound and the project definitely needed."

Visits Old Friend
Before returning home Eubank visited New Orleans and called on Dr. Charles Bollick, who heads the U. S. Department of Agriculture's research in rice and has the re-

sponsibility of maintaining live seed for hundreds of varieties of the grain, some of which are no longer planted commercially in this country. Bollick, an old friend of Eubank's from archeological pursuits, recommended strains of rice which should do well in the tropical climate of Ghana.

Mission of Love
To the well-known Cross Plains area man the challenge in Ghana is one with which he would particularly like to cope, although it's strictly a mission of charity. All his services would be donated. "When a man reaches his 70's," Eubank says, "it's just comforting to know that his skills are still useful and sought, even though the spot be a remote section of the world."

James McMillan, senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy C. McMillan, also was recipient of dual laurels last week for his basketball prowess. He was named the All-District team, and received honorable mention in the area selections.

Terry Edington, freshman and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. (Hick) Edington, was named to a seven-member feminine 9-A All-District unit. She was selected at a forward position along with three others.

All - Area Cagers

Coach Cowan, completing his third year at the helm of the Buffaloes, tutored the Herd to its best season in modern history last season. Bisons captured a second straight District 9-A cage crown and whipped Albany in bi-district action before bowing to Itasca in regional

tournament. Cowan would take no credit in the Buffaloes' fortunes nor in his being selected Coach of the Year. He said, "The kids did it; they did an outstanding job all season long."

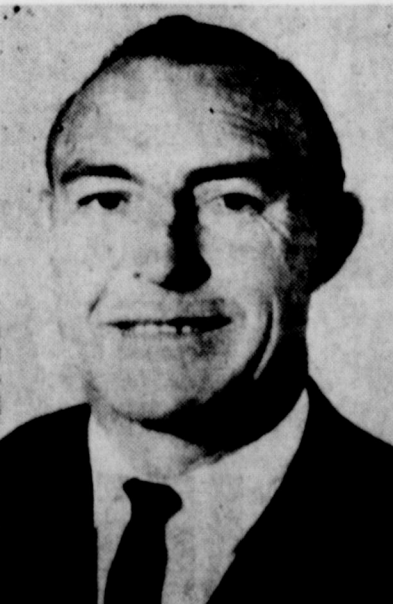
Leslie Cowan was a repeat performer on the All - 9-A unit, moved up to the first area team from the second to which he

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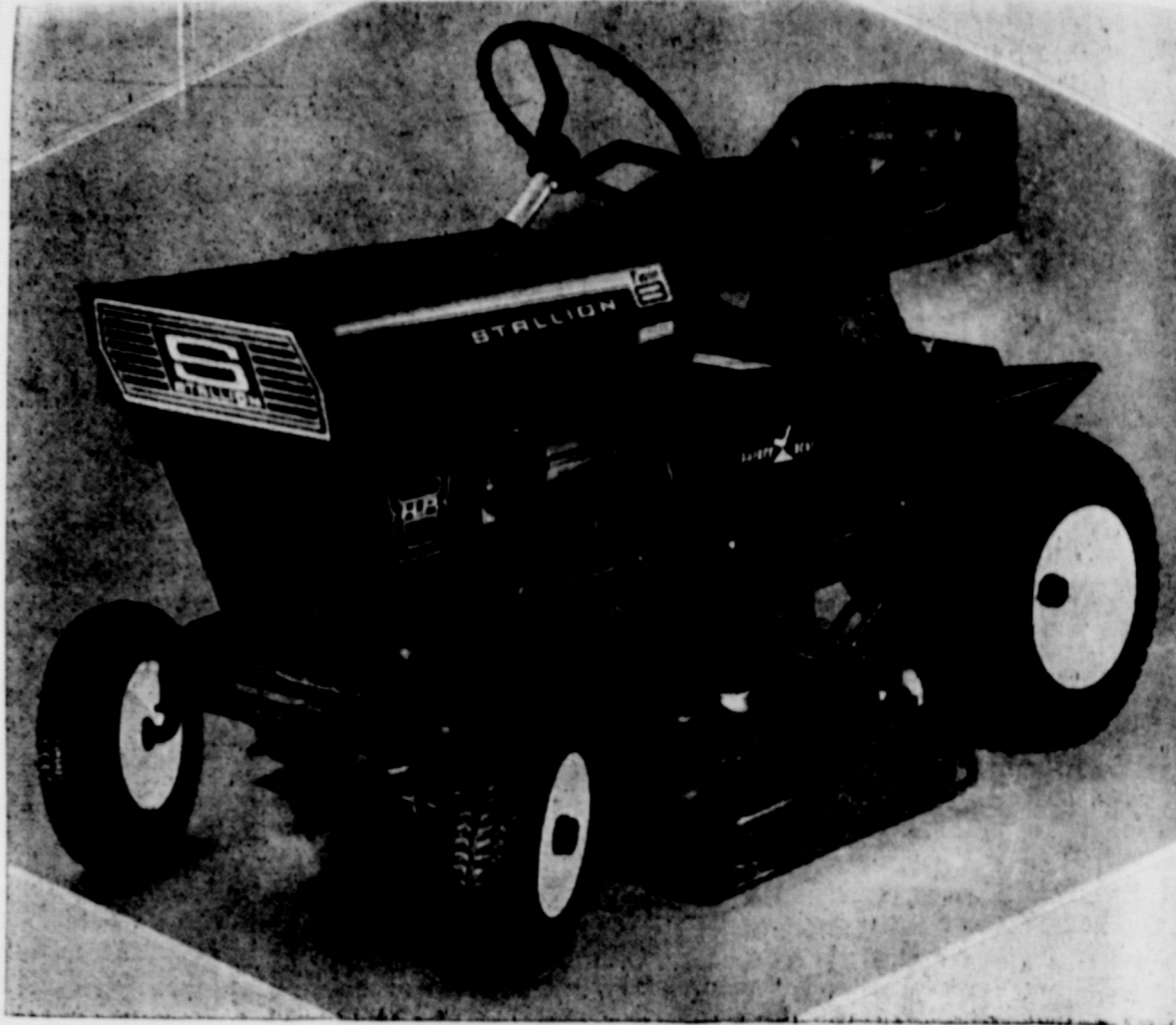

Tribute To My Husband

Sam had many and varied interested skills, to match most of them, he was an oil well driller and producer, mechanic, welder, machinist and aviator. However, of them all, perhaps his greatest and most abiding interest was in aviation. He became interested in flying in 1922 during the Pioneer oil boom days. An incident possibly that occurred then, deferred his active flying several years.

The incident was a result of a flight over Old Mexico with a Mr. Hall (pilot) and E. W. (Dub) Richardson. They had to make a forced landing and were almost taken into custody by Mexican soldiers. After some tense negotiations they made a hurried take-off, in which they damaged a wing of the plane on a tree but managed to keep flying.

If this did defer Sam's personal entry into aviation, it grew too weak as a deterrent. In 1945 when he had the opportunity to buy, not one, but six surplus Army planes. He sold four of these and within a few months he and his two sons, Ben and Rolland (Jiggs), had each soloed in a PT-19, later in a BT-13. These were the two planes he kept in which Frank McSpadden, who was a World War II Army pilot, was their instructor. At this time we were in Fort Stockton, Texas.

After a few years, Sam traded the two Army planes off and got a Culver Cadet which was a two place plane with retractable landing gear. It was a tiny plane but was fast for its size, which Sam liked. He flew the Culver several years, then bought a four-place Bellanca. He owned several other planes but finally returned to the use of a Culver Cadet, which we called "The Little Yellow Bug". He last piloted the Culver in 1968 on his 68th birthday.

Often Sam and I took off on flights across country to visit relatives or friends. And then sometimes we just flew for fun over neighboring country for the thrill of aerial perspective, somewhat like a Sunday drive in the family car. However, although casual and relaxed, Sam always meticulously checked all vital flight details. He enjoyed taking friends and neighbors for a 15 to 30 minute late afternoon flight. This was a common occurrence until sometime in 1968. Sam got real pleasure out of passengers, their expressions as they viewed the mapped out beauty of the greatly shrunk earth below.

There was one thing Sam wanted to do that he never got

to do. He wanted to make a flight with his son, Ben, in a T-38. Ben was an officer and instructor in the Air Force until July 25, 1968, and instructed students in the T-38 jet.

In his passing, Sam leaves many pilot friends and acquaintances. These friends flew in to visit him from time to time, but particularly during his illness. They came from many places in Texas, Fort Stockton, Monahans, Lubbock, Dallas and Del Rio.

Sam's last flight was his best one, not to be compared with a T-38 or any other earthly machine. Two angels came this time to escort him on his first flight in the ultimate airborne conveyance, powered by God. Final destination, a Heavenly Home.

The following poem was sent to me by Sam's sister, Lessie Chilton.

"WINGS INTO HEAVEN"
Oh I have seen the vaulted
ships of God
Sail by in Majesty beyond my
silver wings
And I have loved the air in
space above
Unbreathed — unstained — by
touch of human things
Oh I have watched the myriad
falls
Spill silver showers in hungry
lakes
That forming high above the
earth
Dot Highest Heavens wide with
silvery flakes
Swept high — high beyond the
reach of birds
Poor creatures — feather bound
to earth
Touched soft palatial pillows
there
Where God reviews His won-
derous works
There commuting with God
I've glimpsed the steps that
lead to Heaven
Have felt His breath upon my
cheek
And lived the peace that it had
given
Soared joyful into softest blues
That man had never touched
before
Looked out on cloudy pasture-
lands
And 'near forgot that men could
war
Tread — cat like on my silver
wings
Through palaces unknown to
men
Reached out and touched God's
hand
And heard Him say — "Come
soon, and walk with Me
again."

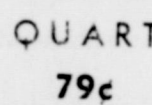
