ers are consigned to M & G Feedlots in Henderson, Colo. Nail will have about 800 steer calves and 450 heifers. Buyers will pasture both groups a full year before placing them in feed pens for finishing.

DeBusk bought 250 head from Marion Baugh of Brownwood, paying 36 cents for steers and 32 cents for heifers.

In addition to the Nail cattle DeBusk contracted for 200 yearlings from Morris Odom at 30 cents per pound. Approximately 250 more were bought from Homer Norris, Ivan Clark and several other local producers.

Local Couple Give Library 119 Books

One hundred and nineteen volumes were given to Cross Plains High School's library last week by Mr. and Mrs. Edgar McNutt. The books are mainly fiction.

"The books will prove to be valuable additions to the school library," said Mrs. S. L. McElroy, county librarian, who was arranging them in proper shelves last Wednesday.

Mrs. McElroy estimated that the high school libraries of Callahan County contain approximately 15,200 books. She said they were apportioned something like this: Clyde 4,000, Baird 3,100, Cross Plains 3,100, Putnam 2,800 and Eula 2,200. In addition there are about 5,000 in elementary level libraries of the five schools in the county.

Each of the county libraries accepts gift books from patrons and friends, however, they are screened by either responsible members of the faculty or the county librarian before being added to shelves.

All Incumbents Win At Voting Saturday

Saturday proved to be a triumphant time for incumbent office-holders in Cross Plains. Voters made no changes in either the school board or the city council.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield who

ran unopposed for re-election received 104 of 125 votes polled in municipal balloting. Councilmen Raymond DeBusk with 89 votes, and T. T. Nichols, with 78, were also re-elected. V. L. Hobby, who sought an

initial term as alderman, garnered 66 votes.

In the school trustee election Tommie Harris received 163 votes and Dr. Carl J. Sohns had 147 to win new three-year terms. R. C. Merryman, with 78 votes, ran unsuccessfully in his first bid at local politics. A total of 202 votes was polled.

In county school trustee voting all incumbents were re-elected. Cross Plains gave its representative on the board, J. Howard Cox, 178 votes.

Numerous write-ins were noted in each of the local elec-

tion. In the city council race votes for mayor were given J. P. McCord, Dave Lee, Ray Purvis and Roy Cox.

For school trustee, write-ins went to Oran Bains, Dwayne Wilson and Wayne Ford.

In the county school trustee race, voters wrote in James Hickman, Pat McNeel, Jr., W. F. Kilgore and Forrest Walker.

Balloting was held in the City Hall with Mrs. W. F. Kilgore serving as presiding judge for municipal voting, and Alton Hornsby filling the same capacity in school balloting.

SOMETHING NEW DOWN ON THE FARM

There were a few raised eyebrows and some chuckles a couple of years ago when the Cross Plains Review prophesied that local farmers would one day supplement incomes by catfish farming.

Dr. Kent Davis of Washington, D. C., who was reared in Cross Plains, recognizes possibilities of the diversified activity for local farmers, and has provided the home town newspaper with a copy of a government bulletin on the subject. It is available for 15 cents merely by writing Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402, and asking for "Catfish Farming, a New Farm Crop", U. S. Department of Agriculture Bulletin No. 2244.

The 22-page pamphlet supplies needed information for anyone contemplating such an endeavor. It is also interesting reading for sportsmen and hobbyists.

Absentee Votes Begin For Primaries Monday

Mrs. Beatrice Deal, county and district clerk, has issued the following statement concerning absentee voting, which begins Monday and continues through April 28 for the May 2 primary election.

All qualified voters of this state who expect to be absent from the county of his residence the day of election or who because of sickness, physi-

cal disability or religious beliefs can not appear at the polling place in the election precinct of his residence on day of election, may cast his vote by either personal appearance at the County Clerk's office or by voting by mail.

A qualified voter who because of sickness, physical disability or by cause of religious beliefs can not appear at polling place on day of election must make application for absentee ballot by mail. If the voter expects to be absent from the county on day of election he must vote at clerk's office beginning on 13th of April, ending 28th of April. A voter must request a ballot to be mailed out of county and to be voted out of county, if expected to be out of county on day of election. For further information call county clerk's office.

They were: L. W. Green, George Eubanks, Perry Gilliland, G. M. Stokes, J. C. Jentho, Frank D. Frazier, F. Arvin Russell, W. T. Goble, J. H. Neubar, L. D. Lones, Edgar Smith, T. M. Walker, Hayne Gilliland, J. O. Smedley and J. E. Roderich. Membership that first year grew to a total of 56.

The Baird unit is one of the Legion's oldest with continuous service in Texas. In

addition, under leadership of Lunsford, it is now believed to have more active members per capita than any other city in the United States. Each year approximately 150 veterans pay dues and participate in the Baird post's functions.

First officers of the Eugene Bell Post were: L. W. Green, commander, James Asbury, adjutant; C. R. Cook, finance officer; Royce Gilliland, chaplain, and Hayne Gilliland, historian.

Most recent activity of the Baird post was the setting of a marker at the grave of the late E. H. Freeland, who was a member of the Legion more than 50 years. He was often described as an ex-serviceman's best friend in Callahan County. He rests near the flagpole in Ross Cemetery at Baird.

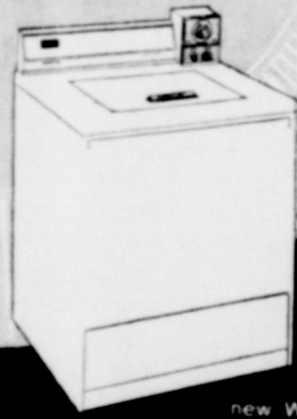

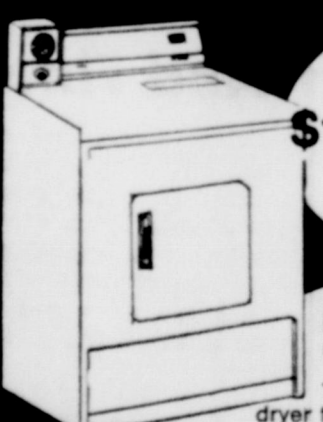

County Agent Advises Owners Of Fruit Trees

"Peach leaf curl may be a problem to many homeowners this year due to the cool wet spring that we have experienced," said County Agent Gregory Gerngross yesterday.

It is a fungal disease which attacks the young developing leaves as they emerge from the bud scales.

Ferbam can be applied in the spring at the pink-bud stage for the prevention of this disease. The fungicide must be applied prior to the leaves emerging from the buds. Ferbam should be used at the rate of 1½ to 2 tablespoons to gallon of water, the county agent advised.

Another disease that may be of concern to pear producers in the area is Fire Blight. Fire

Blight attacks the young blossoms, twigs and leaves during the growing season. As a result of this attack, the affected parts die rapidly, giving the tree a blighted appearance. The disease can be controlled through repeated application of fixed copper during the early part of the growing season. The first application should go on at full bloom and continue at two to three week intervals for a total of four applications.

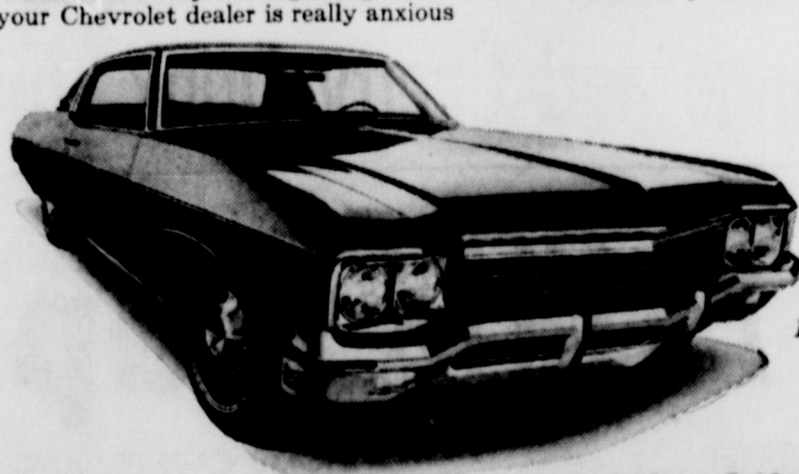

Cottonwood Native Buried At Lubbock

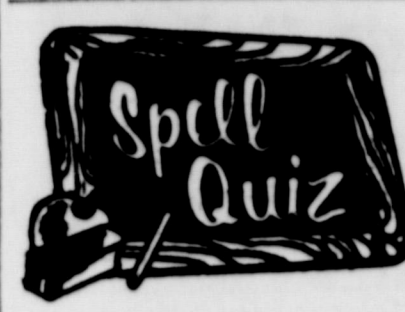
Mrs. Bernice Coats, 76, of Lubbock died March 31 in a hospital at Hurst. She was a native of Cottonwood.
