A second meeting of the Cross Plains Little League organization has been called for Thursday night. Starting time is 8 p.m. at the Ranch House Cafe.

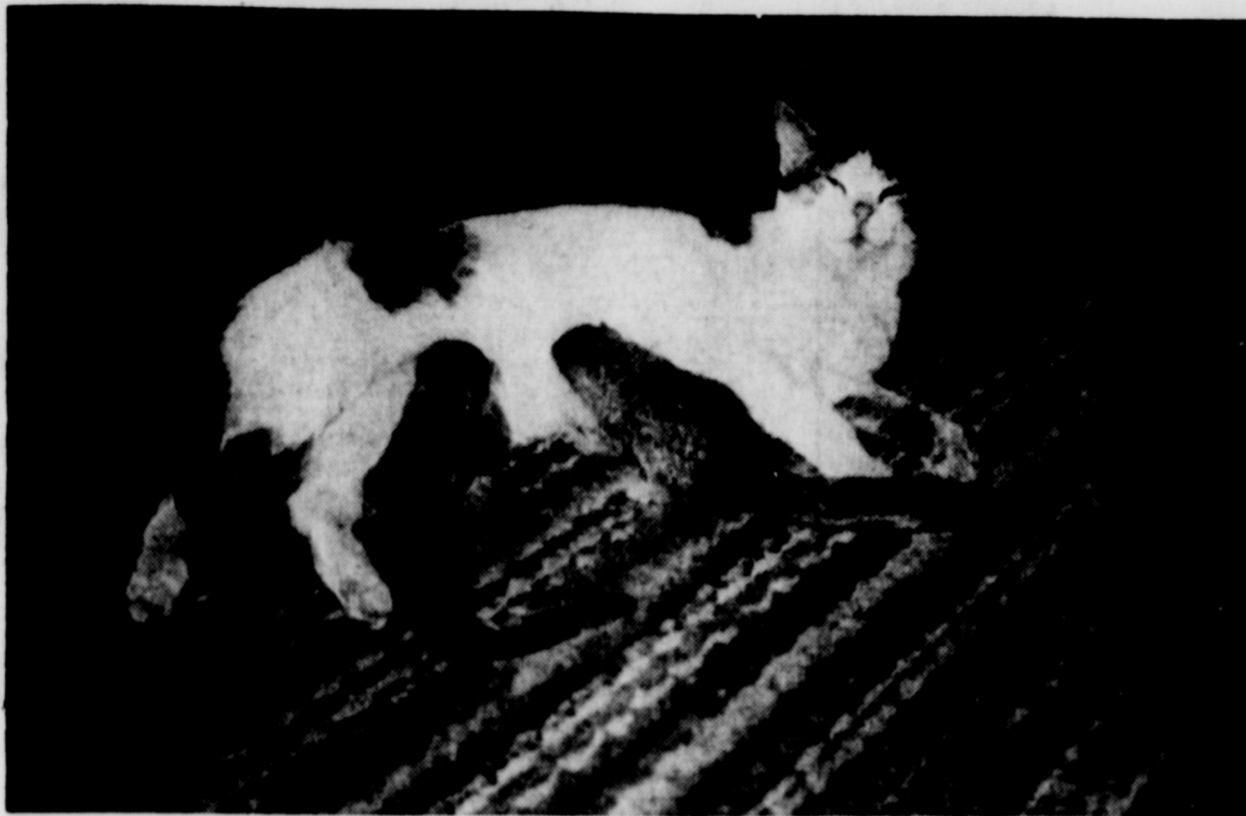
In a session last Thursday tentative date for beginning the 1970 season was set for May 5. Tryouts for new players were scheduled for April 24.

Joe C. Hanna Outlines His Legislative Planks

Joe Hanna, candidate for state representative, issued the following formal statement in behalf of his candidacy.

"As a candidate for state representative of this district, I take this means of asking you for your vote May 2.

"If I have not contacted you personally, I certainly hope to do so at a later date, because I want to be a true representative of all of the voters of this area.

Young Cattleman Takes Fresh Approach To Ancient Business

West Texas Livestock Weekly, published at San Angelo, carried a lengthy account of the operation of a young Cross Plains rancher in its April 9 issue. It is reproduced hereunder.

Sam Odom, 25, figures a young man starting into the cattle business today has to approach it differently than he might have done it many years ago. Sam's father, Morris, for example runs yearlings, cows and calves.

But Sam has lease to pay for and two sections of newly-bought land to make payments on, and he can't figure any way to do it from cows and a single calf crop per year. Instead, he is going the yearling route and has added a pre-conditioning period for very light heifer

calves, later sending these calves through commercial feedlots on his own account.

The high market on stocker calves lately has gotten his schedule out of joint a little, but basically he is trying to finish about 200 head per month for sale out of the feedlots, these being heifers weighing a little over 600. To keep the turnover going, he tries to buy about 200 heifer calves per month weighing around 200 pounds. These come out of Mississippi and East and South Texas, through order buyers.

Depending upon weight and condition, he keeps them 40-60 days at the bought place he has prepared for them near Burkett. The two sections include about 400 acres of cultivation, the rest pasture. He has received

ing and holding pens and has been fencing both fields and pastureland into small tracts, where he can see the cattle every day. Fields are planted mostly to oats for winter grazing, sudan for summer. All cattle are given free access to some pastureland as well as the field.

To help them along, and try to get the average daily gain up to about a pound for the pre-conditioning period, he gives them steamrolled milo plus a commercial supplement in self-feeders, free choice.

The calves get their full schedule of shots and drench upon arrival. At first, Odom thought this might be too much for them and tried to space shots over several days. He found this costly in labor

and of questionable benefit to the cattle; he has decided the shock to their systems in getting all this at once is no greater than the stress caused by unnecessary gathering and working. He also likes to have all the immunities begin as soon as possible.

Newly-arrived cattle are held close for a couple of weeks and given special high roughage pellets containing a high level of medication. After that, any not showing sickness are turned out on grain fields (or, in summer, sudan) and given the grain ration.

Odom's years in the business are limited; he went on his own about five years ago. Some close pencil work convinced him that yearling cattle would give him a better return than cows and

calves, and that pre-conditioning these light heifer calves would give him more return under present conditions than the yearlings, up to a point. They take much more intensive care, however, and the constant turnover is a sharp contrast to the normal eight-month grazing season for a yearling. His pre-conditioning facilities turn over about six times a year, on the average. Considering pre-conditioning time plus the feedlot period of 135-150 days, he's averaging two turns of cattle per year overall.

His yearling operation, conducted principally on leased pasture and grainfields, is still a big item to him and unlikely to be replaced. He can handle that more or less as a sideline; the yearlings take much less

time and labor. Large pastures are ideal for the yearling operation and impractical for the calves.

Odom has been asked why he puts the calves through the pre-conditioning period instead of simply shipping them straight to feedlots and sticking to his yearling program at home. He says the first thing is that they intensify his operation and increase his gross income for a given amount of land and labor. Several times, moreover, he has watched strings of heifer calves split at sales. He would get some and bring them home; someone else would get others and send them to commercial feedlots.

His calves, given their shots, good grazing and — perhaps (Continued on Page 4.)

Mrs. Maude Baker Buried At Burkett

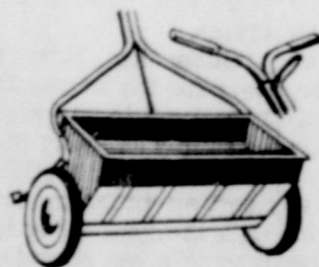
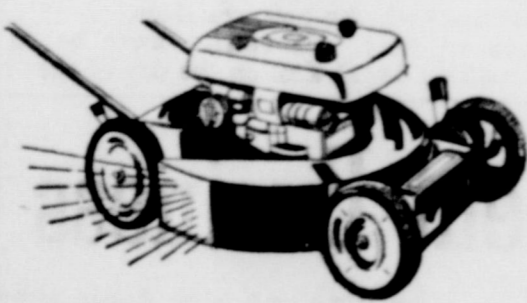
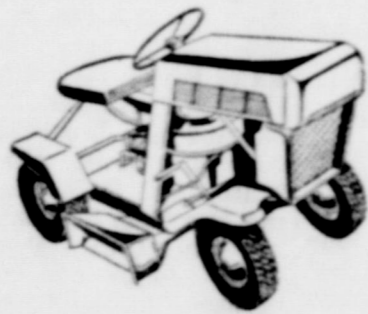

Tilton produces oil in three counties, and by coincidence all of his crude comes from the Tannehill sand. He is considered topmost authority on that formation.

most important — plenty of room and rest, got over their weaning and travel problems and began putting on gain in a matter of days. Those put directly in to a feedlot showed a higher percentage of sickness and were much slower to straighten out and start gaining.

Lately, even considering higher feed costs, his gain costs in commercial lots have been running 20-22 cents a pound.

Odom's initial investment in the average light heifer calf lately has been around \$84; last fall it was \$70-\$75. He figures this calf, tripling its weight before it comes out of the feedlot, has a better chance to grow out and offset a declining market than a heavier animal would.

Herd Runs Third In District Meet

Cross Plains Buffaloes ran third in the District 9-A track and field meet at Goldthwaite last week end, but six Bisons qualified for regional competition.

The six tracksters will vie in six events in the Region II-A meet Saturday, April 25, in Denton.

Host Goldthwaite Eagles captured the 9-A crown in collecting 160 points, Bangs Dragons were second with 121½, and Buffaloes tallied 83½. Santa Anna scored 46, and Early netted 33.

Buffaloes who earned a regional berth by placing first or second in an event in the league meet are Leslie Cowan, Joe Dodds, Oliver Robertson, Brad Harris, Bobby Cowan and Mike Knott.

Cowan, who was the Herd's biggest point winner with 25, will participate in three events. He took blue ribbons in the shot put, on a heave of 45 feet, 3¾ inches, and discus, throwing it 133 feet, 2½ inches, and ran a leg on the second place sprint relay team. He was also sixth in the 100-yard dash in 10.7 seconds.

Dodds, runner-up Buff scorer with 20½ points, will compete in two events in Denton. He won first in pole vault with a record tying 11 feet, 6 inches, and another first in the 120-yard high hurdles in 16.4 seconds. He shared sixth place in the high jump.

Robertson ran second in the mile clocking 4:59.5.

Harris, Knott and Bobby Cowan are other members of the sprint relay unit which ran second in time of 45.8.

Other Buffs earning points were: mile relay team third, Knott third in 220-yard dash (24.1), Bobby Cowan third in 440-yard dash (52.9) and fourth in high jump and Robert Lewis fifth in 880-yard run (2:15.2).

Cross Plains freshman unit claimed second place behind Goldthwaite. Bangs was third followed by Santa Anna and Early.

Bufs, 15 years old, winning first places were: Donnie Dillard in 440, Rodney Renfro in broad jump and Lynn Koenig shared top spot in the high jump.

Two relay units placed second, sprint relay including Dillard, Rex Mayes, Renfro and Bruce Johnson, and the mile relay composed of Tony Gelson, Johnson, Renfro and Dillard.

Additional points were earned by Gelson fourth in high jump and 440; Mayes third in 50-yard dash, fourth in pull-ups, fifth in 100-yard dash; Renfro second in 100-yard dash and third in shot; Dillard second in shot, and Ricky Potter fifth in 440 and 60-yard high hurdles.

Local junior high school cindermen finished third, and all schools in that division followed the order of their high school counterparts.

most important — plenty of room and rest, got over their weaning and travel problems and began putting on gain in a matter of days. Those put directly in to a feedlot showed a higher percentage of sickness and were much slower to straighten out and start gaining.

Lately, even considering higher feed costs, his gain costs in commercial lots have been running 20-22 cents a pound. Odom's initial investment in the average light heifer calf lately has been around \$84; last fall it was \$70-\$75. He figures this calf, tripling its weight before it comes out of the feedlot, has a better chance to grow out and offset a declining market than a heavier animal would.

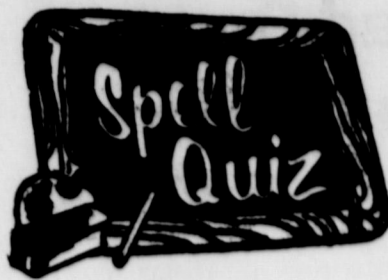
R. E. (Hick) Edington of Cross Plains has been re-elected to a new three-year term on the board of directors for Coleman Production Credit Association.

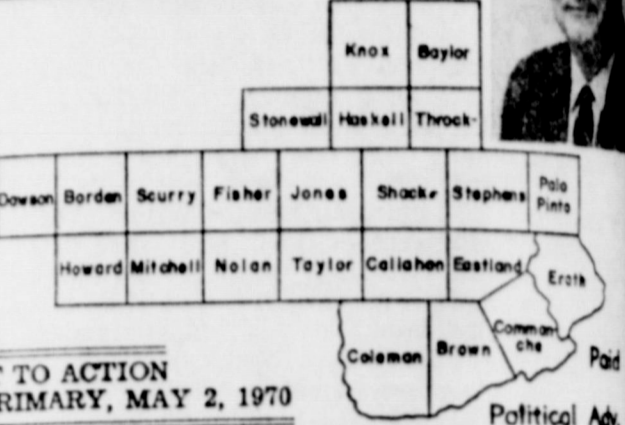

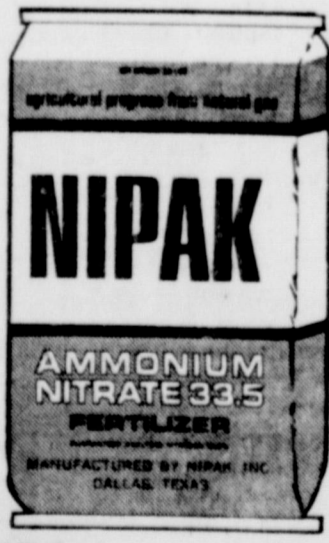
