Revisions Made In Peanut Regulations

The only way excess peanuts may be destroyed in 1970 is by hogging off or leaving the excess acreage in the ground. For 1970 an acreage of peanuts which is dug for any purpose will be considered as harvested and will be charged against the effective peanut allotment.

Peanut Pests Beat Planters To Fields

Even before 1970 peanut crops are all planted a threat to yields is reported.

The pest is the lesser corn stalk borer moth which cost Central Texas peanut growers some three-quarters of a million dollars last year. The first moth was trapped near De Leon, nearly two weeks earlier than the first evidence found in peanut fields in 1969. Two years ago, in 1968, the first moth was trapped on May 5.

"Early detection of the pest is necessary so that farmers can start their control measures immediately," said a statement from John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture. "Much of the heavy damage last year resulted from the late discovery by farmers that their fields were infested."

Burke Musgrove Asks Return To Legislature

First appearance this week of the bright green car antenna balls that have become the Burke Musgrove campaign trademark will formally launch Musgrove's re-election campaign in some 20 towns in the 53rd Legislative District, according to a statement from the Musgrove Campaign Committee.

Representative Musgrove, who was re-elected to a second two-year term by the largest vote margin in the history of this legislative district with some 80 per cent of the total vote cast, said, "I plan to run another high-level, clean, positive campaign. This campaign is appreciated and respected by the voters."

A frequent legislative critic of wasteful state spending and increasing state taxes, Musgrove stated, "I am strongly opposed proposed new state income tax and I will actively oppose the state's venturing into this new area of taxation."

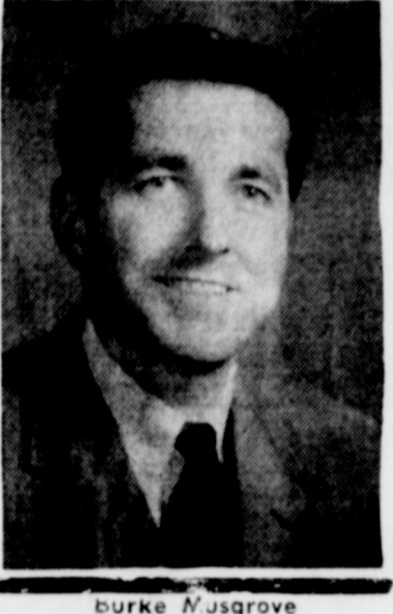
Musgrove said there are fallacies in the year-after-year demands for increasing state taxes. "Our tax structure has a built-in growth factor; for example, as the population grows there are more people paying sales taxes and, likewise, there is increased revenue without the addition of any new taxes."

"Some \$700 million in new revenue was available to be added to the budget for the present fiscal period without new taxes because of the state's economic growth. But even before an appropriation bill was finally passed during the recent special session to determine what the new revenue would be used for, a \$348 million tax bill was passed and added to the \$700 million already available in new revenue. This increase of over a billion dollars represented nearly a 25% increase in state spending over the prior fiscal period," Musgrove explained. "Several wasteful state spending projects, if corrected, and economy-in-government moves alone would and can generate enough money to take care of legitimate shortages in such areas as welfare."

The campaign committee pointed out that Musgrove was the author of Texas' new drug laws that outlawed LSD and other dangerous drugs. "The 53rd District Representative successfully pushed for expansion and modernization of the narcotics division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, as well as a co-ordinated statewide drug abuse educational effort by all state departments dealing in one way or another with the drug abuse problem."

"A member of the powerful Redistricting Committee, Musgrove will play a vital role in efforts to preserve our basic rural Legislative and Congressional districts, to prevent their being swallowed up by the big cities when the committee is required to re-draw all districts after this year's federal census (taken each 10 years)," the committee statement continued.

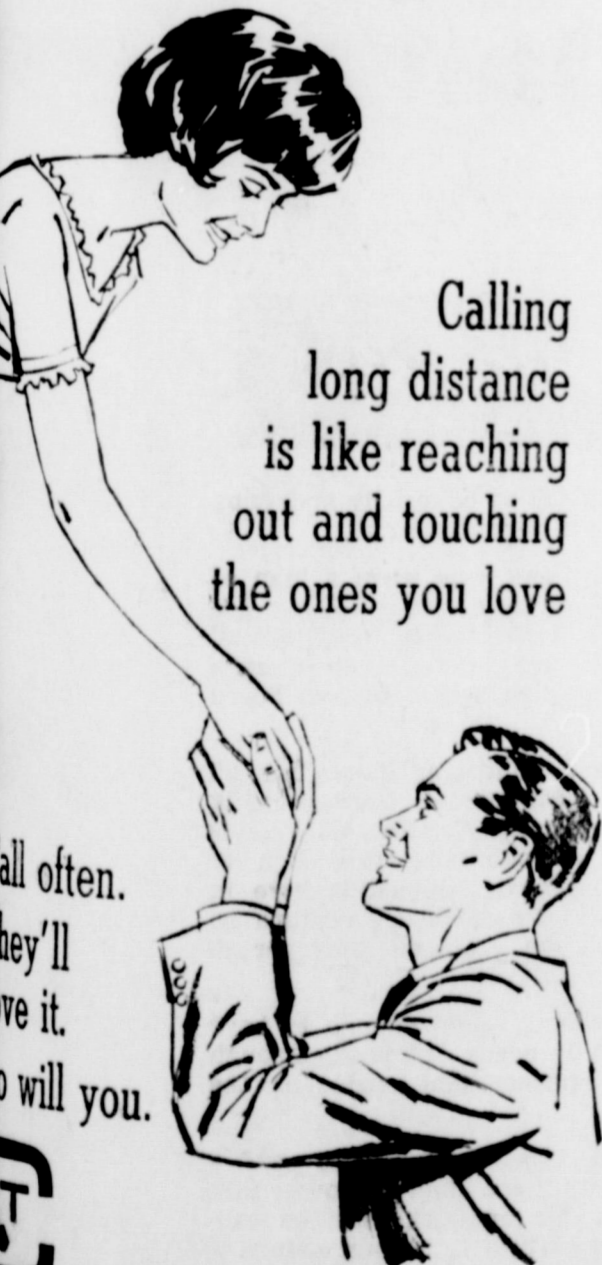


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Rabid Kitten Bites Mother, Daughter

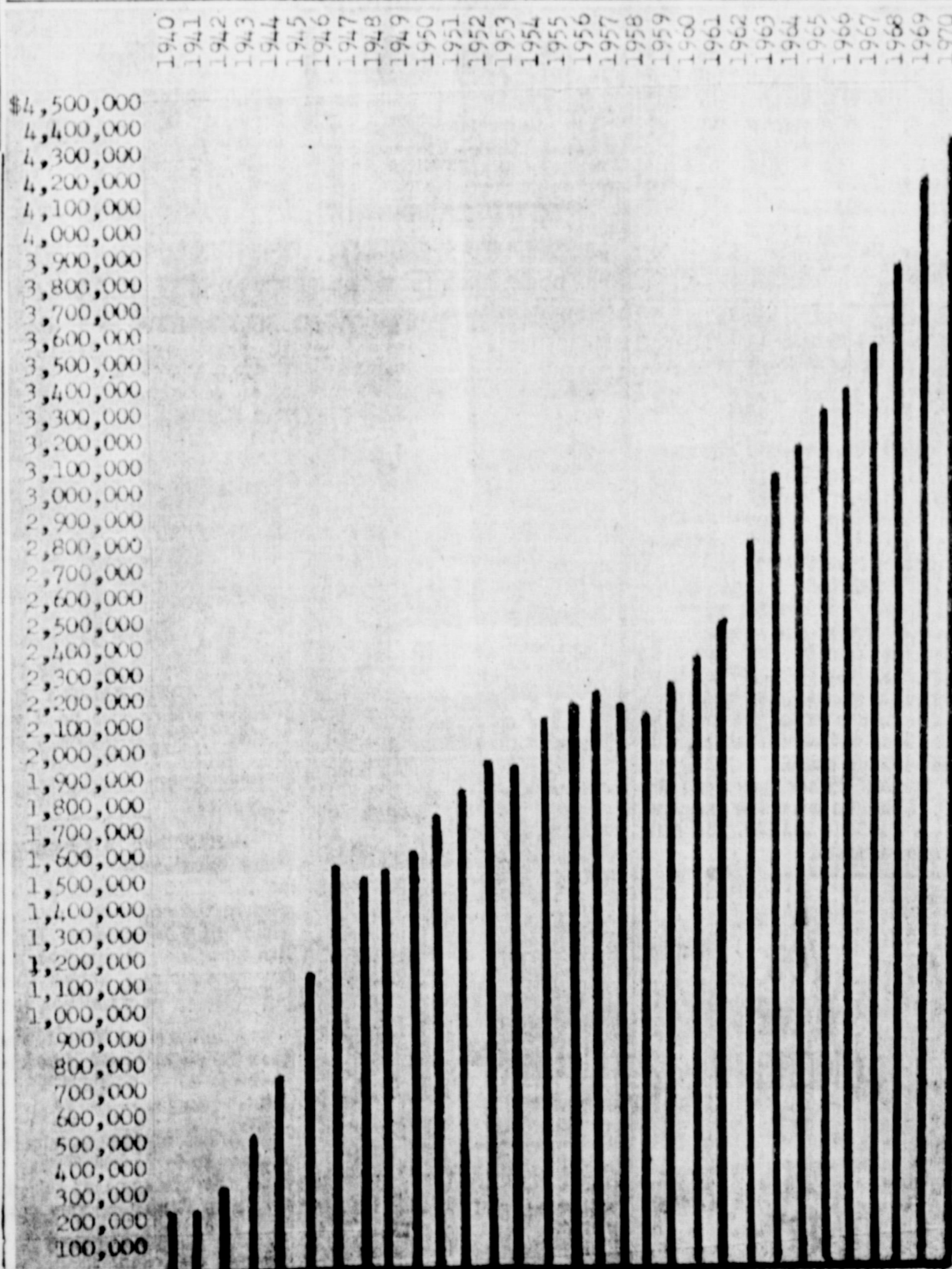
