Revisions Made In Peanut Regulations

Last year peanut producers were permitted to dispose of excess acreage by grinding and using it for feed. The only way excess peanuts may be destroyed in 1970 is by hogging off or leaving the excess acreage in the ground. For 1970 an acreage of peanuts which is dug for any purpose will be considered as harvested and will be charged against the effective peanut allotment.
