400 horsemen as well as marching bands and string of bucking broncos are expected to be at Baird Thursday night. The rodeo opens at 5 o'clock. 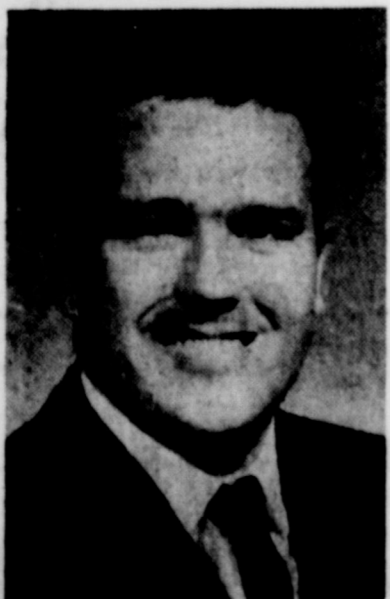
ported most every house in that community suffered some damage. Luther Porter's garage was blown in on top of his pick-up truck. Another garage was demolished at the Walter Adams home. A shed was obliterated at the Gilder Adams place and some damage done to the house. Buildings were damaged at the Freeda Koenig farm. Freddy Thate's house was damaged and he sustained facial cuts.

The tornado did extensive damage southeast of Cross Cut. It dipped down at the former Dolphus Prater place and obliterated a barn and outbuildings. The old Henson house to the east was hit and badly damaged. Then the former Chambers house and outbuildings to the northeast fell victim to the wind's fury. Not a structure was left standing there. Path of the storm can still be followed into the pasture of Mrs. Hershel Smith where large trees were uprooted. A calf was killed at the Steve Williams place along with other damages. On the Graham Ranch three horses were killed, however, it was not immediately learned whether they were victims of wind or lightning. A house was demolished on the east side of the ranch. There were scores of lesser damages in the Cross Cut vicinity and telephone service was interrupted. All buildings were blown down at the place, southeast of Cross Cut, owned by Mrs. Edgar Prater.

In the Burnt Branch sector, west of Cross Plains, most damage resulted from hail which was blown in by hard, straight wind. Grain fields belonging to Leonard Baum, Vernon and Frank Spencer were said to have been hard hit and extensively damaged.

Hot Races Hold Interest In Election Set Saturday

Texans will go to the polls Saturday to cast first primary ballots. In Callahan County it is estimated 2,500 of the 3,989 eligible voters will visit the polls.

Statewide the race attracting most attention is that for U. S. senator in which Ralph Yarborough, incumbent, is being vigorously contested by Lloyd Bentsen. Pollsters regard the outcome as close.

Possibly in second place of the statewide contests is that for land commissioner. Incumbent Jerry Sadler, who has been much in the news in recent months as a result of efforts to recover sunken treasure from the Gulf of Mexico, is opposed by Bob Armstrong and Fred Williams.

For state representative from

the 53rd District which embraces Callahan, Eastland and Shackelford, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties, a heated race has developed. Two Breckenridge men are pitted, Burke Musgrove, the incumbent, faces a formidable challenge from Joe C. Hanna, former Stephens County businessman.

In Callahan County only two contested races are offered. Both are for county commissioner posts.

In Precinct 4, Duke Mitchell, the incumbent, is being opposed by Bill Lawrence and Nathan Foster. Interest is believed keen in this race and it is expected to cause heavy voting in Cross Plains.

In Precinct 2, Glen Swor, the incumbent commissioner, faces opposition from four candidates.

They are Winfred Scott, Billy R. Windham, Ray Floyd and Lowell Johnson.

Polls will open at 8 Saturday morning and close at 7 that night. Results are expected to be announced within 30 to 45 minutes after closing time.

Tallies will be posted on a bulletin board at the Review office.

Parade Launches L.L. Season Here Tuesday

Usual parade through Cross Plains will herald opening of the 1970 Little League baseball season Tuesday, May 5. The professional will form at Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply on South Main and march northward on Main at 5 p.m. to Little League Field in Edgewood Addition.

It will feature the four Little League teams, two Pee Wee clubs and adult supervisors of each. Mounted horsemen are expected, and local businesses and civic organizations have been invited to enter a float or vehicles in the parade.

The two minor league teams, sponsored by Rose Butane Service and Pioneer Farmers Co-Op, will battle in starting action just prior to ceremonies initiating Little League play.

First game will begin at 6:30 p.m. featuring the defending champion Cats and runner-up Beadles. Immediately following, about 8 p.m., the Kilowatts and Buffs square off in the nightcap. Twinbills are carded each Tuesday and Thursday night during the 18-game schedule, found elsewhere in today's Review, according to James Lawrence, league president.

Tryouts were held last Friday, and team managers selected rookies immediately thereafter. Twenty-eight of the 48 Little Leaguers this year are new to the organization.

Ex-Local Youth Is Killed In Vietnam

Pfc. Douglas McCorkle, 19, formerly of Cross Plains, was killed in Vietnam Saturday. The base camp where he was stationed was overrun by enemy attack.

Funeral service will be held when the body arrives home from overseas.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas P. McCorkle of Abilene.

Pfc. McCorkle was born Sept. 8, 1950, at Coleman. He attended schools in Lueders, Cross Plains, Stamford and graduated from Abilene High School in 1969. At Abilene High, he was a member of the basketball team for three years and was selected for the letterman "A" Association his senior year. He was also a sports writer for the student newspaper, the Battery.

He went to Vietnam in January of 1970 and was with the 554th Construction Engineers Unit.

Survivors include his parents; three brothers, Bobby with the Air Force, and Weldon and Russel, both of Abilene; one sister, Mrs. Charlie Tessier of Bay City; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bob McCorkle of Stamford; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Bagwell of Whitesborough, and great-grandmother, Mrs. Addie McCorkle of Stamford.

The slain serviceman is survived by three great aunts in the Cross Plains area. They are Mrs. Wes Holcomb, Mrs. Ethel Anderson and Mrs. Otis Raughton.

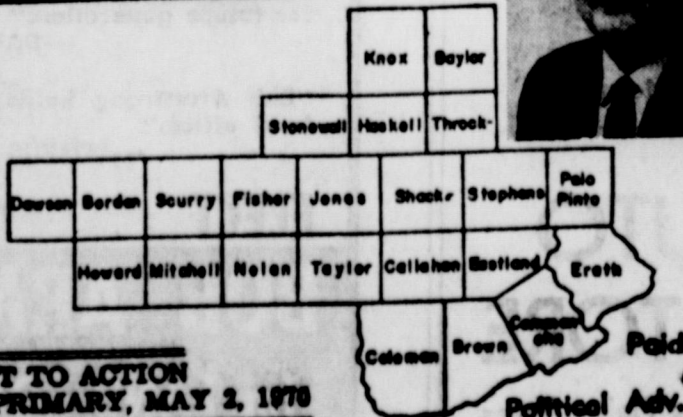

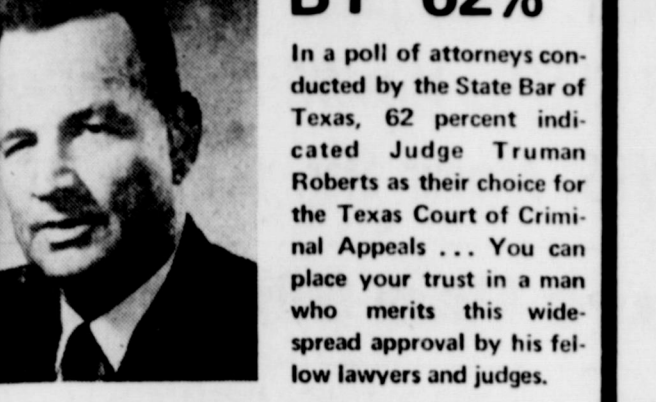

Bayou Water Cleansed By Upstream Flood Controls

Things have changed along Pecan Bayou. Residents comment about the Bayou running clearer water than it used to, and the flow is not as heavy as in bygone days but runs longer after rains. Clear water does not just happen in a segment of the country which is exposed to both agricultural and environmental pollution — which is a major problem in the 850,000 acre Pecan Bayou watershed — according to E. J. Hughes, area conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service.

"Conservation-minded farmers and ranchers, teaming with their soil and water conservation districts in using SCS technicians for providing soil erosion measures, have made a major contribution to the quality of water flowing in the Bayou for down-stream users," Hughes said.

Upstream flood control control projects which include flood detention storage in surface recovery lakes with draw-

down tubes for orderly release of flood water also contribute to a prolonged flow of clear water, Hughes said.

He noted the Pecan Bayou flow through Brownwood comes from watershed area land which has some type of conservation program in effect over 75 per cent of the farms and ranches.

The Jim Ned Creek watershed, which represents about half the drainage into Lake Brownwood, is protected by 36 floodwater retarding structures in addition to Hords Creek Lake and the recently-completed Coleman Lake.

The Upper Pecan Bayou watershed, which forms the other half of drainage into Lake Brownwood, has 32 floodwater retarding structures including the just-completed Clyde Lake which is about halfway between Denton Valley and Clyde on the main Bayou stem.

The flood control dams keep Lake Brownwood from getting as muddy as it once did and allows the lake to clear up faster after rain, in the opinion of John B. Croft, who has been fishing the lake some 20 years.

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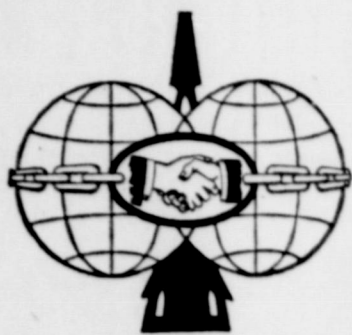

Robert I. Bowen, Coleman County chairman, reported March sales of \$5,738.

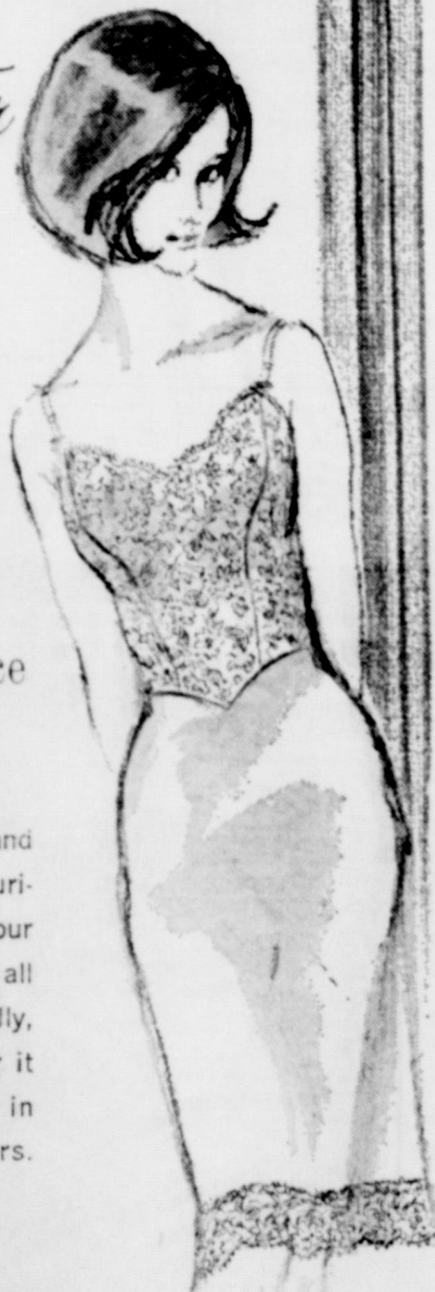
Eastland County sales last month were \$13,504.

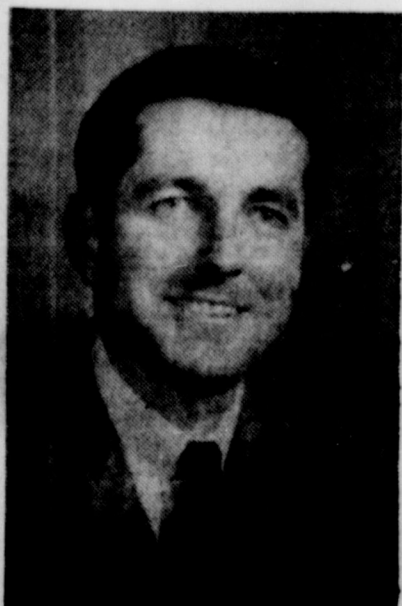

Burke Musgrove on the voting machine Thursday while the young Breckenridge legislator was said to be out of town."

Then too, there's the law suits on notes and the Gorman Hospital District confusion.

These and others may all be incidents, explained, unexplainable, relevant or insignificant. Individually, either might be excusable, but taken as a whole, the picture brings puzzlement and prompts one to think of an alternate.

Voters have that alternate in Joe Hanna, a non-politician, married and the father of three children. A World War II fighter pilot, he served 13 years on the Breckenridge school board.

Soft-spoken, but direct, Hanna impresses one as a "do-er" who will work with and for his people.

And so it is, after examining the whole picture, that this newspaper joins in endorsing Joe Hanna for State Legislature.
