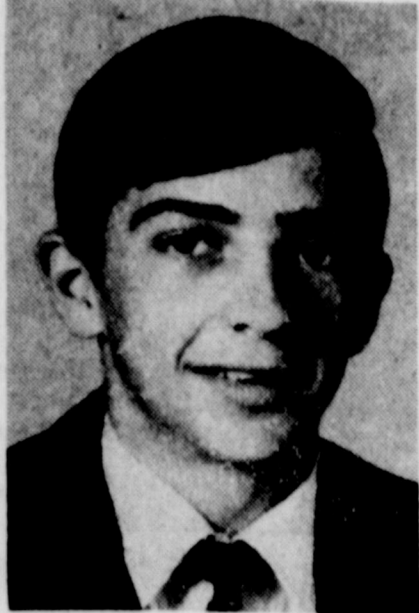

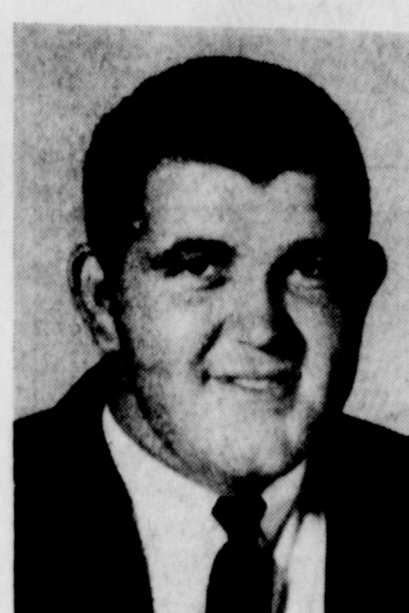

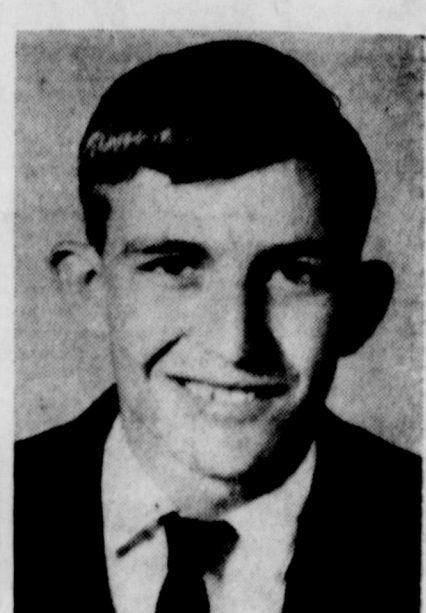

These For Whom School Bells Will Toll Last Time

Public school bells are about to toll the last time for 37 Cross Plains High School seniors.

Vesper service will be held Sunday and commencement Monday. Both exercises will be in the school auditorium and starting time is 8:15 p.m.

Boys outnumber girls in the Class of '70 nearly two to one. The 64.8 per cent of males in

the graduating group is believed unprecedented in local school history.

The Rev. D. C. Jones, pastor of the Evangelical Methodist Church, will deliver Sunday night's baccalaureate sermon. Principal address at commencement exercises will be made by Dr. Leeland Willis, president of Cisco Junior College.

Graduates to receive special recognition in the final exercises include: Sherri Ann Neal, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ike M. Neal, who will deliver the salutatory address, and Clovie Lee Norris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Norris, who will make the valedictory. Jimmy Neil Harris, high-ranking boy, will offer the invocation. Jimmy Chesshir, a member of the class, will speak the final word as he pronounces the benediction Monday night.

Friday of this week, May 15, will be the last classroom day for graduating seniors. Other students, though, will report

for regular schedules Monday. Then those who have to take final examinations will return Tuesday and Wednesday.

Enrollment held strong at Cross Plains schools through-

out the term with a total of 469 being carried on rosters the final week. This is 20 more than began the term last August. Little change is expected for next year.

Invasion Of Pests Studied In Survey

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reports that his department will conduct a comprehensive survey for lesser cornstalk borer which will begin June 8 and end August 28.

The department is setting up a dection survey whereby certain areas in the peanut growing area will be checked by departmental field workers at least once every two weeks. Field workers will make written reports to the farmer about the percentage of infestation of the moth and larva found.

It is estimated that in 1969 peanut farmers lost approximately three-quarters of a million dollars to Texas' most serious peanut insect pest, the lesser cornstalk borer. Most of this damage occurred early in the year before the insect was detected in the fields.

Information gathered from this survey will not only help the farmer determine conditions in this individual field, but the overall results of the survey will provide a large amount of information about the habits and damage of the corn borer.

Any farmer who is interested in having his field checked should apply in writing to the De Leon Research Laboratory, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444, before June 1, 1970. Farmers should state in their requests the exact location of the field (draw a map), the number of acres, dry land or irrigated and the date the field is to be planted. The department will select representative fields in different areas

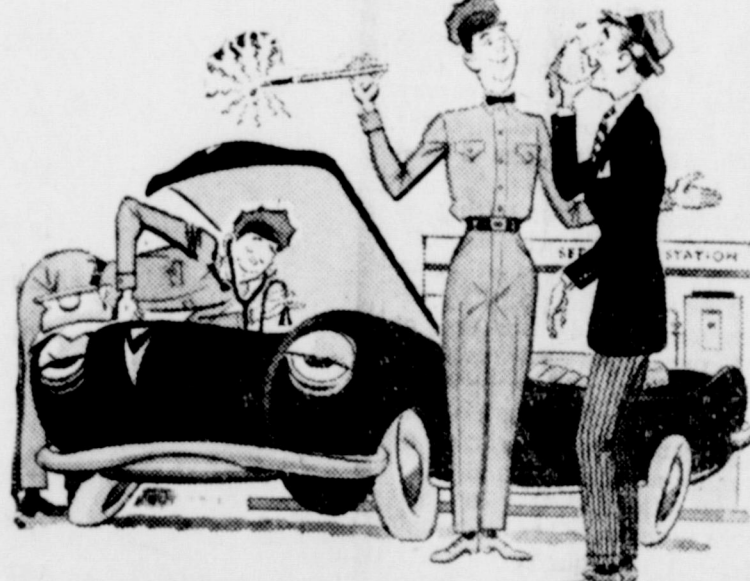

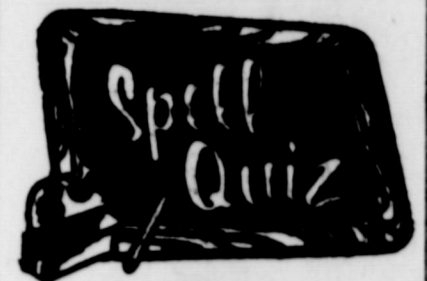

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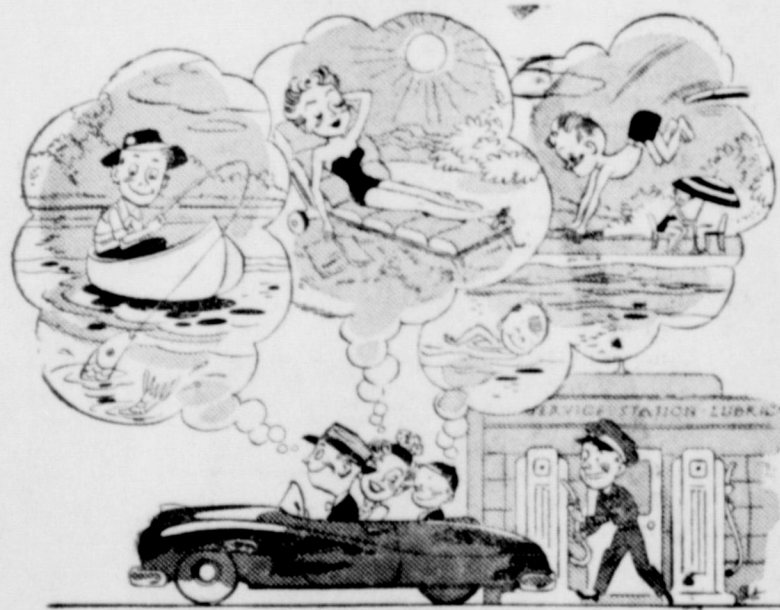
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
