Will Contest At Eula Box

Results of that vote gave Lowell Johnson a majority of two over Glen Swor, incumbent, who was seeking a fourth term.

A petition filed Friday by Tom Gordon of Abilene, Swor's attorney, alleges that the Eula voting box is not within the confines of Precinct 2, but is actually a part of Precinct 1, and that ballots polled in this race at that place are not in conformity with provisions of Texas Election Code.

Swor lost the Eula box to Johnson by a majority of 10 votes. The count was Johnson 11 and Swor 1. Disallowing these ballots would make Swor the victor by a total of eight votes.

Results of voting at other boxes in Precinct 2 at the runoff were: Denton Valley, 63 for Johnson and 58 for Swor; Opalin, Johnson 45 and Swor 59; absentee, Johnson three and Swor two.

Members of the County Democratic Executive Committee met Tuesday of last week and certified Johnson as the party's nominee for the general election in November. Purpose of the suit is to require a voiding of that action and the certification of Swor.

Preliminary hearing in the case has been set before District Judge Raleigh Brown next Monday, June 22.

Their daughter, Barbara, will enroll in Howard Payne College at Brownwood this fall.

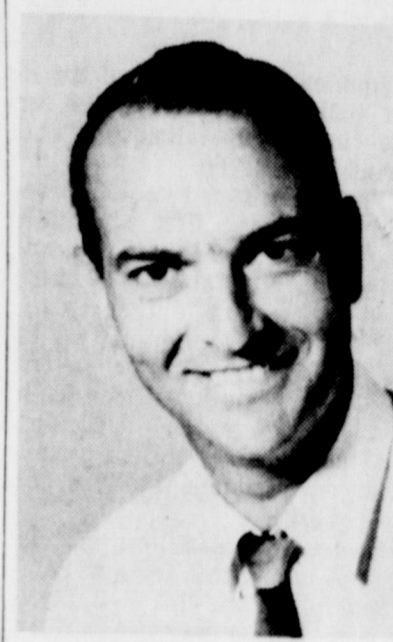
Burleson To Speak At Clyde Lake Ceremony

Area Cities Get New Totals In Population

When final tallies are in Cross Plains is expected to experience virtually no change in its population over the past 10 year period. Civic leaders consider this significant for most small towns in this section of Texas are recording sizeable losses.

Preliminary census counts released Saturday showed Cross Plains 1970 decennial headcount to be 1,155, a total of 13 below the final figure in 1960. It is believed entirely likely that the deficit will be overcome when tabulations are finalized. In both 1950 and 1960 the ultimate total was greater than that of the preliminary announcement.

Largest gain in this section of Texas is at Clyde, where a whopping 43 per cent increase was recorded. From 1,116 in 1960 the town's population jumped to 1,593, making it the largest city in Callahan County.

Baird experienced a decrease of 68, winding up with 1,565 people. County seat leaders feel, though, that this total will be upped slightly when final figures are in.

Putnam lost 35 per cent of its population. The 1970 preliminary count puts it at 133 as compared with 203 at the last enumerating.

Rising Star pretty well held its own, dropping only seven. It is presently reported at 990

as compared with 997 in 1960. It is pointed out that college students were counted at the cities in which their schools are located and this is believed to have cost two or three percentage points to small towns which have no institutions of higher learning.

Hospital and rest home patients were also tabulated wherever they happened to be at enumeration time, not necessarily at the community which they called home.

Callahan County's 1970 population is now 8,029 as compared with 7,929 in 1960, an increase of 100.

Jane Williams, an experienced charge-nurse who has been at the home more than three years, heads the night shift. She is assisted by Pauline Hines and if need be, either Col. or Mrs. Ray Lee. Betty Steward, an LVN who has been with Colonial Oaks four months, provides relief for supervisors. Patsy Miller relieves nurses

as general house superintendent and office assistant. Dr. Carl J. Sohns is on constant call at Colonial Oaks and is generally in the place several times daily. Arrangements prevail whereby any time he is to be away or unavailable, Dr. Billy Carpenter of Rising Star stands in readiness to pinch-hit for him.

Oldest member of the Colonial Oaks family from standpoint of continuous residence there is Mrs. Cordie Booth, who moved there Dec. 27, 1963. Mrs. J. C. Watson came shortly thereafter, establishing residence there only six days later.

A variety of recreation and entertainment is provided Colonial Oaks people. Newspapers, magazines and numer-

preachers. He buried his brother, John W. Brown, Sabanno. The Marvin Smith, the Edwin Erwins may be Rev. Parker."

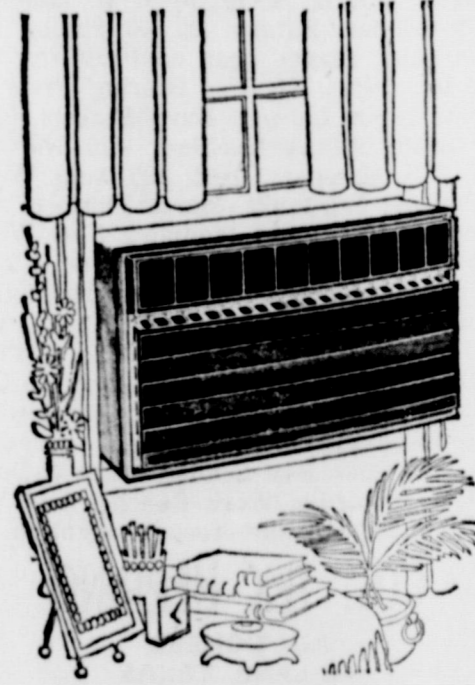

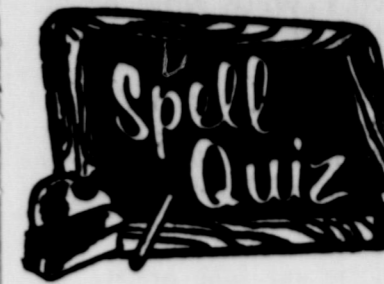
