co-op after having served as its manager 16 months, will return to Gorman, but will travel throughout the southwest as a representative of the Peanut Administration Committee of Atlanta, Ga. He will work with both shellers and growers in marketing and quality control under Agriculture Department.

## Town Shocked By Double Slaying At Local Home Last Tuesday Afternoon

Cross Plains was shocked by a double slaying in the north-east part of town late Tuesday afternoon.

Murder and suicide were ruled in the shotgun-shooting deaths of a local couple, Charlie Alton Teague, 67, and his wife, Edna, 47. The verdict was handed down by Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones of Baird, who was called in to conduct an inquest when B. C. McMillan, local J.P., was out of town.

Bodies were found by Bill Varner, Abilene realtor, who had driven down 11th Street searching for a fence-builder. He noticed the bodies on the lawn in front of the Teague home. She was nearer the front door, with her feet toward the street. He had fallen a short distance to her left and his body was nearly parallel with the street. A bolt-action, 12-gauge shotgun was near by.

No neighbors were within sight. Varner hurried to the business section of town and stopped at the newspaper office to call officials. Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox was first on the scene. He was joined soon thereafter, though, by Sheriff Grayson Miller, Texas Ranger Sid Merchant, City Marshal Chuck Thomas and other law officers.

Jones said four spent shells lay near the bodies. Teague had been shot twice in the left side, and Mrs. Teague once through the heart.

Jones ruled that Teague shot his wife and then turned the gun on himself.

Funeral for Mr. Teague was held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock from Higginbotham Chapel, with the Rev. Monty Mills of Abilene officiating. Burial followed in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Last rites for Mrs. Teague

were conducted Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, also from Higginbotham Chapel, with the Rev. E. V. Brooks, local Baptist pastor, officiating. Interment was in Greenleaf Cemetery at Brownwood.

The couple was married at Cottonwood Aug. 26, 1961. Mrs. Teague was born at Holly Hill, Fla., Aug. 20, 1922. She was a member of the First Baptist Church in Holly Hill.

Her survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Kathy Ballard of Brownwood and Mrs. Becky Orange of Fort Lewis, Wash.; three sisters, Mrs. Cordia Hampton of Jacksonville, Fla., Mrs. Carie McNew of Stuttgart, Ark., and Mrs. Mae Mackinson of Daytona Beach, Fla.; three brothers, Leroy Willis of New Orleans, La., Brown Willis and Sam Willis of Florida; three grandchildren.

Mr. Teague, a house mover,

was born April 18, 1903, in Brown County.

His survivors include two sons, Charlie Alton, Jr. of Brownwood and Billy Wayne of Abilene; one stepson, Rev. D. C. Jones of Cross Plains; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Ballard and Mrs. Orange; his mother, Mrs. Hill Wooten of Cross Plains; three sisters, Mrs. Lester Strawn of Lake Brownwood, Mrs. Willard Davis of Long Beach, Calif., and Mrs. William Day of Compton; two brothers, Andrew and John, both of Brownwood; 12 grandchildren.

## Liberty Hill Was Thriving Village Back In Days When Granddad Was Young

Editor's Note: W. Noel Black of Clyde, an early-day resident of Sabanno and Liberty, reminisces this week regarding a bit of history concerning the latter community.

In the Spring of 1906 "Uncle" Tom Vestal erected a two-story building in the Liberty Hill community, five miles northeast of Cross Plains. His son Harvey Vestal and Robert Forbes operated

a general store on the ground floor. A Woodman of the World lodge was organized and occupied the second floor.

Young people of the neighborhood were permitted to have a social party in the upper story, soon after completion of the structure.

During the same year S. B. Webb donated land for a cemetery near the store and near a union church building. The young wife of Rich Holder was the first person buried in the new cemetery.

In the course of a few months a blacksmith shop, a cotton gin and a rural mail route came to the village.

Soon thereafter a physician — a Dr. Payne — located there and practiced medicine. Eventually the union church building was torn down and the lumber was used in erection of a hospital in Cross Plains. No doubt Willie Wood and his lovely wife still remember that upstairs party in the Vestal building so long ago.

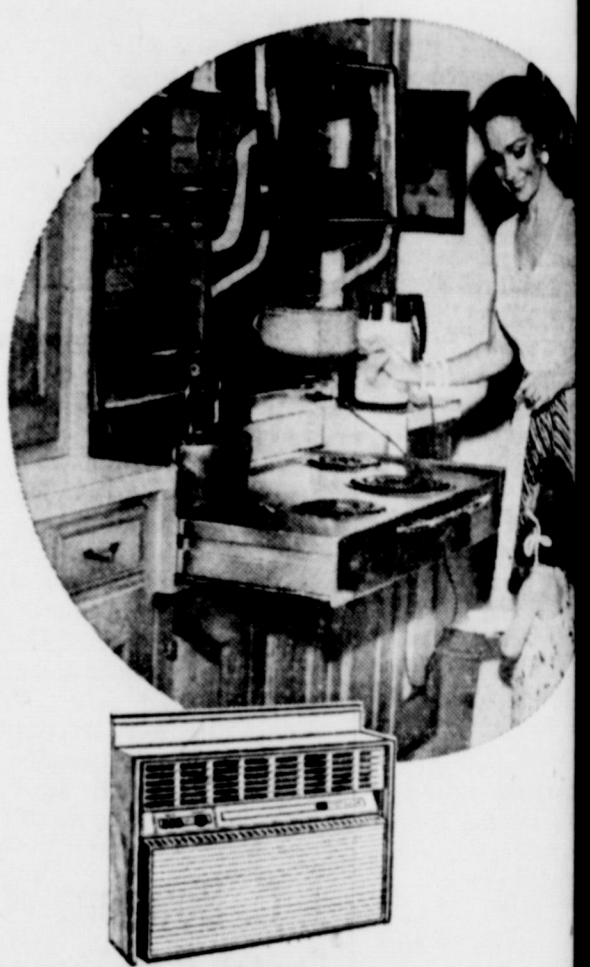

## Personal Incomes Rise In Callahan

Incomes in Callahan County were up in the past year and, as a result, consumer spending continued at a high level.

Figures show that many local merchants equaled or exceeded their previous year's volume, due in part to the higher prices for goods and services. Just how much was spent by local families for food, cars, furniture, clothing and other commodities is detailed in a new market data report, released by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It gives comparable figures for families in all parts of the country.

In Callahan County, food stores got a sizeable piece of the retail dollar. They accounted for approximately 23 cents out of every dollar that was spent.

Elsewhere in the United States, 21 cents went for food and, in the West South Central States, 19 cents.

For grocery stores, supermarkets, bakeries, meat markets and other food emporia in the area it added up to a sales volume of \$2,304,000.

This was solely for take-home food. It does not include expenditures in outside eating and drinking places.

If this outlay for food were divided equally among all local families it would average

\$1,082 per family.

Compared with the expenditure for food in most other areas of the country, this was a relatively large amount.

The SRDS report shows that consumer buying of other kinds of merchandise was also sturdier than might have been expected.

Sales of automobiles, motor

cycles, boats and other motive equipment amounted to \$2,368,000.

Department stores and shops carrying general merchandise accounted for

Apparel stores and shops handling dresses, shoes and other clothing ended the year with a total of \$172,000.

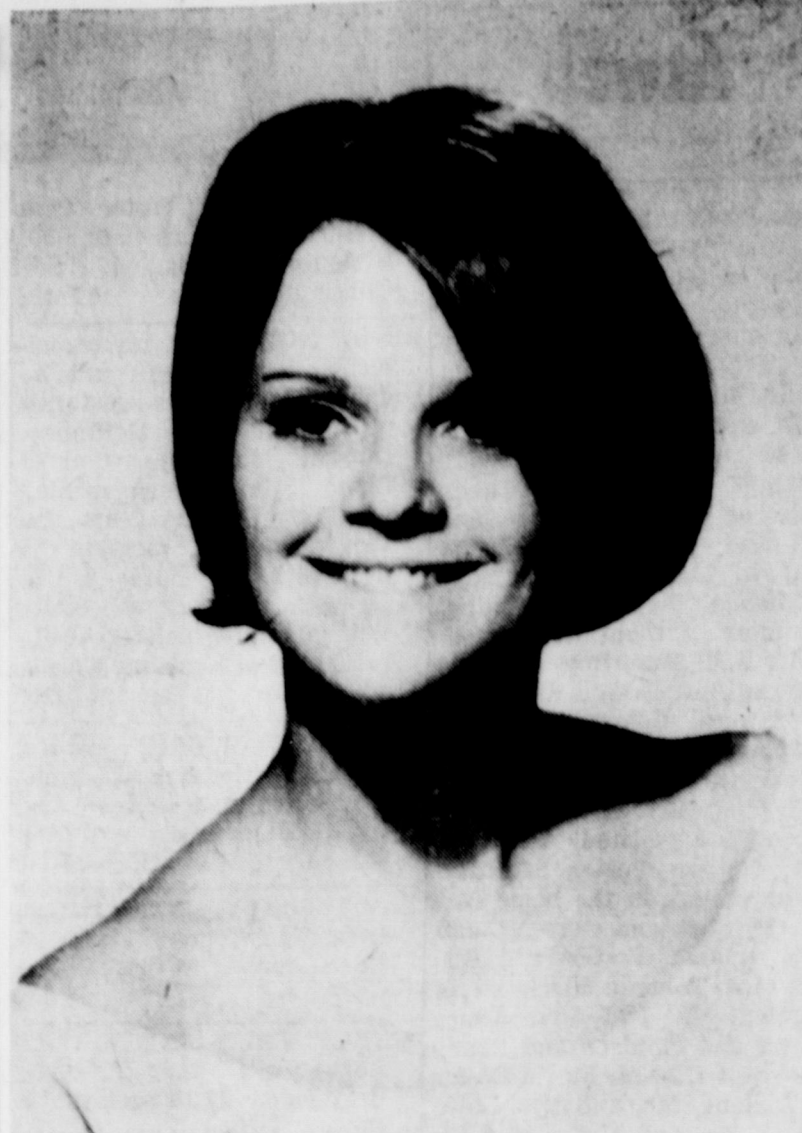

# City Hall To Get Teletype Machine

Gov. Preston Smith has approved a \$39,857 grant to West Central Texas Council of Governments for establishing a law enforcement teletype network.

The grant was made on recommendation of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, which administers funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.

It was one of 17 action grants recommended by the Council at its regular monthly meeting. The 17 grants total \$311,141.

Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of the Council, said the grant would be used to create a teletype network of 41 terminals for the 19-county area comprising the West Central Texas Region. The network, he said, will significantly reduce radio traffic and expedite the flow of law enforcement information in the region.

Counties to be served by the network include Kent, Scurry, Mitchell, Stonewall, Fisher, Nolan, Knox, Haskell, Jones, Taylor, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Callahan, Coleman, Stephens, Eastland, Brown, Comanche and Runnels.

A teletype is expected to be set up in Cross Plains City Hall.

Chiefs chose three Goldthwaite players, Kennon McLean, Johnny Johnson and Dan Hargraves.

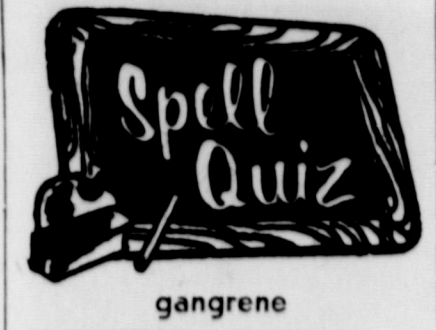

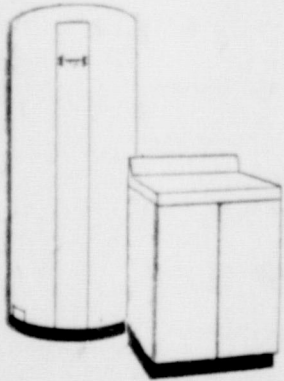
