An apparent attempted suicide resulted in two charges of intoxication, one of disturbing the peace and fines totaling \$200 here Saturday night in Bill C. McMillan's justice court.

Mrs. Clayton Smart of this city received medical attention for apparently self-inflicted cuts on left forearm, and was charged with "intoxication". A \$50 fine was assessed.

Clayton Smart of Cross Plains was also charged with "intoxication" and drew a \$100 fine. He was lodged in city jail.

Mrs. Toni Boling was charged with "disturbing the peace" and fined \$50. She was lodged in county jail at Baird.

Arrests were made by City Marshal Chuck Thomas.

Mrs. Smart was not held because of impending child birth.

## Father Indicted In Death Of Daughter

A 42nd District Court grand jury Thursday indicted James Paul Washburn, 32, of Big Spring, for murder with a motor vehicle and driving while intoxicated (DWI), second offense, in connection with a July 29 wreck near Rowden which killed his daughter.

Six-year-old Teri Lynn Washburn was dead on arrival at Abilene's Hendrick Memorial Hospital an hour after the Highway 36 accident.

Also indicted were Charles Michael Vinson, 18, no address listed, for burglary; and Chalmus Vernon Moore, 40, of McLain, for driving while intoxicated (DWI), second offense.

Five re-indictments were returned against three men for cattle theft. They include Hal Dean Windham, 32, of Oplin, and Johnny Robert Windham of Baird, two counts each; and R. L. Gobie of Abilene, one count.

Trial for Hal Dean Windham was set for Sept. 9 by Judge Raleigh Brown.

## 800 Old Settlers Spend Big Day Here Saturday

Old-timers thronged the oak grove in the City Park here Saturday for 32nd annual reunion of Callahan County pioneers. The crowd was estimated at between 600 and 800.

The day-long activities included group singing, silent tribute to deceased pioneers, presentation of awards, special music, selection of officers for 1971 and a speech by Mrs. John Berry of Clyde.

Mrs. Berry, the first woman to ever deliver the principal address at the reunion and member of Callahan County Historical Survey Committee, spoke on a tour made of Callahan County when markers were placed in the county and early day history.

Several presentations were made at the reunion. G. C. Creek of Brownwood was the earliest cowboy and earliest pioneer man. The earliest pioneer woman was Mrs. Cora Lilly of San Angelo who was also the oldest native-born woman.

The earliest pioneerman and woman with continuous residence in the county were Perry Purvis and Elizabeth Burks, both of Cross Plains. The oldest native man was W. D. Peevy of Cisco.

Mr. and Mrs. S. N. Foster of Cross Plains was the couple married longest attending the event.

Mrs. Louise Hawk Schwery of Stockton, Calif., was the woman coming the longest distance to attend the meeting. Bill Childers came all the way from Tripoli, North Africa, and attended the reunion.

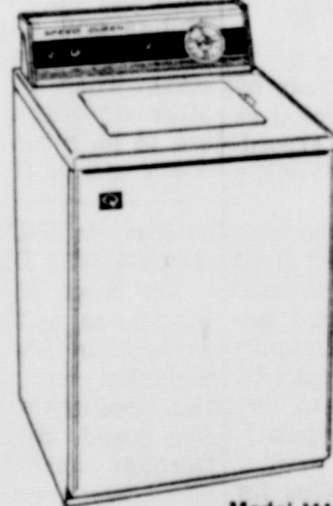

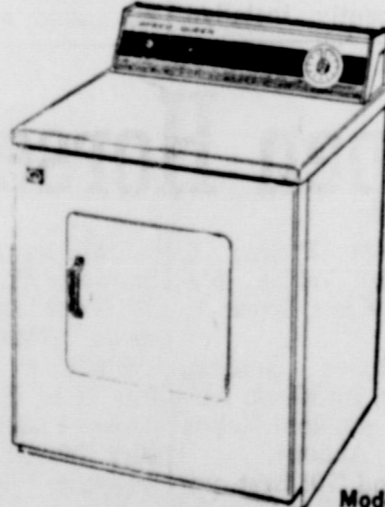

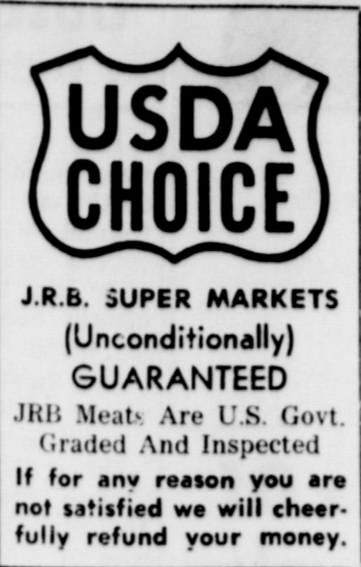

The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

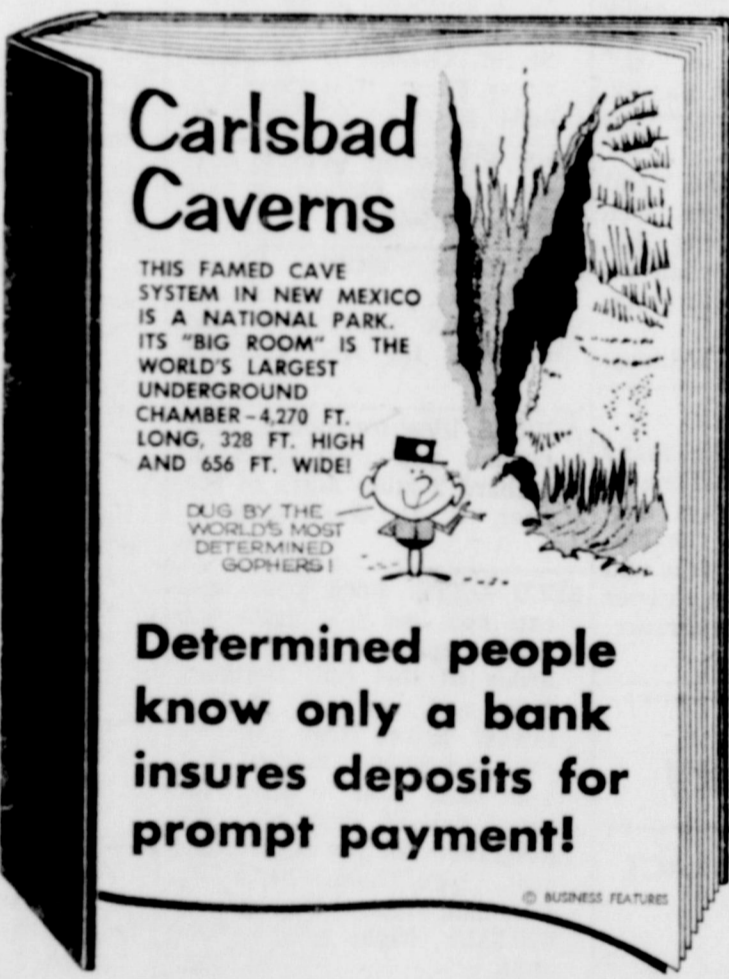

General Election Nov. 3, 1970  
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
1. That Article III, Section 5-b, Subsection (a), of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

The State Building Commission is created and to be vested with the powers and authority of the same name by the Legislature of the State of Texas and the duties of the Commission shall be as follows: The Commission shall consist of three members appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Commission shall be organized and shall begin its duties on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment recommissioning the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

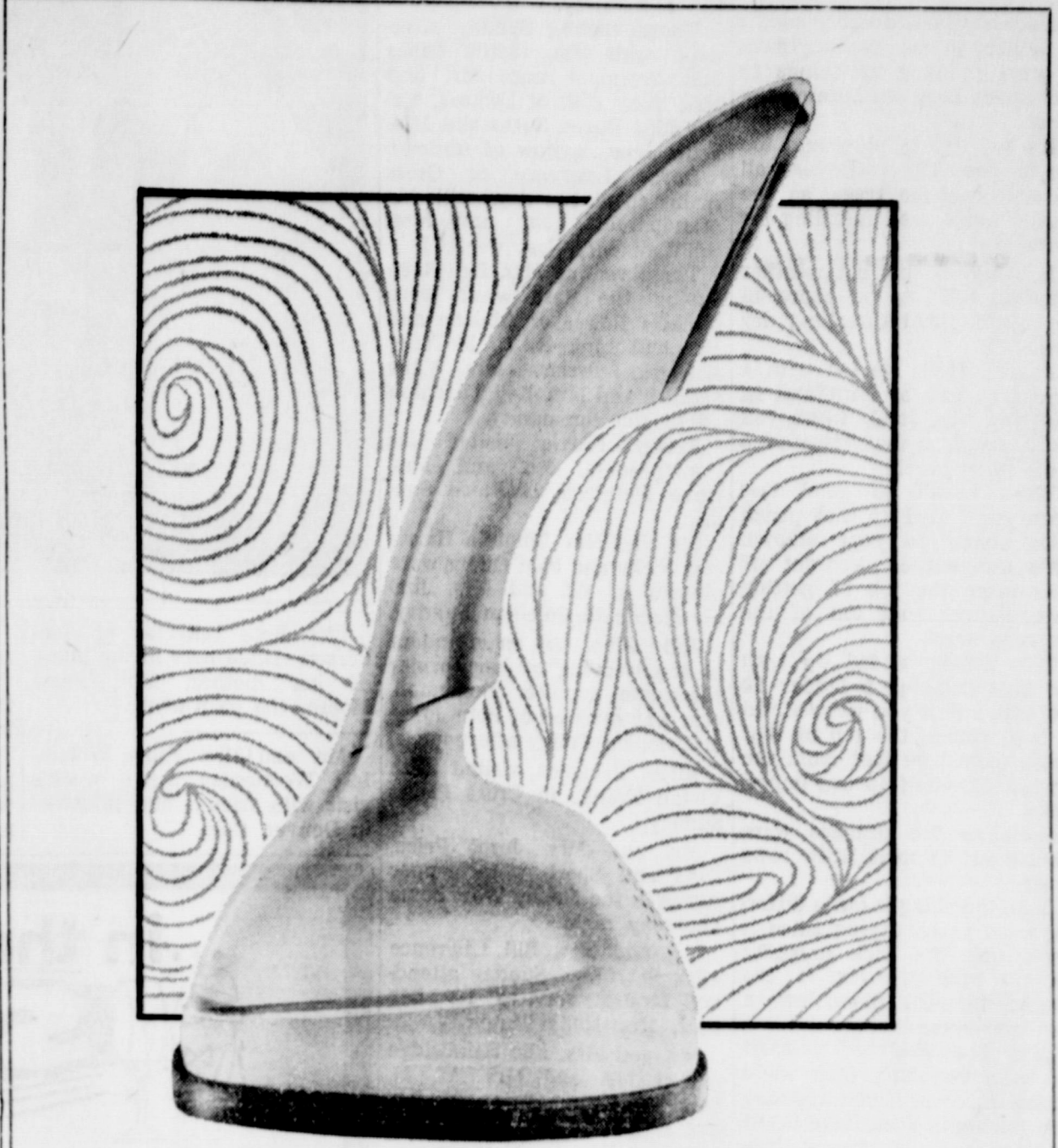

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

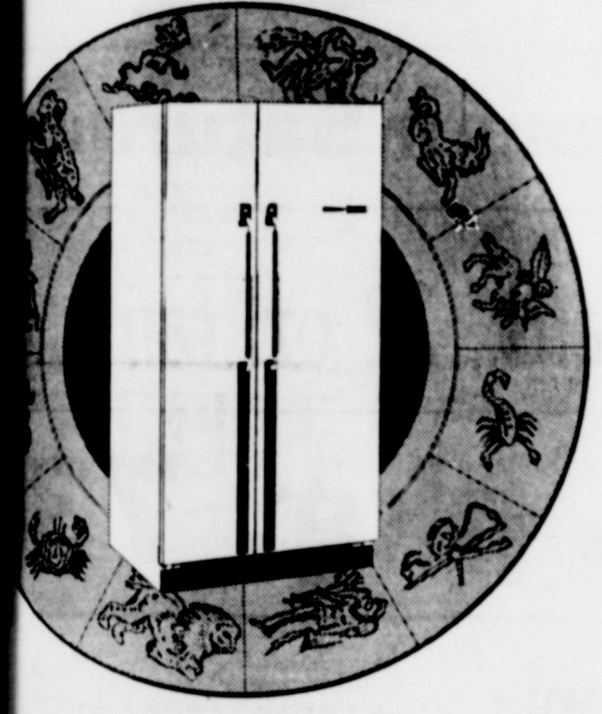
recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

## Rowden Area "Too Dry To Plow And Too Hot To Hoe"

Since dry, hot weather seems to be here to stay, we may have to start thinking up things to do to keep busy out here on the farm.

It's too dry to plow and too hot to hoe. The cattle are all under the shade trees, so the fences won't need mending for a while.

It would be perfect weather for that used to be chore of drying fruit and threshing dry beans.

Peach drying started with a bushel or two of fruit and in one way was good, when you could sneak a few bites of a good, juicy peach.

What wasn't so good was when you ended up with peach juice nearly to your elbows. After the peaches were cut off them came the job of getting them to the roof top of the house to dry.

This usually ended up with the kids climbing a ladder 10 feet tall, and if you were afraid of high places, the top of that house looked 50 feet from the ground. Standing up was impossible.

Somehow the peaches were spread out in neat little rows to dry.

Bean threshing is quite different from peach drying since it starts with the back breaking job of bending over to the ground to pick them into a cast-off cotton sack.

Dry, hot weather is ideal for bean threshing. You wield a long stick and if you are mad over having to work, take it out on that sack of beans. The harder you hit it, the quicker the beans are out of the hulls.

Who can remember holding that tub of beans high in the wind and pouring them from one tub to the other? If you are lucky, you end up with only beans, no hulls.

It is nice to go in the grocery store today and pick up that package of dried fruit or beans even if you do have to pick a few rocks out of the beans.

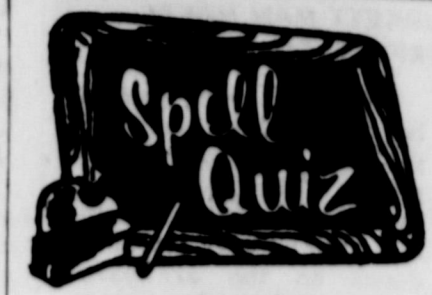
