## Big Rains Break Costly Drought

Most protracted drought in five years was broken for the Cross Plains area Thursday. Heavy showers arrived shortly before dusk and continued well into the night. Saturday brought a repeat performance.

In Cross Plains neither rain was as heavy as were precipitations to the west and south. F. C. Newton, local observer for the Weather Bureau, gauged Thursday's and Friday morning's rainfall at 2.20 inches and Saturday's at .90. Prior to that time he had measured only two small showers, one .14 and the other .34 since July 1.

West of Cross Plains in the Dressy and Burnt Branch localities much more moisture fell. C. R. Cook, who lives 11 miles west of town, reports a total of well over five inches

during the week end. All streams in the area ran and most stock ponds caught near full. A few ran around spillways.

Oren Barr received 5.60 inches over the week end. Reports varied in the Cross Cut sector, but seemed to average around two inches. At the Garland Arnold place winds destroyed an outbuilding. Gus Brandon received 1.60 inches at his place northeast of Cross Plains.

Fields are reported in ideal shape for fall planting and farmers are expected to be busy the next few weeks seeding wheat, oats and other small grains.

Total rainfall for the year in Cross Plains, as gauged by Newton, is 16.83 inches.

## LIGHTNING KILLS 5 COWS ON SATURDAY

Five quality Angus cows were killed by lightning between Cross Plains and Putnam Saturday afternoon. They were found dead under a tree.

The cattle belonged to Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Earp and were in a pasture known as the Shirley place. Three of the cows had small calves, all of which escaped injury.

## Schools Make Fast Beginning Tuesday

A new term was launched with a running start at Cross Plains school campus Tuesday morning. Every facility operated on schedule. Classes began at 3:10 a.m. and dismissed at 3:15 p.m.

Although most students registered early a few were being accommodated Tuesday and principals Scot H. Edington and Jack Watkins opined that late arrivals would probably come in all of this week and next.

High school enrollment is certain to be greater than a year ago. Edington pre-registered 178 in the upper four grades and 13 others have sent word they will matriculate in a few days. Beginning enrollment in high school seems certain to reach 191, Edington speculated.

In elementary grades the story is somewhat different. Watkins expects to wind up with about 25 fewer than he had last semester.

"We sent 53 to high school this year and started only 28 in the first grade," he said.

Enrollment by grades is presently running as follows: first 28, second 26, third 28, fourth 34, fifth 44, sixth 30, seventh 36, eighth 44; high school freshmen 51, sophomores

64, juniors 40 and seniors 36. First six-week period of school will run from Aug. 25 to Oct. 2. It will contain a holiday for Labor Day on Sept. 7, the first Monday in next month.

First football game for the Buffaloes and their new coach, Mack McConal, will be the night of Sept. 11 with Wylie. The contest will be under local lights.

## Callahan Gets Big Bite Of Federal Government Pie

Compared with other areas across the country, how well is Callahan County faring under the federal grants-in-aid programs?

What portion of the \$19.6 billion distributed last year by Washington went to the local area?

On the basis of a state-by-state study made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit organization that serves as a watchdog on the spending of public funds, Callahan County's share was relatively large.

The grants for local purposes during the past fiscal year came to an estimated \$658,000.

Total grants throughout the State of Texas as a whole amounted to \$944,000,000, it shows. Included were funds for urban renewal, school and hospital construction, roads, public health, education and many other needs.

The figures relate only to federal grants to states and localities and do not include other kinds of government spending, for goods and services, in local areas. Not included, either, are the matching funds that must be put up in connection with many of the grants.

As to the cost of these benefits, they are paid for out of

that are allocated to the aid federal income and excise taxes programs.

According to a breakdown of the Tax Foundation's figures, Callahan County's contribution to the programs was approximately \$650,000. Statewide it was \$936,000,000.

In no area of the country, except Nebraska, did the grants and the costs balance out equally. Some localities got back more than they turned in and others got less.

The differences are due to the fact that some communities have more pressing problems and are in greater need of funds for public works than are others.

The awards are made from that standpoint and not with the idea of returning dollar for dollar, it is explained.

Just how much the grants-in-aid programs have grown in recent years is brought out in the figures. In 1960 they totaled \$7 billion. Last year they amounted to \$19.6 billion.

The recent census may result in a drop in aid for some communities. Places that are shown to have declined in population may suffer a proportionate cut in those aid programs that are on a per-capita basis.

## Seek Endowment For Belle Plain Cemetery

Mrs. Fred Heyser of Baird, the former Naomi Cutbirth, who has served as secretary-treasurer of Belle Plain Cemetery Association for more than 20 years, is presently questioning members of early day families regarding their interest in establishing an endowment fund to permanently maintain the burial ground.

Belle Plain Cemetery, located just off U. S. Highway 283, seven miles south of Baird, is one of the oldest cemeteries in this section of the state. First graves were made there before organization of the county in 1877.

Mrs. Heyser points out that smaller cemeteries — Atwell and Scranton — have recently completed successful endowment projects.

"Since 1958 cards have been mailed out each year asking for

donations," she said, "and enough money has come in to keep the cemetery in good condition. The ranks of contributors, though, are being rapidly thinned and when our generation is gone I am not sure anyone will carry on the job. An endowment fund seems to provide the only practical solution."

Although no goal has been set, Mrs. Heyser and those working with her hope to raise \$10,000, pointing out that the interest from this sum would bring in around \$500 annually. "The large number of graves in Belle Plain Cemetery require a minimum of that amount to assure everlasting care," Mrs. Heyser declared, "and that will necessitate some sizeable gifts."

## Survey Claims Cost Of Rearing Child Here Is \$23,400

In Callahan County, under present conditions, how much does it cost to raise a child from birth to age 18?

Most parents have no idea of the overall amount. Beyond recalling that at certain stages along the line the costs were unusually large, sometimes staggeringly so, they have never thought about their total expenditure.

**New Analyses**  
A new analysis of such costs provides some answers. It was

made by the Institute of Life Insurance, using data obtained from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Department of Agriculture and others.

The finding is that the amount spent by parents in rearing a child varies from family to family, but, in general, is closely related to income.

In some families, the outlay in the 18 years is equivalent to as much as 3.6 years of earnings, after taxes. In others, as

little as 2.9 years of earnings are so spent. The average is slightly more than 3 years.

In Callahan County, where net income per family is currently in the \$6,000 to \$7,000 range, on average, the cost per child comes to approximately \$23,400.

**One Exception**  
With one exception, this financial burden is spread out over the years. The exception is the very first outlay — for the birth of the child. This

averages \$580. Medical needs thereafter are estimated at \$2,490.

In most local families, a principal item of expense is food. With prices as they are now, the food bill for the 18 years is placed at \$8,020. A girl consumes about \$500 less than that and a boy \$500 more.

**Clothing Expenses**  
Clothing expenses per child are figured at \$3,790, making allowance for the fact that hand-me-downs are some-

times available. Transportation expenditures add another \$3,800.

Beyond these, there are the outlays for recreation, personal care, the share of the housing expenses attributable to the child and the cost of education up to, but not including, college. That comes later.

For the 140 or so youngsters in Callahan County who are reaching age 18 annually, the total outlay on the part of their parents comes to approximately \$3,276,000.

## SHORTAGE OF HOUSES HURTS CROSS PLAINS

Shortage of suitable housing, particularly rental property, is hurting Cross Plains.

A tally kept at the local newspaper office indicates that this town has lost 27 residents, including nine school-age children, during August for the lack of living quarters. Two families moved to Rising Star.

## Young 1970 Buffalo Herd Numbers 38 Second Week

A younger but larger than usual herd of Buffaloes may represent Cross Plains High School on the gridiron during the 1970 football season.

Head Coach Mack McConal and James Birkhimer, assistant, put 38 candidates through a morning practice sessions Monday. Only six of that number are classified as seniors, and just five are juniors. The remaining 27 are sophomores (13) and freshmen (14). Forty-one potential gridgers met the initial practice session a week earlier, and the number reportedly grew to 44. Since then, however, the ranks have been shrinking. At least three seasoned upperclassmen have abandoned the Herd. J. S. Archer, a two-year letterman, was ordered by a physician not to play this season. He underwent leg surgery last summer. Two others voluntarily hung up pads Monday.

**9 Lettermen**  
It is thought that nine lettermen are back in the fold this year, all six seniors, two juniors and a sophomore. No records were readily available to verify that fact, however, according to McConal.

Only two backfield monogram winners are meeting practices. They are senior Ronnie Pan- cake, a starter last year, and Rod Renfro, a sophomore who saw limited duty.

Veteran line back are seniors Gale Arnold, Robert Lewis and Bill Melton and junior Darrell Walker. Oliver Robertson, a junior, saw limited duty last season, and senior Tommy Merryman, who lettered as a freshman but did not play the last two seasons, is back. Kim Beggs, a senior who was injured at mid-season last year, is again back in pads after undergoing shoulder surgery last winter.

**Intra-Squad Scrimmage**  
An intra-squad scrimmage session is set for Thursday at 4:15 p.m. according to McConal.

It replaces the customary initial controlled practice with another team.

The only scrimmage with outside opposition this year will be Friday, Sept. 4, with the Cisco Lobos. It is slated to begin at 7:30 p.m. in Buaffalo Stadium. The public is invited to view both of the controlled games.

## 2 Oilers Added On Weldon Edwards Fee

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene has completed two Moutray Sand wells south of Clyde.

No. 10-B Weldon Edwards is located 1,600 feet from the south and 600 feet from the west lines of Section 14, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 23 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water. It is pumping from an open hole which was fractured with five sacks of sand and 75 barrels of oil.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 1,294 feet, top of the pay. The hole is bottomed at 1,296 feet.

Other well is No. 11-B Weldon Edwards, spotting 880 feet from the south and 1,140 feet from the west lines of Section 14, BBB&C Survey.

No. 11-B Edwards had a daily potential of 26 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus two barrels of water. It is pumping from an open hole fractured with seven sacks of sand and 75 barrels of oil.

The 4½-inch casing is set at 1,298 feet, top of the pay, and the hole is bottomed at 1,301 feet.

Laco Oil Co. will drill No. 13-B Weldon Edwards as a proposed 1,500-foot venture. It spots 1,160 feet from the south and 540 feet from the west lines of Section 14, BBB&C Survey.

Staked eight miles southwest of Baird was Laco Oil Co. No. 5 J. W. Evans.

Having a proposed depth of 1,200 feet, it spots 470 feet from the south and 1,920 feet from the east lines of Section 5, BBB&C Survey.

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## Texans Will Ballot On 7 Proposed Amendments

Texas voters will be called upon to pass judgment on seven proposed amendments to the state constitution when they go to the polls for the Nov. 3 general election.

Published hereunder are brief synopses of the proposed changes.

### Amendment No. 1

**Censure and Removal of Judges:** To expand the power of the State Judicial Qualification Commission. To cover County Judges, Domestic Relations Judges, Juvenile Judges, Probate Judges, Corporate Judges, and Justices of the Peace, and would give authority to the Commission to censure or remove such judges from office whose conduct is deemed inconsistent with the proper performance of the duties of the court.

### Amendment No. 2

**Authority for Mixed Beverage Law:** Impowers the Legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis. Such a statute would enable each locality to vote on a mixed drink law on a local option basis.

### Amendment No. 3

**Assessment of Farm, Ranch, and Forest Lands:** Authorizes the Legislature to provide by statute for the establishment of a uniform method of assessing ranch, farm, and forest land based on the capability of the lands to support production of the various products rather than based on the value of such lands and crops.

### Amendment No. 4

**Reconstitute State Building Commission:** The proposed amendment establishes the State Building Commission as a three-member commission to be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Members would serve six-year terms on a staggered basis, and the governor would designate biennially a member as chairman. This commission would have charge of the building construction for the state.

### Amendment No. 5

**County Road Bonds and Assessed Valuation:** Under the existing law total bonded indebtedness may never exceed one-

fourth the assessed valuation of the real property of the district or territory issuing the bonds. Also bonds may be issued only on a vote of a two-thirds majority of resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the district or territory to be affected. This amendment would allow counties to issue road bonds without including the amount in the debt limit and would also require only a simple majority to vote such bonds.

### Amendment No. 6

**Increase Value of Homestead Exemption from Forced Sale:** The proposed amendment increases the exemption from forced sale of homesteads located in a city, town, or village from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

### Amendment No. 7

**Authority to Consolidate Functions of Government:** The proposed amendment authorizes the Legislature, by special statute, to provide for consolidation of governmental offices and function of political subdivisions within any county in the state, provided such consolidation is approved by the voters in the political subdivision involved. It also authorizes such political subdivisions involved to contract with each other to perform governmental functions under terms and conditions as may be prescribed by the Legislature.

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# Research Shows Buying Power High In Callahan

Callahan County stands out as a strong market, with a buying power that is better than average. The finding is based upon a national economic survey covering the past year's business activity.

The strong showing was due in the main, to local consumers, who had more money at their command than in former years.

The extent of their spending and its effect on retail business in the area are revealed in the report, entitled "Survey of Buying Power". It was compiled and copyrighted by Sales Management.

Included in it are comparable figures on income and spending for communities in every section of the country.

It shows that net earnings in Callahan County were relatively high last year. After providing for their personal taxes, local residents had a net disposable income of \$22,045,000.

Just what this was equivalent to, in terms of the individual family, was found by dividing the total by the number of local households. It averaged out to \$6,124.

What did local residents do with their bigger incomes? They spent more for soft goods, food and services but held back somewhat in their purchases of big-ticket items.

However, despite the fact that they did not go all-out

in their spending, they made it a good year for local merchants, who chalked up a sales total of \$8,768,000.

The survey gives each community a performance rating based upon the amount of retail business actually done as compared with the estimated full capability of the area.

This is done through an "index of buying power," a weighted figure involving income, population and sales.

Callahan County is given an index rating of .0036, which is the per cent of the nation's business it is believed able to produce.

Since less than that was done during the past year, .0026 per cent, it is concluded that a fair amount of the local purchasing potential has not yet been attained.

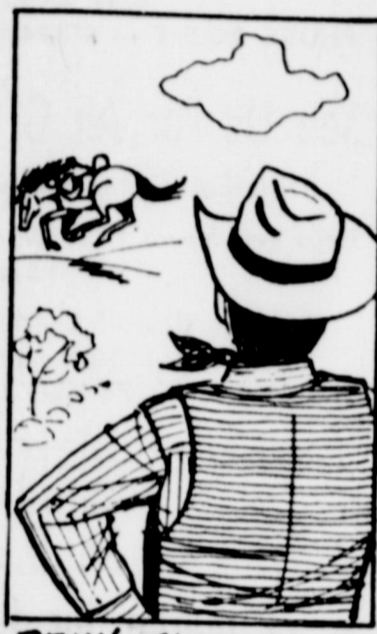

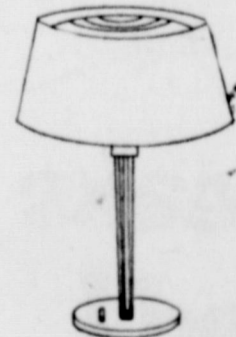

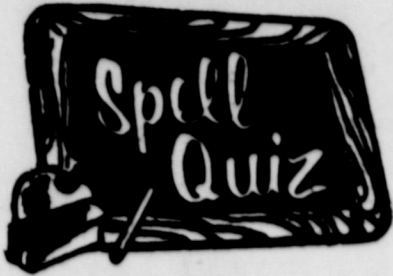
